Home-Towners Win All Coast League Contests

San Francisco, May 13 (UP)—It was strictly a home team show last night in all four Pacific coast league baseball games. The hosts won throughout.

More than 7,600 Seattle fans hardly knew anyone but pitcher Big Jim Wilson was playing for the Rainiers. He allowed San Diego five hits, shutting them out 5 to 0. Not satisfied, he hit a three-run homer in the eighth inning to insure his victory. Then he went back to his hurling chores in the ninth and finished without walking a man. When the dust cleared, he had struck out seven Padres.

Unknowningly, Seattle had the game in the bag in the third frame when Mark Christman was safe on outfielder Orestes Mino's error. The ex-Cuban player had a bad night, making two mistakes.

San Diego pitcher Al Olsen, got his second loss for five wins for the season, while Big Jim got his second victory for five defeats.

Portland Wins
On the other home diamonds, Portland defeated Sacramento 5 to 2, San Francisco downed Oakland 10 to 4, and Hollywood won over Los Angeles 5 to 4 in a 10-inning game.

San Francisco was behind four runs until the fourth inning. They crossed two in that one and went ahead with three runs in the fifth. The Seals went ahead in the seventh to blast the offerings of George Bamberger and Frank Nelson for five more scores.

Les Fleming, Seal hitting star, continued his heavy blasting with singles in four times at bat. He has connected 20 times in 33 trips for a .606 stick average since Sunday.

Stars Win
Los Angeles led off in the first inning with three runs, but was steadily overtaken by Hollywood. The score stood four and four at the end of the ninth. Then in the bottom of the 10th the Stars pushed over the winning run to the accompanying screams of Manager Bill Kelly and Angel first baseman Elbie Fletcher, who were ejected from the game. Kelly played the remaining part of the tenth under protest.

The Portland Beavers led all the way after scoring two runs in the second frame. Mickey Rocco and Joe Broglio in that inning. Rocco went all the way on an error, and Broglio scored on a flyout. Portland added their other three runs in the seventh, while Sacramento's only score came in the ninth.

Jake La Motta, Rocky Graziano Sign for Fight
New York, May 13 (UP)—The middleweight muddle was clarified considerably today by an agreement between champion Jake La Motta and ex-champ Rocky Graziano for a 15-round title fight at Yankee stadium, June 14.

Each will receive 30 per cent of the net gate and the brawl is expected to draw more than \$200,000.

Although the terms are settled, Graziano will not sign until the International Boxing club settles with the New York managers guild in their dispute over television receipts at Madison Square Garden shows.

La Motta will be making his first defense of the 160-pound crown that he won from the late Marcel Cerdan at Detroit June 16.

Tommy Byrne Better Pitcher Now That Balk Rule Enforced; Athletics Defeated, 3 to 2

New York, May 13 (UP)—Wild man Tommy Byrne of the New York Yankees is a better pitcher because of the new balk rule and because catcher Yogi Berra gets a buck every time he hollers "Stop."

Byrne, a guy with million dollar stuff and 10-cent control, almost lost his job with the Yankees once, because he couldn't get the ball over the plate.

This year after Byrne had been knocked out of the box in his first two starts and had been called three times on the new balk rule which requires a full second hesitation before delivery, Manager Casey Stengel said to Berra:

"Tell that guy to stop before he throws. Every time you holler 'stop' you may save us a ball game, so I'll give you a buck each time."

By slowing Byrne to comply with the balk rule, he also calmed him with men on the bases and the lean lefty now has the poise needed for dependable hurling.

Only 3 Walks
Last night he committed no balks, and what is more important, issued only three walks in pitching an eight-hit, 3 to 2 triumph over the Athletics for the fourth Yankee victory in a row.

Jerry Coleman hit the third homer of his big league career with two men aboard and gave Byrne all the runs he needed. Byrne would have had a shutout but for a two-run homer by Sam Chapman.

The Red Sox moved into third place by topping the Senators, 3 to 1, at Boston. Mickey McDermott outpitched Ray Scarborough. Walt Dropo hit his third straight single to drive home what proved to be the winning run.

Gets 7th Homer
At Cleveland, young Al Rosen blasted his seventh homer, with two men on base, and the Indians scored a 3 to 1 triumph over the White Sox. Early Wynn gained the victory over Bill Wight in a top-flight duel.

At St. Louis, Ewell Blackwell turned in his second outstanding route-going performance of the season.

Another Ace!
Red O'Hearn, Bend golfer, joined the hole-in-one club this past week by aceing the 134-yard seventh hole, according to Woody Lamb, golf pro at the Bend Golf club.

O'Hearn used a number eight iron to accomplish his first hole-in-one. Playing with him were Bob Thomas, Bill Hatch, and Bill Naylor.

Bierman Still Secure in Job
Minneapolis, May 13 (UP)—Bernie Bierman, coach of the University of Minnesota football team, remained secure in his job today freed of speculation that he would be "kicked upstairs."

The role which speculation had assigned to Bierman was filled yesterday by Ide Armstrong, who took over as Minnesota's athletic director.

Armstrong, now athletic director at the University of Utah, was appointed to the Gopher post by the board of regents. He succeeds Frank McCormick, who resigned last fall.

Since McCormick's resignation, Bierman had been touted for the athletic directorship by observers who noted that the Gophers have not measured up to pre-season expectations under his coaching in recent years.

The board said Armstrong would start in his new post July 1, the effective date of McCormick's departure.

Armstrong said at Salt Lake City that acceptance of the new job was a "must" since it afforded him more opportunity.

He said that the chance to work with Bernie and other members of the department is most appealing.

O.S.C. CREWMEN WIN

New Bend Moose Baseball Team To See Action

Columbus, O., May 13 (UP)—The American Bowling congress, bowing to legal actions that "would put us out of business," threw its membership open to Negroes today by removing the "for whites only" clause from its constitution.

Facing suits in five states, A.B.C. convention delegates, in an overwhelming voice vote, did away with the racial restriction yesterday after listening to an appeal from Attorney Michael Dunn of Milwaukee, the organization's general counsel.

"The lawsuits go to our very life," said Dunn.

However, the bars were not completely removed for Negro membership in the thousands of A.B.C. organizations. Dunn pointed out that city associations still will "decide the acceptability of their members."

The A.B.C. faces loss of its charter and injunctions in Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois, Ohio and New York. In the Illinois case, Superior court judge John B. Sbarbaro of Chicago fined the organization \$2,500 for discriminating against Negroes and threatened to revoke its charter.

Dunn said an unfavorable press had caused the A.B.C. "to suffer in the court of public opinion." It already had cost the A.B.C. \$40,000 to fight lawsuits and additional suits, particularly in New York, could be expected, he added.

Three national champions, John Martinovich, Portland; Monty Montgomery, Tacoma, Wash., and Casey Jones, Eugene, and the western states champion, Bud Stranahan, will take part in the motorcycle hill climb at Benham falls Sunday. Crew Member Lost by Plane
Phoenix, Ariz., May 13 (UP)—A B-36 super-bomber crew member fell more than five and a half miles from the huge plane when a plastic dome burst in the craft's nose section, air force authorities reported today.

March air force base planes from California joined civil air patrol planes here in a search for the unidentified man.

The plane, America's largest land-based bomber, was en route from Carswell air force base, Ft. Worth, Tex., to Fairfield-Suisun air force base, Calif., when the bubble on the plane's nose section gave way in the 28,000 foot altitude yesterday.

Air force officials said the plane has a pressurized cabin and the dome burst in the low atmospheric area.

The plane was flying over mountainous terrain near Hope, Ariz., when the accident happened.

The bomber circled the area but was unable to spot the missing man. Williams air force base search planes from here also were unable to locate the body.

It was the first time a B-36 ever lost a crew member in this fashion, although other aircraft have experienced similar mishaps.

2 DIE IN PLANE CRASH
Elma, Wash., May 13 (UP)—Two persons were killed last night when their two-seat Aerona plane crashed in a field one-half mile south of here, the state patrol reported.

The victims were identified as pilot Carol A. W. Spalding, 32, and Richard Koch, 27, both of Elma.

State patrolmen said the plane's engine apparently failed as it came in low over the field. Spalding was killed instantly. Koch died a few minutes after the crash.

Memorial Day Qualifying Set

Indianapolis, May 13 (UP)—The nation's top drivers face the starting flag today in qualifying spins around the Indianapolis speedway for the Memorial day auto race.

Veteran observers said the qualifiers this year will face stiffer competition than ever before.

At least 12 cars will be on the line when the starter sends the first of them on the 10-mile qualifier. It was expected they will have to meet speeds of 127 mph and up to get on the Memorial day list.

In practice trips around the big brick oval, which becomes the center of the auto racing world each May 30, several drivers have already exceeded 130 miles an hour.

The included Mauri Rose, of South Bend, Ind., three-time winner of the event; Jack McGrath of Alhambra, Calif.; Fred Agabashian, of Albany, Calif.; and Troy Ruttman, of Ontario, Calif.

This quartet and the four-man Lou Moore team were given the best chance of taking the coveted pole position which goes to the car clocking the top speed in the qualifying opener.

Paddy Young New Fight Star

New York, May 13 (UP)—The International Boxing club has a new drawing card in rugged Paddy Young and it plans to keep the up-and-coming New York middleweight busy.

Winner over veteran Charley Fusari at Madison Square Garden last night by a slim margin, Young now is being considered by the I. B. C. for a May or June bout with Tony Janiro of Youngstown, O.

It seems doubtful that Young ever will win a decision by a closer margin. Judge Bill Healy decided the fight after referee Ruby Goldstein picked Fusari and Judge Joe Agnello favored Young. Healy called the fight even, but gave the duke to Young on points, 7 to 6.

Young weighed 154½, three pounds more than Fusari. A crowd of 9,673 watched the bout.
