

Snead Murders Par, Victorious At San Antonio

San Antonio, Tex., Feb. 13 (AP)—It took the greatest final 36 holes in PGA tournament history to win the \$10,000 Texas open golf championship, but the one-time temperamental prima donna of the fairways, Sam Snead, proved he was the man who could do it.

The Greenbrier, W. Va., long-ball hitter came roaring out of the pack to fire his second straight eight-under-par 63 yesterday over Brackenridge park's narrow fairways and nip Jimmy Demaret of Ojai, Calif., by a stroke. Snead won with a 265 for the 72 holes.

And, except for the elements he conceivably would have tied or broken still another PGA record—the one of 62 strokes for an 18-hole round.

He missed a 14-footer by inches on No. 17 and then found a hailstorm waiting for him on No. 18.

Bothered by Hail

As the hallstones scattered most of the gallery of 8,000, Snead tried to ram home a 40-foot putt for the possible 61, but "it was like trying to put in a gravel bed," he said, and he missed it and the next one from two feet out.

The three-putted green still gave him a 126 for the final 36 holes, besting by three strokes a PGA mark set on the same 6,400-yard course in 1944 by Sam Byrd.

While he missed trying the tournament record of 264, Snead's 19-under-par round enabled him to become the second man to win the tourney's 23-year history. Wild Bill Melhorn was the other, back in 1928 and 1929.

Demaret, in finishing second, marked the third time in four years he has been the runner-up here.

Both he and Snead managed to pass the lanky pace-setter of the previous days, Fred Haas of New Orleans, who faded from his blistered pace just enough to wind up in third spot with a 267.

Cary Middlecoff of Memphis, Tenn., took fourth with a 67 yesterday for a 270. A stroke ahead of George Fazio of Conshohocken, Pa., and three strokes to the good over Fred Hawkins of El Paso, Tex.

New York, Feb. 13 (AP)—The University of Wichita today announced the greatest advance in journalism since Horace Greeley solved the problem of too many reporters by telling them to "Go west" without setting a destination limit.

Wichita will open a curriculum for coaches called "Public Relations for Athletic Programs." What it will do is teach coaches how to handle the press or blow their horns loudly with no ostentatious limit.

The course will include such intriguing subjects as:

1. Game coverage helps.
2. Interviews.
3. Columnist contacts.
4. Winning the parents.
5. Downtown quarterbacks.
6. Handling of minor scandals in athletics.
7. Allibits and its cures.

Overlooked Factor

That first one, now—game coverage helps—long has been a greatly overlooked factor. As a suggestion to Professor Bob Glazier, there are a number of considerations. A really progressive institution should provide each reporter with the proper seat companions (blondes preferred, even if we aren't considered complete gentlemen); a wee drap of the crature (a fifth will do nicely, unless it's very cold); and somebody with a typewriter which spells, write the cleanup lead.

That brings us to "Interviews." Although this factor is a trifle late to assist Coach Charlie Conacher of the Chicago Black Hawks, who last week lowered the boom on a Detroit sports-writer, Old Fearless is interested in this because it might get to be a habit.

Contacts Important

"Columnist contacts" are very important to any coach. With the right kind of touch he could take over completely—and some of us might wind up with a raise.

Finn Wins National Ski Championship

Duluth, Minn., Feb. 13 (AP)—Olavi Kuronen of Finland today held the National Ski association championship, marking the fourth straight year that foreign skiers have won the title.

Kuronen put together flawless leaps of 205 and 199 feet to win the class A championship yesterday at Duluth's Fond du Lac ski bowl. Art Devlin, Lake Placid, N.Y., who placed second yesterday, is the last American-born skier to win the championship. He won in 1946 and came in second this year with leaps of 189 and 197 feet.

Twelve thousand fans braved blowing snow and 30-mile-an-hour winds to watch the competition. Contest officials said stiff winds held down the leaps and prevented anyone from coming near the hill record of 220 feet set last year by Matti Pietikainen of Finland.

Pietikainen had trouble on the takeoff of his first leap yesterday and barely cleared the slope top for a jump of 103 feet. He came back with a second jump of 186 feet but placed 32nd in the standings.

Dave Freeman of Iron Mountain, Mich., made jumps of 194 and 190 feet to win the class B title.

In addition to Pietikainen, two other Finnish jumpers had trouble. Pentti Heino came in seventh and Asa Johnson was 21st.

Arthur Tokke of the Norway Ski club, N.Y., was third in class A competition. Keith Wooman of Steamboat Springs, Colo., was fourth, and Ralph Bierla of Ishpeming, Mich., was fifth.

Bruins Appear Headed for Hoop Crown in South

San Francisco, Feb. 13 (AP)—The UCLA Bruins, showing a new-found ability to work a ball-court game as well as to run, appeared headed today for another southern division crown in the Pacific coast conference basketball race.

The Bruins invaded northern California over the week end and went home with a pair of easy victories and the league leadership. On Friday night, they defeated Stanford, 65 to 55, and the next night they beat California, 54 to 47.

At the same time, USC bowed out of first place with a 59 to 54 loss to the Bears Friday night. On Saturday, they managed to sink Stanford in the final minutes to win going away, 59 to 45.

This week end, Stanford and California invade the south, but it's doubtful that California will be able to regain any lost ground. And Stanford already is at the bottom of the ladder, with a 1-5 count of games won and lost against them.

The schedule calls for the Bears to play the Trojans and the Indians to play the Bruins Friday. The visitors switch courts the following night.

U.S.C. in Lead

In the northern division, Washington State college battles University of Washington, Friday and Saturday night for the league leadership. The Cougars have won eight and lost four while Washington has won six and lost four.

The Cougars lost to Idaho, 51 to 50, Friday night, while Washington split a week end pair to Wyoming in non-conference competition, losing 49 to 29 Friday but winning Saturday, 37 to 35.

Idaho has the busiest schedule of the five northern division clubs. The Vandals play third-place Oregon State Tuesday and Wednesday at Corvallis and then move to Eugene for a pair over the week end with last-place Oregon.

In addition to conference play, basketball fans kept their eyes on the University of San Francisco, again trying for a return engagement to the national invitation tournament as defending champions.

Dons in Home Stretch

Boasting a 14-5 record this year, the Dons enter the home stretch this week with a game tonight against the Santa Clara Broncos. In their first meeting last month, the Dons won, 56 to 45.
