

Rescued Airmen Convalescing After Ordeal

Hamilton, Bermuda, Nov. 21 (UP)—All 18 American airmen who spent three nightmarish days and nights on two storm-tossed rubber life rafts after their B-29 superfortress came down in the Atlantic off Bermuda, probably will be out of the hospital in a week, their doctor said today.

Col. Dan R. Sewell, kindle field surgeon, said none of the survivors suffered any serious injuries. But all need time to recover from exhaustion, shock, salt water sores, swollen limbs, bruises and cuts, he said.

The 18 survivors were landed in Bermuda and taken to St. George's hospital yesterday after their rescue Saturday afternoon by a Canadian destroyer which battled 60-foot waves to reach them.

Bearded, haggard and salt-burned, the 18 men told of their ordeal as they lay in a row of white beds in the hospital.

Their voices weak and shaky, they told how two of their companions were swept away and drowned, how one of their life rafts overturned three times, how they "prayed and thought" while search planes seeking them roared overhead lost in low clouds.

Mixed Many Times
They said they watched, almost in despair, as ships passed without spotting them.

Lt. Col. John Grable Jr., commander of the B-29 and of the 2nd bombing squadron, said he flew around and around last Wednesday seeking Bermuda under every cloud after his radio compass failed on the 4,100-mile non-stop flight from California.

When he exhausted his gasoline, he brought the plane down in 20-foot waves.

"It was every man for himself," he said.

The tail broke off the plane on its third bounce across the waves. With the tail went the largest life raft in the plane. The men inflated their Mae West life jackets and jumped into the water.

Scrambling from the wreckage, some of the nine air crew and 11 ground crew cut themselves on the ripped metal sides of the plane. The salt water stopped the bleeding but stung every exposed part of their bodies.

All but two of the men reached the two rubber life rafts. They watched helplessly as a sudden sweep of wind and water carried away Cpl. Raymond Brief, 32, of 155 Callahan court, Arlington, Calif., a member of the ground crew, and Pfc. Robert H. Dobson, 19, of 1135 South Street, Decatur, Ill., an aerial gunner.

OFFICIALLY NAMED
Chicago, Nov. 21 (UP)—Ohio State has been named to represent the western conference in the Rose Bowl, Commissioner Kenneth L. "Tug" Wilson announced today.

The vote to send the Buckeyes was unanimous, Wilson said.

It was the second time the Big Ten representative, selected for the past four years, had been picked by every member of the conference. Michigan, champion of the circuit two years ago, also was a unanimous choice.

But the Wolverines, although co-champions with Ohio State this year, were ineligible to go back
