Vienna Women Wrestlers Tell Of Experiences

Vienna (AP)—Husky, dark-haired Christi Engel, one of the top "wrestlers" in the Vienna international women's tournament, said she preferred "to have my body bruised than sell it."

The female bone-crusher, one of half a dozen who have church and public moral leaders screaming with their weekly exhibitions, was explaining in her simple way how she entered the grung and groan business.

"What else am I to do?" Christi asked with a shrug of her well-muscled shoulders. "I am an actress, but today actresses in Vienna literally are starving. I am willing to do any kind of honest work and have tried as a waitress. But I have a sick mother and a little brother at school. I could not earn enough money."

Christi, whose father died in the last war, was answering charges made by Nora Hill, leader of public reaction against women wrestlers.

Vienna Reacts

Hill charged wrestling had nothing to do with culture and civilization, and Vienna, the center of both, reacted violently. Young boys, members of a Catholic group, invaded the circus tent where the girls maul each other and hurled ammonia and stink bombs into the ring.

Actress Engel, defending herself and her fellow "internationalists" in the tournament, pointed out she could not earn a "decent living" in cabarets, dance halls or on the stage in the Austrian capital today.

"All the managers of such enterprises demand that following the show I 'keep company' with any man in the audience who so desires, and could pay a price."

"So when I realized I had to become a prostitute to stay in show business I went into wrestling, since I would rather have my body bruised than sell it."

which draw packed houses as do the other two wrestling arenas in Vienna, she goes to her modest home to "read Shakespeare, Balzac and Zola. That is my relaxation."

The other girls in the show tell much the same story. Rosina Morski has a crippled husband and two small children. She says wrestling is better than working as a laborer in a factory at 12 schillings a day.

Others Feel Likewise

Leopoldine Lehner was an actress in the Vienna Volkstheater but says she will wrestle as long as she can't get a stage contract. She was once hailed as "the most talented actress of the rising generation."

"The French" member of the troupe is "Fifi L'Arronge, who is the best looking but has never been to France and can't speak a word of the language."

Seventeen-year-old Judy Mondschlein, representing "Palestine," wants to be a singer and is working her way through school as a lady mauler.

The "villain" of the troupe is Erzo Fekete, who by chance is the only foreigner in the troupe, a Hungarian, who bites and gouges her fellow women to keep her 17-year-old daughter in school.

The "Italia" woman in the lineup is Lucia Gonda, an aged dancer who frankly admits she wrestles other women because it pays more dough than her profession.

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
