Women Begin Rehearsals Of Oratorio

In preparation for presentation of "The Elijah," by Mendelssohn, sopranos and altos are being rehearsed, with tenors and basses to join in practices after the Bend Gleemen, nucleus for the men's voice section, complete their current concert schedule. Rehearsals of joint groups from the Prineville, Redmond, Madras, Culver and Bend communities, will be held later, and the concert will be given the third week in May.

All local women who wish to sing in the oratorio are being requested to attend a rehearsal Wednesday, April 19, in the Thompson auditorium. CASH ALLOCATED

All but \$2,000 of the 1950 Deschutes county agriculture conservation allocation had been set aside as of April 12 for proposed practices that have been approved for performance, James Elings, secretary of the Deschutes PMA county committee, announced today.

Up to this date, farmers of the county have requested approximately \$42,000 of agricultural conservation program assistance. This is about \$10,000 more than the county allocation, Elings said, and no new requests for assistance will be approved until more of the allocation is released by cancellation, or completion of practices now approved.

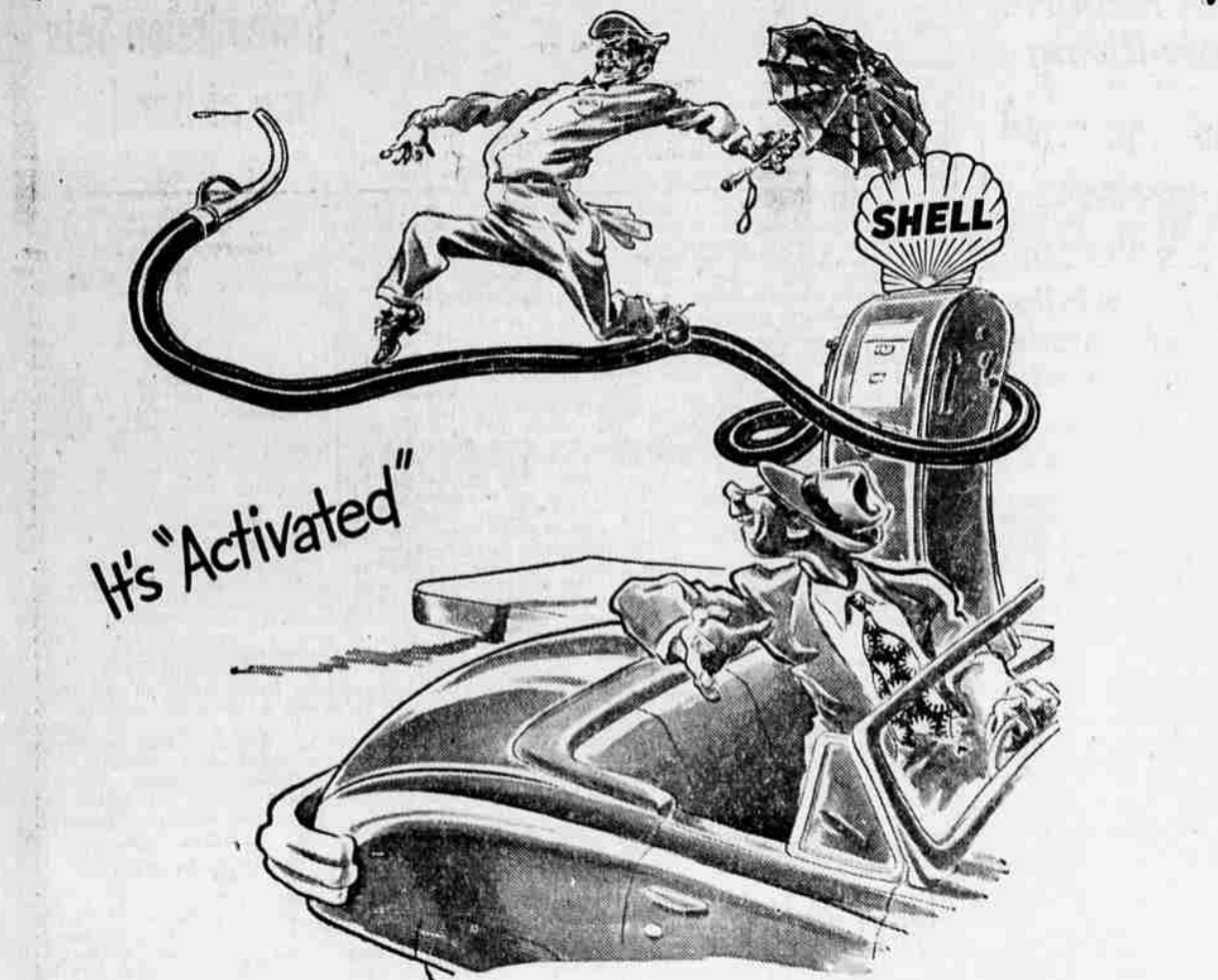
Some lawn grass seed is given a chemical coating to protect them after planting from the ravages of cold, dampness and soil fungi that may prevent germination.
