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Benson Returns To Penitentiary

Salem, Sept. 21 (AP)—William P. Benson, a recaptured escapee, was back in the Oregon state penitentiary today after leading police officers over sections of northern Idaho in a futile search for the grave of a fellow prisoner.

Benson, who scaled the walls of the Oregon state penitentiary on Memorial day, had told officers he buried John O. Pinson, his companion in the escape, near Kellogg, Ida. He said Pinson died from gunshot wounds suffered as they fled the prison.

George A. Katz, director of the bureau of identification, and investigation for Oregon, escorted Benson here from Spokane. He was accompanied by Don Johnson, a prison guard, and Captain Herdiers of the state penitentiary guards.

Yesterday the officers traveled to Coeur d'Alene, Ida., 30 miles east of Spokane, to examine an automobile thought to be owned by Pinson.

Coeur d'Alene police found the car last week during a search for a man known as Joseph A. Dorian. It contained an arsenal of guns and ammunition and an extensive set of burglary tools.

Earlier, Benson had led officers through the Kellogg region as far east as Saltese, Mont., but said he could not remember where he buried Pinson.

Monument Planned For Bomb Victims

Klamath Falls, Sept. 21 (AP)—A monument will be erected at the spot where six persons were killed May 5, 1945, by the explosion of a bomb which drifted across the Pacific ocean on a Japanese balloon.

The six victims, all members of a picnicking party near Bly, Ore., were believed to be the only persons killed as a result of enemy action on continental United States during the war.

The monument, including a bronze plaque, will be erected and maintained by the Weyerhaeuser-Timber Co.

Secretary Sawyer Visits Bonneville

Portland, Sept. 21 (AP)—Secretary of commerce Charles Sawyer visited Bonneville dam today before leaving for Seattle on another leg of his nation-wide tour of business conditions.

Tuesday night Sawyer told the board of directors of the Portland chamber of commerce he believed the effect of the British and Canadian money devaluation on American economy had been over-estimated.

He pointed out "there will probably be less price change than has been anticipated in some quarters."

Sawyer said the short term effects of devaluation will be increased exports by pound countries to dollar countries at slightly lower prices.

After talks with local labor and business leaders, Sawyer rated economic conditions in Portland as "a little better than average."

REV. DOBBS DIES

Severance, N.Y., Sept. 21 (AP)—Rev. John Francis Dobbs, 79, died at his summer home here Tuesday. He was president emeritus of Pacific University at Forest Grove, Ore.

Dr. Dobbs took over the presidency at Pacific in 1925 and resigned in 1940. Before that, he had been an author and pastor of the First Congregational church at Malden, Mass.

He was author of "The Call of the Nation" and "The Modern Man and the Church."
