

### Floods Continue To Take Severe Toll in Midwest

Chicago, Jan. 13 (UP)—The rain-swollen Ohio and Wabash rivers today pushed higher in southern Illinois and Indiana, driving bottomland dwellers to higher ground and threatening to send the Mississippi river on a rampage.

The danger zone on the Wabash shifted southward from the Terre Haute-Vincennes, Ind., area to the river's lower reaches near its junction with the Ohio.

Mount Vernon, Ind., in the notch where the two rivers meet, was alerted to receive up to 100 refugee families today. U.S. army troops and "ducks" stood ready to evacuate families in rural areas today, and the national guard unit was on an alert ordered by Gov. Henry Schricker.

The town itself was "high and dry," but thousands of acres of surrounding farmland in the Wabash and Ohio bottoms were flooded as the two streams rolled into one.

**Many Evacuees**

Police, national guardsmen and Red Cross prepared to care for evacuees in the city coliseum.

Upstream, the Wabash at Mount Carmel, Ill., had reached its predicted crest of 27 feet early today and was still rising.

Authorities said that, in view of continuing rains, they could not say how high the river might go before it crests.

Twenty-six families were sheltered in box cars at Mount Carmel, and many others were housed with relatives or friends.

The situation appeared to be easing farther upstream as the Wabash crested at Russellville, Ill., with a weakened levee still holding, and approached its crest at Vincennes, Ind.

Secondary crests were rolling down the upper Wabash and the White river in Indiana, but they were well below last week's damaging highs.

Upstream from Mount Vernon, the Ohio was rising at Evansville, Ind. The crest was expected to touch 44 feet there today, two feet above flood stage.

Army engineers ordered a flood alert along 142 miles of the Mississippi river from the Missouri-Arkansas line northward to a point 39 miles north of Cairo, Ill. The Ohio in the vicinity of its junction with the Mississippi at Cairo also was included.

### Neuner States Boards Have No Authority

Salem, Jan. 13 (UP)—Attorney general George Neuner told the state board of control and the state emergency board, meeting here jointly today, that neither has authority to purchase any property except by specific directive of the legislature.

The board of control asked Neuner for the opinion after learning that the state must somehow make the purchase of certain property in the capitol zone by Feb. 20 or pay 10 times that much if it waits until the next session of the legislature, in 1951.

The issue involves a four-block area which the state plans to include in the capitol zone. Robert Coates of Portland purchased a block of the property and took out a building permit to construct a seven-story apartment house, estimated to cost, in all, some \$350,000. After the state capitol planning commission urged that the four blocks north of Center street between Capitol and Marion streets be vital to the capitol group expansion, Coates said he would be willing to halt his apartment operation at this location if he got out of the property just what he had put into it to date, about \$31,500 for cost of the lot, architect's fees and other related items. He added, however, that he had an FEA loan pending to build the apartment, a loan that was contingent on his starting construction by Feb. 20.

**No Authorization**

Neuner said, as far as the board of control was concerned, inasmuch as it had been given no legislative authority to buy any land north of Center street, "I conclude that we find no statute which authorizes the state board of control to purchase lands with funds derived from the sale of any lands belonging to the state. The board would only be authorized to expend such appropriation as shall have been made by the legislative assembly for specific improvements and additions."

He noted that Oregon law "makes it unlawful for any public official to expend any money in excess of the amounts or for any other or different purpose than as provided by law. We conclude, therefore, that the board of control is not authorized to transfer or use any part of an appropriation which had been made for purchase and improvement of another block in the capitol zone."

Neuner said the function of the emergency board "clearly is administrative." He said it can appropriate money from the emergency fund only to make up for deficits when original appropriations are found too low on projects already approved by the legislature. Neuner concluded: "It is our opinion that it is very questionable whether an 'emergency' as contemplated by the law creating the emergency board exists, and we are therefore compelled to answer the question in the negative."

**SLIGHTLY CONFUSING**

day for another discussion of China policy at a senate foreign relations committee meeting.

The session may bring a showdown on republican demands that the joint chiefs of staff testify on their reported differences with President Truman and the state department over strategic value of Formosa, the nationalist-held island off the China coast.

Sen. William F. Knowland, R., Calif., one of the most outspoken critics of the administration's refusal to aid defenders of Formosa, said the United States is partially responsible for the fact that Russia has been placed in a position to move in on north China.

**Yalta Pact Blamed**

"They're able to do so steps largely from the fact that as a result of the Yalta agreement, we put the Russians in Manchuria," he said. "This was done by the United States and Great Britain without the knowledge and consent of China."

The new-dealing Americans for democratic action believed Acheson's speech was an effective answer to Knowland, Sen. Robert A. Taft, R., O., former President Herbert Hoover and other "Formosa firsters."

It said the secretary made an "able enunciation of the administration's Formosa position." All thinking Americans, it added, realize that U. S. intervention on Formosa is "unjustified."

Acheson emphasized in his talk that the basis of U. S. foreign policy toward Asiatic nations is respect for their territorial integrity.

He said the United States favors Asiatic nationalistic movements. This country, he said, opposes communism in Asia simply because the communists are the enemies of such movements.
