

Redmond Kids' Day Big Success, Reports Disclose

Redmond, Nov. 21.—Redmond's first annual Kids' day under the sponsorship of the Kiwanis club was held Saturday morning at 10 o'clock with a bike parade down the main street of the town. Leading the procession were Rena Harrison and Donald Brown, Redmond's king and queen, who rode regally in a pony cart drawn by Shetland ponies. Immediately following the parade the Kids' day program was held at the John Tuck school auditorium with Rev. Wesley C. Baker as master of ceremonies. Rev. Baker conducted a quiz kid show with six students from the John Tuck school participating. As a result of this contest Bill Starnard won a first prize of \$5. Carol Sweet won \$3 and John Donahue received a \$2 award.

Pete Hauck of the Kiwanis club introduced the Kids' day king and queen, and Rev. Baker read the Kids' day proclamation made by Mayor Marion Coyner. Maurice Larive, president-elect of Kiwanis club, and principal of the Redmond high school awarded the essay contest prizes. More than 200 students wrote essays on "Why We Should Have a National Kids' Day." First prize of \$5 went to Bill Hallock, the \$3 second prize was awarded to Gordon Rice, and Donald Wolf received a \$2 award.

Rupert Parks made the awards for the most cleverly decorated bikes. Prizes of \$5, \$3 and \$2 went to Darlene Schumaker for first, Ronny Munkres second and Ned and Ted Schroeder, third. Similar prizes were awarded to winners of the poster contest. These went to Jack Johnson, first; Jerry Jordan, second, and Lucille Ward, third. Theme of the posters was "Child By Child We Build Our Nation." Prize money for these contests was donated by Milt Odum, and was given to each child in the form of a savings account at the local bank.

The climax of the Kids' day program was the professional soccer game held Sunday afternoon at the fairgrounds, between the Clan McLeay and the Vikings. This exciting game resulted in a 3 to 2 victory for the Vikings. Grade school kids were guests of the Kiwanis club for this game.

Wounded Gambler Losing Ground; Police Are Baffled

Reno, Nov. 21 (U.P.)—Gambler Lincoln Fitzgerald lost further ground in his battle for life today as police admitted they were "completely baffled" as to the reason the 57-year-old casino owner was blasted by a shotgun assailant in a midnight ambush Friday.

Washoe medical center reported Fitzgerald's condition today was "very, very critical." The gambler's pulse became erratic and he was frequently delirious. The two surgeons who have been working to keep the gambler alive since he was shot in the back Friday admitted they didn't know "how he stays alive. It's remarkable."

They pointed out that his spinal cord was shattered, the back portion of his liver torn away, the chest wall punctured and a lung perforated.

Given Transfusions

"Any one of these injuries could cause his death," one surgeon said. He was given frequent blood transfusions in the battle to keep him alive in the hope he might be able to provide police with a clue that might lead to his assailant.

He was conscious for a time after the shooting but as far as

police could find out, he told no one whether he knew who had shot him as he prepared to leave his luxurious home to go to the gambling club he owns in partnership with Dinny Sullivan.

Police chief Lorenz Greeson admitted his men could find no valid motive for the attempted assassination, nor did they even have the remotest clue as to the identity of his assailant. Thorough questioning of residents in Fitzgerald's neighborhood failed to find a single person who had seen anyone near the gambler's home Friday night or had seen or heard a car drive away after two rapid shotgun blasts awoke them.

Police began a systematic check of dealers fired in recent weeks at the Nevada club, operated by Fitzgerald and Sullivan, to learn whether the shooting may have been prompted by a desire to "get even" by a dismissed employee. They admitted this was "just a shot in the dark."

An armed officer was kept in front of Fitzgerald's hospital room around the clock.

Test patterns fired by police indicated the gun used was a sawed-off shotgun, the weapon usually chosen by gangland

Profit Taking Felt by Stocks

New York, Nov. 21 (U.P.)—Stocks declined on profit-taking today. The setback ranged from fractions to a point despite many generous dividend declarations. It was regarded as the normal aftermath to four sessions of advance which lifted the utility and industrial averages to new highs since August of 1946.

Du Pont headed the dividend parade with a year-end declaration of \$1.50 a share. The stock broke more than 2 points on realizing. J. I. Case turned down when directors raised the quarterly dividend and declared a \$2.50 a share year end.

The biggest dividend declared today was \$116.60 a share on Christiana Securities company, a Du Pont holding company. This brings dividends for 1949 to \$258.60 a share, compared with \$182.70 for last year.

Industrial shares led the decline. Rails had losses ranging to more than a point. Utilities had a tiny loss. Oils receded as much as a point in some of the leaders. Steels and motors yielded a trifle. Several issues met special demand and advanced a point or more, including Coca-Cola, and Howe Sound. New York & Harlem appeared on the

tape at 245 up 10 points. United Corp. led in volume with Du Pont second. New highs were noted in several issues, including Southern Company, Allied Chemical, Brown & Bigelow, C.I.T. Investing, Goodrich, and McKesson & Robbins preferred.

He denied having a gun and surrendered a briar pipe he smoked. Detectives said he had been poking the pipe in his overcoat pocket to threaten victims.

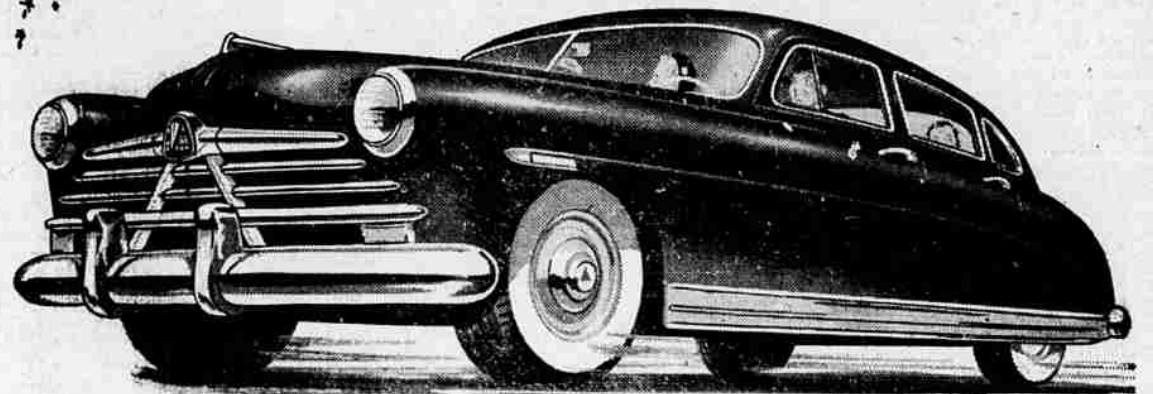
