More Margarine On U. S. Tables

Washington, March 17 (AP) — Agriculture department officials predicted today that Americans will eat less butter and more margarine this year than last.

They said this trend will become apparent even before federal taxes on oleo are lifted July 1, under the bill signed yesterday by President Truman.

Even with the taxes, margarine now has a price advantage over butter. The government's butter price support program is holding retail prices of butter at a level about 2 1/2 times higher than margarine prices. Traditionally, butter has retailed for only about twice as much as margarine.

10 Cent Cut Due

A spokesman for the National margarine makers association said the tax repeal will increase total margarine sales, "but how much, nobody knows." He said that when the 10-cent-a-pound federal tax on colored oleo goes off July 1, the price of colored margarine will drop the full 10 cents.

Sales of yellow margarine in recent months, even with the tax, have been breaking all records. But this has been offset by a drop in sales of uncolored margarine on which the federal tax is one-fourth cent a pound.

The margarine makers association said the tax repeal is expected to encourage new companies to enter the oleo field. There are now 27 companies operating 54 production plants.

In 15 states, margarine makers will get no benefit from the repeal on the 10-cent tax on sales of colored margarine. In these states, sale of pre-colored margarine is banned by state law.

6 SUFFOCATE, IN JAIL

Spray, N.C., March 17 (AP) — Six prisoners died of suffocation in a county jail here early today when two mattresses caught fire. Sheriff M. S. Hodges would release no names. He said three of the persons were Negroes, two were white men and the sixth, a white woman.

Dr. M. P. Cummings, county coroner, said he believed the mattresses were ignited by cigarettes although other sources said it was jail policy to take matches away from prisoners when they enter jail.

Prineville to Buy New Locomotive

Prineville, March 17 — With purchase of a new \$81,025 diesel locomotive for the municipally-owned Prineville railroad authorized by the city council, C. C. McGlenn, manager of the line, left Wednesday for a three-week eastern visit to inspect the new engine at the General Electric plant in Schenectady, N. Y. The new diesel locomotive will be delivered in Prineville in April.

Before he left on the trip, McGlenn reported to the city council that the rail line, only municipally-owned carrier of its kind in Oregon, handled 583 cars last month, setting a new record for February business. As a result of the expansion of the local pine lumber industry, Prineville reportedly became the leading point of the Pacific northwest in originating carloadings of pine lumber. Of the February total, 503 cars were pine lumber.

Ralph Brown, acting mayor in the absence of Mayor A. D. Vaughan, has been authorized by the city council to sign papers consummating the purchase of the locomotive.

McGlenn was accompanied east by Mrs. McGlenn. They planned to travel together as far as Chicago, where Mrs. McGlenn will proceed to Birmingham, Ala. for a visit with her son-in-law and daughter.
