Brighter Light For Franklin Now Advocated

New York (AP)—J. Henry Smythe, Jr., writer of trade names and slogans, said there ought to be a law against the way congress is mistreating the memory of Benjamin Franklin.

Someone is trying to get congress to move Franklin's statue from a niche in the senate wing of the capitol, where hardly anyone looks at it. He wants to put it in a place of honor in the capitol rotunda, where the likenesses of presidents and others are on display for all tourists to see.

But congress has indicated that the big marble statue of Franklin by Hiram Powers will have to stay put. All remaining space in the rotunda is being saved for presidential busts.

"They tell me Franklin isn't big enough," Smythe said. "Why, he's one of the three greatest men of all time. It is time for us to be frank about Franklin."

Smythe, an ardent republican, resembles the late democrat.

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Barkley Plans Visit to Oregon

Washington, Oct. 21 (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse, R., Ore., said today that Vice President Alben W. Barkley is planning a fall visit to Oregon.

Morse said Barkley advised him that democrats in the state have invited the vice-president there, that he expects to go during the congressional recess, but that no definite date has been fixed.

Barkley's office had nothing to add to Morse's information.

The Oregonian took a few of the final minutes of the senate's session to extend a welcome to Barkley, but said he hoped the vice-president would not "encore" the story he told on Morse during his last visit. Morse said the gist of the story was that "Wayne is a republican but he really doesn't know the difference between a republican and a democrat."

Barkley asked permission "to correct" Morse.

"The vice-president," he said, "then the senator from Kentucky, was intimating that the senator from Oregon was a democrat but didn't know it."

"Mr. President," Morse said, addressing Barkley by his title as the senate's presiding officer, "that is a new version of the story. I hope the vice-president will not make his correction in my state."
