Coptic Monastery Found in Egypt

CAIRO (AP)—A 64-room Coptic monastery of the Byzantine period has been unearthed at Helwan, a suburb of Cairo.

Doctor Zaky Saad, of the Royal Excavations, revealed that during the seventh season of excavations he discovered this monastery, which is believed to have housed some famous Egyptian historians.

Fragments of glass and pottery, as well as gold, silver, and bronze coins found on the site show that the monastery was in use as early as the 8th century A.D. There is no evidence of the time when it was finally deserted.

It is believed that this is the monastery mentioned by the Arab historians Sbu Salih and El Shabosity, who state that Caliph Abdel Aziz Ibn Marwan stayed at a monastery in Helwan during an illness.

Canals Discovered
To the north of the monastery are the remains of small red brick canals, obviously used for irrigating gardens there. To the south is a cemetery containing 30 tombs, of which 15 are intact. The bodies were wrapped in cloth, completely decayed, and nothing was left of the coffins but pieces of rusted iron.

This cemetery was obviously the burial place of monks, as all the bodies recovered are those of males. With one of the bodies was a flat rectangle of ivory, bearing a Coptic inscription, but it was too decayed to be deciphered.

With another of the bodies was a seal in silver, with its owner's name inscribed on the flat base. He was a doctor called "Kassimus" or "Casmos."

Irrigation Provided
In the middle of the monastery was a large water reservoir. On one side was a swimming pool. Another basin supplied the water for irrigating the garden.

Drains were fitted for the disposal of water waste, which indicates that the monks maintained a high standard of cleanliness. There are also vertical drainage pipes fitted into the walls of the roof. In general the impression is of great architectural skill in the construction of the building.

Remains were also found of mud and brick buildings, one of them obviously the residence of a notable, and of a building which probably was a church.

Mystery Lake Lives Up to Name

McCammon, Ida. (AP)—Appropriately named Mystery lake on the farm of Warren Gibbs just won't stay put.

It has appeared each fall for the past 12 years, just after Gibbs finishes the harvest of crops planted on the low-lying field.

In past years, the lake has attained a depth of up to 16 feet, once flooding the Gibbs' home briefly, before it freezes over. Each year it has disappeared as mysteriously as it came.

Pinball Payoffs Bring Arrests

Eugene, Dec. 24 (AP)—Seven Lane county businessmen were awaiting trial today, after they pleaded guilty in district court to illegal operations of pinball machines.

Arresting officers from the Lane county sheriff's office declared high scores on machines in the six establishments "paid off" over the counter.

Six of the businessmen operate taverns in the outskirts of Eugene, and a seventh operates a super market on highway 99 between Eugene and Springfield. None of them does business inside the city.

The sheriff's office is holding one machine from each establishment. Trials are set to begin January 16.

Jail-Born Idea Proves Boomerang

Edinburgh, Scotland (AP)—George Moody got an idea in jail which netted him cash when he got out, but which put him back in.

Testimony in Edinburgh high court showed Moody had gone to relatives of his old prison mates and told them he could arrange early release of the convicts. He collected £31 sterling in cash, a bicycle, and a suitcase of clothing before police heard of his game.

He was given a three-year prison term.

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Teen-Agers Take Traffic Rebuke

Mason City, Ia. (AP)—Youngsters at Mason City high school apparently are more convinced than their parents of the need for punishment of teen-agers guilty of reckless driving.

When the licenses of several young drivers were suspended, their parents called the high school complaining that police were "persecuting" their children.

The student council answered by adopting a resolution giving notice "that any action taken by the law enforcement agencies of the city of Mason City to protect its citizens from the reckless driving of teen-agers will be accepted as necessary to the safety and well-being of the community."

The council also appointed a committee to direct a campaign using posters, moving pictures and talks by highway patrolmen to promote traffic safety.
