Portland Fire
Damage \$150,000

Portland, Sept. 21 (UP)—Fire broke out in a riverfront business district block today, swept through two five-story buildings and damaged three others before it was brought under control with loss estimated at \$150,000.

The blaze originated in the Shaff & Son electric appliance store between Yamhill and Taylor streets, sending flames high into the air. From there it spread quickly to the Wilson furniture store, a furniture warehouse and then through the block to two buildings owned by the Central Supply company.

Forty guests were routed from the adjacent Dayton hotel and a second-story rooming house. Several firemen were treated for minor burns and cuts from broken glass, but no serious casualties were reported.

The electric store, furniture store and warehouse were described as a total loss by Fire chief Miles Woodworth, who said damage to the two buildings would total \$75,000. In addition an estimated \$70,000 worth of new furniture and electric appliances were ruined and the hotel, rooming house and supply company sustained extensive smoke and fire damage.

Sixteen engine companies, four truck companies and 260 off-shift firemen responded to three alarms. Hundreds of spectators gathered across the street from the Oregon Journal building to watch the firemen as they attacked the blaze from four sides of the block. Huge billows of smoke poured over the city.

SERVICE PLANT DAMAGED

Portland, Sept. 21 (UP)—Fire damaged the \$500,000 Tracey and Co., automotive electric service last night, badly singeing a recent remodeling job.

About 20 city fire department trucks were called to the scene after the flames broke out at 7:50 p.m.

tive international approach to world problems.

"We recognize," he said, "that some of them are of terrible seriousness. But we also recognize that they are deeply rooted in the experience and traditions of great peoples, in the philosophies of major political movements, and in inertia—the inertia of institutions and conditions which intimately affect the lives of hundreds of millions of peoples across the globe. They are too deeply rooted. In many instances, to be rapidly overcome by persuasion or compromise or by isolated diplomatic gestures.

"Many people becoming aware of the depth of these problems, despair of their solution by peaceful means. We have never shared this feeling and we do not share it today. . . . To the extent that we cannot solve them today, we must endure them, but we must never cease our efforts to overcome them step by step."

BID REFERRED

Portland, Sept. 21 (UP)—The state highway commission today referred a low bid of \$988,673.20 for construction of the third portion of the water level Columbia river highway to the engineers for consideration with power to refuse or accept.

The 5.22-mile strip will run from Dodson to Bonneville dam, and the commission regards it the most difficult of the three portions to construct. Low bidder for the job was Peter Klewit Sons' company, Omaha, Neb.

Construction will criss-cross the existing highway and will cut into almost vertical rock cliffs at several points.

Rotarians Hear
Talk on Potatoes

Objectives of the Oregon state potato commission were today outlined before Bend Rotarians by Ben Davidson, state potato commission administrator, from Redmond.

The speaker, introduced by Rotarian Clark Price, stated that one of the main objectives of the commission is to develop a higher consumption of potatoes in the state and country. He said that consumption in America has dropped from 200 to 136 pounds per person annually, while in Europe the level of 500 pounds annually has been maintained.

Davidson explained that in the promotion of increased potato consumption the commission will not do it in such a manner as to cause hardship on producers.

Valuable Food

As a food item, according to the administrator the potato ranks only behind wheat and corn. Its value to central Oregonians is not solely as a food, the speaker said, but is of major importance to the economy of the area. Davidson explained that in winter months when other agriculture industries are not in operation, the potato industry provides work for many persons.

The potato industry in the state is valued at 25 million dollars, according to the speaker, and central Oregon counties play a large part in the industry's picture.

Seek Better Product

As part of the program to increase consumption of potatoes in the state the commission, according to Davidson, is conducting research work in certified seed for the purpose of developing a better product for the market.

Prior to Davidson's talk, Nelson Leland, chairman of the club's community service committee, urged that the Bend Rotarians give wholehearted support to the Community Chest drive which is now under way in the county.

Visiting Rotarian at the meeting today was Carl Anderson, of Walla Walla. Joseph Wilson, state farm placement supervisor from Salem, was a guest.

Wholesale Food
Index Declines
13 Cents in Week

New York, Sept. 21 (UP)—The Dun & Bradstreet wholesale food price index dropped 13 cents in the week which ended yesterday. It was the widest break in more than seven months.

The drop cut the index to \$5.72, lowest since July 19, and wiped out most of a net gain of 19 cents since the index started rising on July 12. This week last year, the index stood at \$5.82.

Breaks in the prices of edible oils and declines in grain and livestock markets were largely responsible for the big drop.

The previous widest decline was a drop of 22 cents in the week ended Feb. 8.

Of the 31 foods used in compiling the index, 17 moved downward, 11 were unchanged, and three increased. The index is the sum total of the wholesale price per pound of each.

The commodities which declined were flour, wheat, corn, rye, oats, barley, hams, lard, coffee, cottonseed oil, cocoa, beans, rice, steers, hogs, lambs and butter.

Unchanged were cheese, sugar, tea, peas, peanuts, eggs, molasses, currants, prunes, milk and raisins.

Those which advanced were beef, hog bellies and potatoes.

Henry Blackmer
Returns to U. S.

Boston, Mass., Sept. 21 (UP)—Henry M. Blackmer, multi-millionaire and central figure in the Teapot dome oil scandal, arrived from Europe at Logan airport today after 25 years in France as a voluntary exile.

Blackmer, a rich oil and mining man, chose self-imposed exile rather than testify in the senate investigation and federal court trials stemming from the scandal during President Warren G. Harding's administration.

Blackmer arrived unheralded at Logan airport during the noon hour aboard an Air France liner.

Dam Suggested
On Crooked River

A proposal that there be constructed in the lower Crooked river gorge a dam primarily for recreation use will come before directors of the Izaak Walton league at their December meeting. It was announced here today. A resolution asking endorsement of such a dam was submitted by the Willamette chapter of the league at the week end meeting in Bend, but no action was taken because the typed resolution had been misplaced. Delegates asked that the proposal be typed and formally presented to the new officers and directors for action.

It was proposed by delegates from the Willamette chapter that the dam be constructed by the government primarily for recreation use, but with power development possible. If such a dam is constructed, its level should not vary more than six feet, it was stressed. Presumably, the location of the dam would be in the box canyon section of the gorge, with boating listed as one of the recreation features.

The Crooked river dam resolution, introduced by Merv Folts of Eugene, included the stipulation that the state division of the Izaak Walton league work with the state game commission on the proposition. It was specified that if the dam be built its water be stocked with fish.

Referred to Directors

Another resolution referred to the directors was submitted by John Ebinger, Klamath Falls attorney, and called for the establishment of chairs of ecology at the University of Oregon and Oregon State college. Ecology is that branch of biology which deals with organisms and their environment and would be applicable in fish and wild life propagation. This resolution was also referred to the directors at their December meeting for action.

A resolution favorably approved at the Bend conference was one changing the Waltonians official year. Effective in 1951, the league's year will end in mid-spring, instead of in September. Officers elected at the Bend conference are to hold office until the spring of 1951.

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Stocks Regain
Part of Losses
On N. Y. Market

New York, Sept. 21 (UP)—Stocks rallied today when President Truman asked steel companies and unions to extend their strike truce by six days to October 1.

Devaluation of sterling and many other currencies was forgotten and markets appeared to have completed their immediate readjustments to the new money rates. Import commodities, which apparently had been oversold, came back. Gold mining issues, possibly over-bought, eased from their recent levels. Government bonds rose on the London stock exchange.

Wall street regarded the steel situation as the most important in the labor developments because shutdowns there would immediately cut down many industries whereas coal stoppages are not expected to hurt until big stockpiles of the fuel are used up.

Stocks regained more than half of yesterday's losses which were the worst the market has experienced since the post-election break last year. Trading quieted from yesterday's pace but the sales again crossed the million share mark.

All sections rallied except the gold shares. Gains ranged to more than a point in major departments, including the railroads. Many high-priced issues and some specials had advances ranging to more than 2 points.

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
