

Oregon Seedmen Slate Southern Expert for Meet

Prospects for continued and expanded sale of Oregon grown forage crop seeds in Georgia and the south will be discussed by Dr. O. E. Sell, in charge Georgia pasture experimental work, who will be a featured program speaker during the forthcoming ninth annual meeting of the Oregon Seed Growers league in Portland January 9, 10 and 11.

The announcement of Dr. Sell's acceptance to speak comes from E. R. Jackman, veteran O.S.G. extension farm crops specialist, Oregon Seed Growers league secretary-treasurer. All league bus-

iness sessions and the annual banquet will be held in the Multnomah hotel.

Georgia, under the leadership of Dr. Sell, has done outstanding work in substituting livestock type of farming for the older soil depleting row crop economy which was devoted primarily to cotton, Jackman says. Georgia farmers now produce more beef, for example, on a per acre basis during the winter months than they formerly did throughout the year.

Change Revolutionary

Winter grazing utilizing forage crops, many of which are grown for seed in Oregon, have revolutionized agriculture in Georgia and other southern states in recent years. Used for winter grazing are such crops as common ryegrass, hairy vetch, crimson clover and winter oats, the specialist reports.

Triangle Causes Double Shooting

Athens, Ga., Dec. 24 (AP)—John E. Drewry, 47, dean of the University of Georgia's journalism school, was pronounced in "good" condition today despite two bullet wounds inflicted by his divorced wife, as he talked with a beautiful former secretary. The girl also was wounded.

General hospital reported early this morning, seven hours after the shooting, that Drewry's condition was vastly improved and that Miriam Thurmond, 28, was in "fair" condition. Miss Thurmond was shot three times. Police said they would question them about last night's shooting

as soon as doctors permit.

Mrs. Kathleen Merry Drewry collapsed when arrested on open charges after the shooting. She was hospitalized for observation and placed under guard.

Drewry was said to have been wounded twice in the stomach, and Miss Thurmond twice in the back and once in the arm.

Divorced in April

Police said the shooting took place last night on the eve of the Drewry's 24th wedding anniversary. The couple was married

Dec. 24, 1925, and divorced last April.

Mrs. Drewry burst in on Drewry and Miss Thurmond as they sat fully clothed in the living room of the girl's home about 10 p.m.

Police chief Clarence Roberts said she opened fire without warning with a .32 caliber revolver. Two bullets struck Drewry in the stomach and three hit Miss Thurmond.

Mrs. Drewry was arrested at her home several miles away.
