New York, Sept. 21 (UP)—Veteran tennis star Frankie Parker today was reported considering an invitation to turn professional and tour with U. S. national amateur champion Richard (Pancho) Gonzales and former champion Jack Kramer.

Gonzales revealed yesterday that he has turned professional for the tour beginning in New York Oct. 25, and that he will play Kramer on the tour. Bobby Riggs and Francisco Segura also were signed up for the jaunt, and Riggs said another "outstanding player" has been invited.

ARBITRATION REFUSED

Honolulu, T.H., Sept. 21 (UP)—The stevedoring industry said today it was ready to resume negotiations at any time with the striking CIO longshoremen's union, but a union offer to arbitrate the 145-day-old dispute, again was refused.

W. Russell Starr, chief negotiator for the seven stevedoring firms, said the union's demands for arbitration only "prolong the strike."

The union had suggested that negotiations be held until midnight Friday. It said the dispute then should go to a three-man board for arbitration if no settlement was reached.

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AGED VETERAN DIES

Long Beach, Cal., Sept. 21 (UP)—Peppery 102-year-old Charles L. Chappel, who failed early this month to become the Grand Army of the Republic's national commander in chief "the last 15 minutes of my life," died in the Naval hospital here late Monday night.

The gallant old soldier of the Civil war, who had suffered several fainting spells since he returned from the final GAR encampment at Indianapolis, refused several times yesterday to go to the hospital. But while he was in a semi-conscious condition last night, he was taken there by ambulance and died a few hours later of hardening of the arteries.

Portland, Sept. 21 (UP)—A Portland high school jamboree Friday night at Multnomah stadium will open the 1949 football season.

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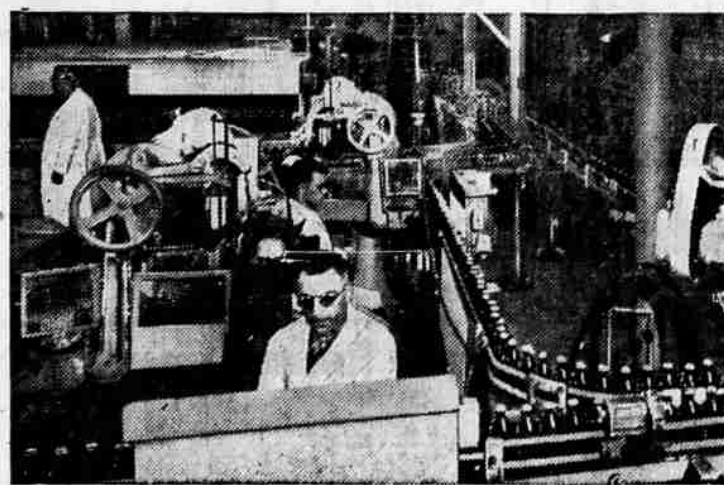
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
