Bend Merchants Eliminate All State Realty; Evans Fly Upests Childs Hardware Nine

The Bend Merchants last night bumped All State Realty out of the city softball championship race by defeating the realtors 9-2, and the Evans Fly Co. nine took a step closer to the city crown by turning in a one-sided 11-2 victory over Childs Hardware.

The merchants scored their victory on eight hits and five realty errors. Halverson limited the All Staters to six scattered hits. Blucher led the losers at bat with a two for three performance, and Schultz paced the winners with a perfect two for two record.

In the second game, Childs batters were held to two hits, one a homer and one a single, by Evans hurler, Les Schwab, while the Evans sluggers boomed out 17 bingles off two hardware pitchers.

Home run honors went to the two teams' catchers, Sullivan and Kiel.

Evans Hitters Hot
The Evans nine hopped on Hutchins, starting Childs pitcher, for eight hits and five runs. Hull relieved Hutchins and put out the fire for just one inning. Then the Evans batters bounced back again and hit Hull for nine safeties and six more runs.

G. Baker paced the losers at the plate with a one for two record, his hit being an infield single, and Crane was the top slugger for Evans with a two for three performance at bat.

In the city junior tournament game last night, The Bend Bulletin juniors scored a 9-6 victory the Jaycees behind the six hit pitching of Anderson. Wade homered for the winners.

Losers to Be Dropped
Monday night the Evans nine will be out of action while Childs and the merchants fight it out for a playoff position with Evans. Loser of the Monday night game will be dropped and the winner will be matched against Evans on Wednesday. If Evans is victorious Wednesday night it will win the city championship. However, if Evans drops the Wednesday game, the championship playoff will be held Friday night.

Preliminary to the tournament match Monday, The Bend Bulletin juniors will be matched in a game with Cashman's Shamrockettes, a girls' softball team.

Cardinals Back In Top League Spot, Due to Win

New York, Aug. 13 (UP)—First place belonged once again to the St. Louis Cardinals today — the rich reward for compiling a phenomenal winning mark of .857 through the most pressure-packed three weeks this season has yet seen.

The relentless Redbirds drove back to the top of the National league last night by whipping the Pirates 8 to 2 at St. Louis.

The Brooklyn Dodgers, after being out in front all alone for 24 hours, slipped a half-game behind the Cards by losing a 5 to 3 decision to the Boston Braves.

That .857 figure for the trembling Redbirds breaks down to 18 victories in the last 21 games that have gone to a decision, with the last five wins in a row and the pitcher going the route in each. That tally doesn't include two tie games with the Dodgers that must be replayed from the start.

High Mark
Over the last 21 games, the Dodgers have won 14 for a very commendable mark of .667. That mark would outdistance an ordinary team, but the Cards are acting like an extraordinary team.

The double drive has spread-eagled the rest of the league, with third-place New York 12½ games behind Brooklyn. If the pressure keeps up, something else has got to crack.

The Card pitching certainly shows no signs of wobbling. Righthander Gerry Staley was the fifth route-going winner last night, holding the Pirates to six hits — but missing his second straight shutout when Tom Saffell homered with one on.

A pair of three-run homers by Stan Musial and Joe Garagiola eased Staley's way on his eighth win. The game saw the Cards go over a million in attendance with 1,009,529 for 58 home games.

The Braves apparently can't repeat as N.L. champs, but they are spoiling things for the Dodgers. Last night's win was their seventh in 11 games this year with Brooklyn.

Phillies Win
In a National day game, the Phillies downed the Giants, 2 to 1, at New York to end a three-game losing streak behind the three-hit-hurling of Hank Borowy.

Cincinnati and Chicago were not scheduled.

Rasmussen Has Good Showing In Track Meets

Of the four meets he has participated in over the past two weeks in Norway and Sweden, George Rasmussen, University of Oregon pole vault star, and former Lava Bearman, has taken one first, two seconds, and one third in the pole vault event, according to reports from his relatives in Bend.

Rasmussen is a member of the 55-man United States track team which is currently touring European countries and competing in international meets.

In the opening meet, held in Oslo, Norway, July 29, Rasmussen took third place in the pole vault event behind Bob Richards, of Illinois, and R. Lundberg of Sweden.

A part of the American squad then went to Sweden where Rasmussen placed second, again behind Richards, at the Stockholm meet. He also placed second at a meet held in Guttensberg.

Having Fine Time
According to a letter Rasmussen wrote to his father, George Rasmussen Sr., and his sister, Mrs. Keith Langworthy, both of Bend, he is having a "wonderful time" touring the Scandinavian countries.

He wrote that the countries are beautiful, but that it had been raining ever since he arrived in Norway approximately two weeks ago.

The squad with which Rasmussen is traveling will also make a tour of Denmark before returning to this country.

Week ends the squad competes in track meets in the large cities and during the remainder of the weeks it participates in competition in small towns throughout the Scandinavian countries.

Other squads of the 55-man U.S. team are touring several other European countries.
