Poultry Costs Reduced by Use of Green Feed

Feed costs of chickens or turkeys on range can be reduced from 10 to 20 per cent if an adequate supply of green feed is available, write authors of a revised O.S.C. extension bulletin, number 659, entitled "Green Feed, Sod and Pasture for Chickens and Turkeys," which is now ready for release.

The authors are Noel Bennion, O.S.C. extension poultry specialist; E. R. Jackman, farm crops specialist, and O. S. Fletcher, Lane county extension agent. They explain the saving will depend upon the quantity and quality of the green feed. Also important is how the birds are rotated.

The specialists point out that irrigated ranges, while producing an abundance of green feed as compared with non-irrigated, do have the handicap of being an ideal place for disease organisms and parasites to multiply. If chickens or turkeys are run on irrigated range the bulletin authors recommend that birds be rotated frequently.

Four of the best crops, according to the bulletin, which provide palatable green feed during the summer months without irrigation are winter rye, Sudan grass, sunflowers and corn—the latter two being used extensively for turkeys.

A handy reference guide for seeding and using green feeds and pasture is in the bulletin front-piece. Copies are available from county extension offices or by writing directly to Oregon State College.

Mel Parnell Top 1949 Pitcher

New York, Dec. 24 (AP)—Slender Mel Parnell, sophomore southpaw of the Boston Red Sox, was officially acclaimed the American league's outstanding pitcher of 1949 today by virtue of his top rating in earned runs, total victories and complete games.

The 27-year-old dark-haired dandy from New Orleans, who chalked up 25 triumphs for Boston while losing only seven games, posted an earned average of 2.78 and pitched 27 complete games.

One of the few places where Parnell was not the leader was in the won-lost percentage column, where teammate Ellis Kinder, a 34-year-old right-hander who won 23 and lost only six, led with a .793 rating. Parnell was runner-up, however, with a .781 percentage.

Parnell, who pitched the most innings, 295, had the company of two other pitchers who allowed less than three earned runs per game. Virgil Trucks, Detroit's 19-game winner, hung up a 2.81 mark while Bob Lemon of Cleveland was just inside the wire with 2.99.

Outside of Parnell and Kinder, the league's only other 20-game winners were Lemon, with 22 conquests; Vic Raschi of the Yankees, with 21, and rangy Alex Kellner of the Athletics with 20. Trucks utilized his famed fast ball often enough to win the circuit's strikeout leadership, fanning 153 batters, nine more than teammate Hal Newhouse, Lemon and Kinder shared third place with 138 strikeouts.

U. S. Takes '49 Tennis Laurels

New York (AP)—Richard (Pancho) Gonzales of Los Angeles and Ted Schroeder of La Crescenta, Cal., again led U. S. tennis forces to a clean sweep of the world's great tennis championships in 1949.

The Davis cup, Wightman cup and the singles crowns at Wimbledon and Forest Hills all were in American hands at the year's end.

A series of magnificent triumphs at Wimbledon brought Schroeder the coveted all-England title and a spectacular comeback by Gonzales in the U. S. finals at Forest Hills gave the scar-faced Mexican youth of 21 his second straight national title.

Gonzales turned professional after defeating Schroeder in one more title match in the Pacific southwest championships and began a long barnstorming tour with the king of the pros, Jack Kramer, for a \$60,000 guarantee. Pancho's smashing game faltered to both Kramer through the earlier stages of the tour and at one point Kramer ran out a string of 15 straight victories.

Splitting the singles assignments, Gonzales and Schroeder led the U. S. to a 4 to 1 victory in the Davis cup challenge round against Australia, which had beaten Italy in the inter-zone final. The veteran Billy Talbert and Gardner Mulloy dropped a five set doubles duel to Australia's Billy Sidwell and Jack Bromwich.

U. S. women stars, led by Wimbledon champion, Louis Brough and U. S. champion Mrs. Margaret Osborne DuPont, defeated England in the Wightman cup matches at Philadelphia, 7 to 0.

Gonzales won the U. S. clay court championship in a final against Frankie Parker and defeated Talbert for the U. S. indoor crown. He failed to compete in the U. S. hard court championship, won by Schroeder against Eric Sturges of South Africa. Mrs. Magda Racan won the women's clay court crown and Gertrude Moran the U. S. women's indoor title.

Youthful Hunter Has Close Escape

Wolfville, N. S., Dec. 24 (AP)—A young duck-hunter was rescued today on "a thousand-to-one chance" after drifting helplessly all night on a rickety raft in the Bay of Fundy.

David Sterling, 20, was cast adrift last night when strong tides swept the tiny raft on which he was standing, from its moorings at nearby Boot Island.
