

Russian Troops Arrive in China, Reports Reveal

Hong Kong, March 21 (UP)—A large number of Russian troops have arrived recently in China and are taking an active role in China's civil war, according to apparently authentic reports.

These reports, from a number of sources, indicate that between 5,000 and 10,000 Russian troops have arrived within the past 30 days.

They are helping bolster Chinese resistance against increased nationalist air attacks. There is also the possibility that the Russians might be used to discourage any popular uprising against the Chinese communist regime in view of China's widespread famine and economic stagnation.

Observers advanced another theory—that the Russians might have been placed in China to insure that the pro-kremlin faction of the Chinese communist party would not be ousted by nationalist communists who believe in China first.

Some in Shanghai

The Hong Kong Standard, quoting a prominent Chinese business man recently arrived from China, said that 2,000 Russian troops are helping to man communist anti-aircraft batteries in Shanghai. Others have taken up positions along the Nanking-Shanghai railway.

According to this informant, the Chinese communists had to call in the Russians for help in learning how to master the intricacies of German-made anti-aircraft guns.

Other reports from Formosa last week said nationalist planes have encountered a new type of fighter over Shanghai, which might be Russian or Czechoslovak.

A Czech trade mission recently arrived in the communist capital of Peking, China only recently signed a treaty of alliance and trade agreements with Moscow.

Informed observers here said that in addition to troops, there has been a large increase in the number of Russian civilians in China. Soviet civilians are infiltrating every phase of China's economy, these sources said.

Beef Prices Make Further Advance

Portland, March 21 (UP)—Wholesalers said today that beef prices in the Portland area have been advanced another cent and that shoppers probably would find most beef cuts up 10 cents a pound as a result of increases during the past few weeks.

The round of price increases boosted wholesale quotations for beef 5 to 6 cents a pound and retail prices 4 to 16 cents a pound. Pork prices began a decline with last fall's pig crop starting to market. Live hog prices went down 50 cents a hundred pounds and wholesale carcass pork prices one cent a pound yesterday.

Government Cracks Down on Ring Selling Horsemeat

Chicago, March 21 (UP)—The government cracked down today on a ring suspected of selling horsemeat as high grade beef tenders over wide sections of the nation.

City, state and federal authorities cooperated in a full-scale investigation which agents expected to reach into many of the big packing centers of the midwest and southwest.

About 12,000 pounds of mislabeled horsemeat was seized in a southside warehouse here yesterday.

Agents said two men were known to have acted as leaders of the alleged ring, but would not disclose their names. No arrests had been made as yet, it was emphasized.

Officials said the horsemeat was shipped from Kansas City, Mo., labeled properly as "horsemeat tenders," but at South Bend, Ind., the meat underwent processing to remove the label. Then the meat was brought here labeled simply as "tenders" and the stamp as "beef tenders" was added in the warehouse where the meat was found.

The meat, officials said, was owned by a Minnesota man.

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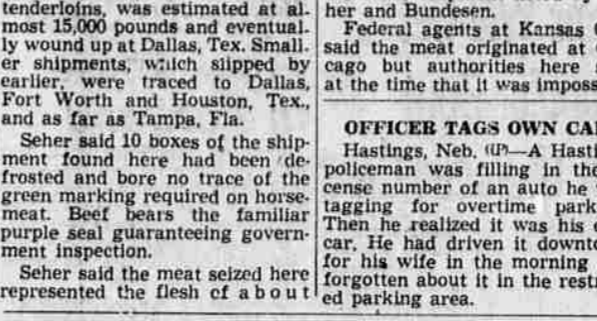

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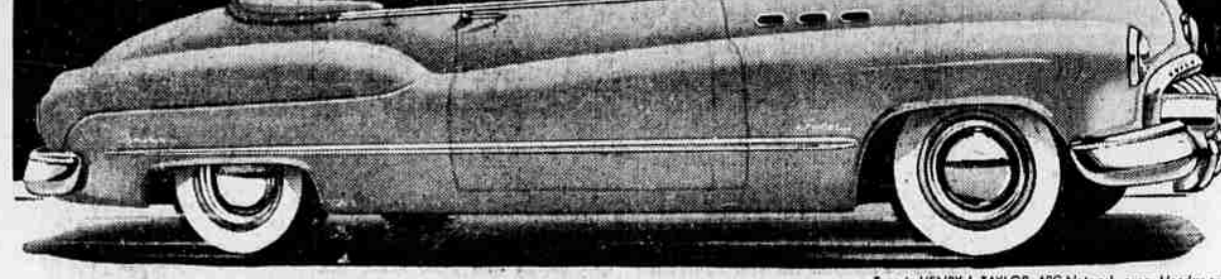
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
