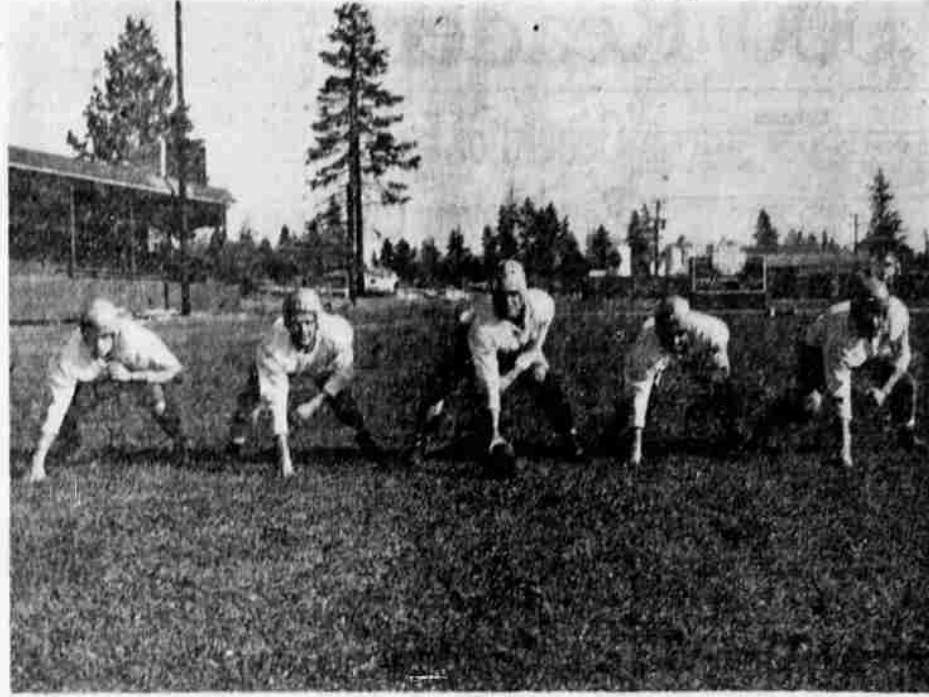

day and Thursday onto a Consolidated Freightways truck and into a railroad boxcar. The truck was scheduled to arrive at a San Jose, Calif., cannery today with 11 tons of pineapples.

New Procedure
Contrary to the first strike here last month, the pineapple company planned to supervise stevedores and loading. Last month the port of The Dalles managed the cargo because it had made a contract with the company. The contract was torn up after the September 28 melee, in order to avoid further "violence and bloodshed." Six men were injured and about \$15,000 of equipment and pineapple were damaged by pickets.

While residents of this Columbia river port city prepared against repetition of last month's disturbance, about 20 alerted state police officers continued to patrol the dock area.

Between Mosier, Ore., and The Dalles, a United Press correspondent counted four state police cars spaced at intervals along the 17-mile stretch of road. The police reportedly intended to stop cars containing pickets, question them, and then release them to go on their way.

The present ILWU strike applies to any deep-water cargo, such as the "Honolulu's" that enters or is in the port of The Dalles.

Power Outlook Reported Gloomy

Tacoma, Oct. 21 (AP)—Despite activation of nearly half a million new kilowatts since last winter, the Pacific northwest today faced another gloomy electrical power outlook unless there are "good rains" in the upper Columbia river watershed during the next few weeks.

The northwest utilities conference committee reported that little rain has fallen east of the Cascades the past seven months. It said heavy rainfall was needed to maintain power production at Grand Coulee and Bonneville on the Columbia and other plants on tributary streams.

The committee, composed of top power officials from Washington, Oregon and Idaho, met here yesterday in its first fall session.

Most of the new power comes from Grand Coulee, where 360,000 kilowatts have been added. But the committee said the power supply would be tight "even under the most favorable weather conditions." The next two or three weeks were named as the most critical.

Members also hinted that round-the-clock curtailment might be asked this winter. Last year power cutbacks were requested during the period between 4:30 and 6 p.m.

Czechs Arrest American Employee

Prague, Czechoslovakia, Oct. 21 (AP)—The Czechoslovak government today arrested an American employe of the U. S. embassy and gave an American diplomat 24 hours to leave the country. They were charged with directing espionage.

Samuel Meryn, a clerk at the embassy, was picked up by Czech police at 2 p.m. Isaac Patch, an embassy attache, was given one day to get out of Czechoslovakia.

The official Czech news agency said a note demanding Patch's expulsion was delivered to the U. S. embassy this afternoon by a representative of the foreign ministry. The Americans were accused of directing an elaborate espionage ring inside Czechoslovakia. It was alleged to be equipped with powerful radio transmitters.

At least three other embassy employes or former employes were mentioned as having played a part in organizing the ring.

Johnson Strikes

might work better if members of the different services "know each other a little better."

Adm. Arthur W. Radford, commander-in-chief of the Pacific fleet and chief navy spokesman in the unification fight, told reporters as the hearing broke up that he was confident the committee "will reach the proper decision."

Johnson contradicted the general impression that former navy secretary John L. Sullivan resigned because of the cancellation of the giant carrier. He said Sullivan submitted his resignation a full month before construction on the ship was halted.

Johnson's statement differed considerably in tone from "unity" appeals put before the committee today by former President Herbert Hoover and Gen. George C. Marshall, wartime army chief of staff and former secretary of state.

He told the committee that the "regrettable" unification quarrel may result in some good "if we now have a renewed effort to make our defense a team."

Johnson opened his testimony with the assertion that, "surprising as it may seem" after the navy attacks on his Pentagon rule, this nation has "emergency war plans" ready, on which all the services, including the navy, are "unanimously agreed."

communists were indicted, provided a maximum penalty of 10 years at the time the indictment was returned, but one month later, in August, 1948, a re-codification by congress changed the maximum conspiracy penalty to five years.

During extended arguments by McGohey and defense counsel on whether the legal maximum now was five or 10 years, Medina said: "It's a question I must thresh out with my own conscience, and I shall meet that. When I decide in my heart what is right, that I must do."

McGohey recommended that each defendant be given the 10-

year maximum sentence of the original act. McGohey said his recommendation was made "especially in view of the threat made by Dennis when he said no matter what the sentence is, these defendants will continue to advocate Marxist-Leninist principles." McGohey said the jury had decided those principles stand for violent overthrow of the federal government.
