## Generator Fails, **Bend Power Cut**

of the midstate feeder plants resulted in a power surge to the north last night shortly before 6 o'clock that left much of central Oregon in darkness, as evening meals were being served in most homes. The "kickback" broke pool connections to the north, and more than half an hour elapsed before the midstate power sys-tem was back on normal produc-

Only towns not included in the "blackout" were Culver, Metolius and Madras, Served from the Cove plant. Bend, Redmond and Prineville were affected. In Bend, the power loss ranged from four minutes, in the downtown section. to 32 minutes in other parts of

power into the local system went out at 5:45 p.m., a surge over lines to the north resulted, and this surge opened switches, cutting connections with the north west power pool, Normally, the nower plant on the Deschutes in Bend would have cared for the extra local load, but the flow past Bend is at a minimum low, with heavy storage under way at Wick jup and Crane prairie.

The break in the system oc-curred at a time of peak loads in the midstate communities.
