Ten Lava Bears Named for State Tournament Trip

Coach Roger Wiley today named the 10 Lava Bears he will take to the state tournament in Eugene this week. The squad is scheduled to depart tomorrow morning.

Players making the trip will be Bob Hawes, Reggie Hallian, Al Christensen, Jack Robinson, Ed Kribs, Lawrence Carroll, Dick Larsen, John Mielich, Vernon Samples and John Stenkamp.

Also making the trip will be Gerald Wood, team manager, and Russ Acheson, assistant principal of the high school. Two cars will be used for the journey, Wiley said.

Grants Pass Powerful

Bend is slated to swap baskets with a strong Grants Pass team in its first tournament test. The game will be played Wednesday afternoon, beginning at 3 o'clock. Should the Lava Bears—considered a tournament underdog—upset the Grants Pass quintet, they will meet the winners of the Seaside-Mac Hill Thursday evening at 7:30 p.m.

Grants Pass, considered by state prep experts as the "team to beat" at the tournament, boasts a season record of only one defeat to a high school team. The Bruins, however, also possess a good record and were beaten only three times in 24 starts.

The Athletic Boosters club of Bend will give Coach Wiley his final "instructions" at a special send-off breakfast at the Trailways coffee shop Tuesday morning.

Breakfast at 7

Scheduled to begin at 7 a.m., the breakfast will be attended by club members and any other local sports fans who wish to express their best wishes to the Lava Bears, according to Al Gray, president of the club.

Wiley planned to send the squad through its final practice here this afternoon. He reported that one last workout would be allowed the team after it arrives in Eugene Tuesday. That one will be held at McArthur court, where all tournament games will be played.

Probable starting line-up for Bend Wednesday will be Reggie Hallian, Lawrence Carroll, Jack Robinson, Al Christensen, and Bob Hawes.

16 Teams Entered

Eugene, March 13 (UP)—Sixteen Oregon high school basketball teams, class of the state's prep quintets, began arriving here today for the 32nd annual state high school class "A" basketball tournament which begins with a double-header Tuesday night.

The tournament at University of Oregon's McArthur court will open at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday with Milwaukie representing district 12, playing Corvallis, district 7. In the other opening night game, Hillsboro, district 9, meets Marshfield, district 5 champion and runner-up in the state tourney last year.

A full day and night schedule will get underway Wednesday with the championship game slated for Saturday night.

Roosevelt high of Portland, defending champion and Portland city league titlist, returns as tournament favorite. Other favorites include Marshfield, Salem, Grants Pass and Jefferson of Portland.

Five of the schools represented have won previous tournament titles. They are Salem, five previous championships; Eugene and Corvallis, two titles; and Marshfield and Roosevelt, one title each. Opening round games Wednesday include Dallas vs. Jefferson; Salem vs. Seaside; Seaside vs. Mac Hill of Milton-Freewater; Bend vs. Grants Pass; La Grande vs. Roosevelt; and Eugene vs. Central Catholic.

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UCLA Conference Champs Given Rest, Before Resuming Practice for Regional Play

Los Angeles, March 13 (UP)—For the first time since last October, the Pacific Coast conference champion UCLA basketball team got a day off from practice today.

Coach Johnny Wooden, a driving taskmaster, said his boys deserved the rest. And there were few persons up and down the Pacific coast who would argue with him about that.

The charging Bruins climaxed the greatest season in their history Saturday night by wallowing Washington State, 52 to 49, to win their first PCC title and a berth in the NCAA western regional play-offs.

It was the second straight victory for UCLA over the Cougars, the PCC's northern division titlists. The championship victory also marked a huge personal triumph for Wooden, who in just two years has put UCLA on the nation's basketball map.

Also Personal Triumph

The former Purdue all-American took over at UCLA two years ago, when the school's quintet rarely attracted any national attention. Wooden guided his club to a conference southern division crown in his first season, but the Bruins lost the playoff series for the PCC championship.

This year the club didn't miss after racking up southern division title No. 2 for Mr. Wooden. Its 25-win 5-loss record should make it one of the favorites in the NCAA playoffs. Wooden said UCLA had a "good chance" to go all the way in the tournament, but tacked on the usual coach's qualification.

"The team that gets the breaks will take the big prize," Wooden said. "I don't see any outstanding team in the NCAA event."

"If any club beats another by a big margin," he said, "it'll be strictly because it's having one of its better nights while the other team is off its game."

Solid Club

An advocate of a fast-breaking, never-stop-running type of ball, Wooden thinks his Bruins are a solid club at every position with excellent scoring balance.

"From what I've seen and heard, we've got a good chance in the NCAA playoffs," Wooden said. "Of course this depends how our injured players come around."

Four boys got banged up in that clinching UCLA victory Saturday night. Guard George Stanich, an all-east performer, suffered a badly sprained ankle; forward Ralph Jochel, hero of a "night's win over WSC," wrenched both an ankle and knee; forward Jerry Norman needed several stitches to close a scalp cut; and guard Art Alper bruised his hip.

The serious loss would be Stanich. He is the guy most observers believe makes the Bruin five click.

"George is a great competitor. He has tremendous drive and is one of the best players I've had in 18 years of coaching," Wooden said. "We'll know tomorrow when we resume practice how badly hurt he is."

The UCLA team will fly back March 23 for the playoffs at Kansas City.

Amateur Boxing Card Set Friday

The first boxing card in the new central Oregon Amateur Boxing program will be held at the national guard armory Friday night beginning at 8:30 o'clock, according to H. Bruno, promoter.

The youthful boxers who will participate in the matches will go through their final workouts on Tuesday and Wednesday nights. Both sessions will be held from 7 to 9 p. m. Bruno stressed that it was very important that all boys registered in the program attend these workouts.

Tickets for the Friday night bouts will be on sale at the gate and will be priced at 75 cents for children and \$1.20 for adults. There will be no reserved seats, Bruno reported.

New York, March 13 (UP)—The "Bouncing Basque" came back today, still wielding a tennis racket.

Jean Borotra, nearing 51 but full of the boundless energy and enthusiasm which made him a tennis immortal, flew in from Paris to compete in the national indoor championships.

Retire? Not the wiry little man who with Henri Cochet and Rene Lacoste formed the three musketeers of French tennis.

"I'll play as long as my legs will carry me," he smiled. "But I'll admit that they aren't what they used to be and I don't expect to go very far in this tournament."

That's the way the "Bouncing Basque" always has been and always will be. To him tennis is a religion.

Once Won Davis Cup

Always he was as pleased as a child when he won, and he did more than his share as he and his two sidekicks captured the Davis cup for France the first time in 1927. Over the years, Jean won 60 French championships, 18 English championships, eight American titles and three Australian.

There was the time in Europe when Mary Garden and Bill Tilden were called on to sing the Star Spangled Banner at a ceremony. Borotra sensed that neither of them knew all the words. So he edged over and drowned out their uncertain mumbles.

Bradley Favored Over Syracuse

New York, March 13 (UP)—Top-seeded Bradley was favored by 5½ points over upset-minded Syracuse and unseeded western Kentucky was a 2½-point choice over fourth-seeded St. John's to night in the quarter-finals of the national invitation basketball tournament.

A crowd of 18,000 was expected to pack Madison Square Garden to watch the two seeded teams, which drew first round byes along with Kentucky and Duquesne, swing into action against the survivors from Saturday's opening round games.

For tomorrow night's two other quarter-final battles, second-seeded Kentucky's southeastern conference champions were a four-point choice over City college of New York, while unseeded La Salle of Philadelphia was made a surprise three-point favorite over third-seeded Duquesne.

Record Good

The Braves from Peoria, Ill., whose 27-3 record is one of the best in the nation, will be out to clinch their best season in history with their first N. I. T. championship. In four previous invitation tournaments, Bradley never has gone past the semi-finals.

Led by All-American Paul Unruh, their six-foot, four-inch center, and little Gene Melchiorre, their spectacular five-foot, 8½-inch pivotman, the Braves had an added advantage in that coach Forrest Anderson scouted Syracuse in its 80 to 52 upset victory over Long Island university, Saturday night.

"They're fast and they pass beautifully," Anderson said. "They'll give us trouble."

The orangemen will have the tallest man on the floor in Ed Miller, their six-foot-six center, in addition to a brilliant outside-shooting threat in guard Jack Kiley, who scored 21 points against L. I. U.

The second game clash between towering western Kentucky and St. John's of Brooklyn will pit against each other two of the nation's outstanding centers in six-foot-seven Bob Layton of the Hilltoppers and six-foot-six Bob Zawoluk of the Redmen.

Rogue Chieftains New B Champions

Astoria, March 13 (UP)—The Rogue River Chieftains today held the Oregon state class "B" high school basketball championship for the first time in the school's history.

The rangy Rogue River team, coached by Millard Webb, whizzed through two preliminary games and then defeated Alsea, 38 to 34, here Saturday night for the title.

In the other Saturday games, Garibaldi won third place by defeating Drain, 48 to 41, and Prairie City won the consolation prize by wallowing Monmouth, 62 to 45.

Coaches Select All-Conference Basketball Team

Portland, March 13 (UP)—Northwest conference basketball coaches today named their all-conference selections placing three Willamette men on the first team.

The balloting produced two teams of six men each. Willamette forwards, Ted Loder, and Doug Logue and guard Lou Scrivins were on the first team. Conference scoring champion, center Ed Rooney of Pacific university, was also named, along with Bob Follard, Lewis & Clark college guard, and guard Charles Anderson of Whitman.

Rooney made 231 points for the season and was followed by Pollard with 226, Anderson with 222 and Loder with 199.

The coaches' second six-man team named Bob Hammond, forward, Linfield; Joe Moraun, forward, Pacific; Bob Lee, center, College of Idaho; Rod Downey, guard, Lewis & Clark; Lloyd Neville, guard, College of Idaho, and Carlos Wall, guard, Whitman.

Neville was the conference's fifth top scorer with 169 points.

'Little Giants' Slated for Action

Kansas City, Mo., March 13 (UP)—The national association of intercollegiate basketball tournament begins today with 31 of the nation's "little giants" primed to topple the three H's—Hamline, Haskins and Hutter.

The seeded Pled Pipers of Hamline university of St. Paul, Minn., victors in 28 out of 30 games this season, will defend their title in the week-long grind at Kansas City's municipal auditorium.

The Piper star is Hal Haskins, a dead-eye forward, who was named the most valuable player to appear in last year's tournament. Haskins is just as good this year. The variety of shots which gave him 33 points against Long Island university on March 2 so impressed New York sports writers that they chose the 6-foot, 3-inch senior as the most valuable player to appear in Madison Square Garden this season.

Record Impressive

Joe Hutton is Hamline's coach—has been for 18 years. During that time, the Pled Pipers have won or tied for the Minnesota intercollegiate conference title 14 times. His lifetime record at Hamline is a phenomenal 339 victories against only 73 defeats.

What team stands the best chance of upsetting the Minnesota champions? Brooklyn college, a big team with a good fast break offense and a fine record which includes a triumph over St. John's university, one of the national invitation tournament elms, rates next to Hamline in pre-tournament ratings.

Regis college of Denver meets the Pled Pipers in first round competition today.
