Hospital Pledge Lawsuits Filed

Two civil cases were filed in circuit court today by the Central Oregon Hospitals foundation charging individuals with non-payment of subscription pledges.

The cases were the first court actions by the foundation to collect money pledged to a hospital fund being used for the construction of the new St. Charles hospital in Bend.

Charges of non-payment of pledges were filed against H. G. Rainey and Lewis E. Raipsey, both of Bend. Each, according to the complaints, pledged \$250 to the hospital fund. Neither has paid any part of his pledge, the complaints allege.

In each case the complaint requests a judgment against the defendant in the amount of his pledge. The cases were filed by DeArmond, Goodrich & Foley, attorneys for the Central Oregon Hospitals foundation, a corporation.

vided that such persons be given a public hearing before formal charges are recommended.

Jaffe was managing editor of the magazine Amerasia when the FBI and OSS agents raided its offices in 1945 and found thousands of classified government documents.

The resulting investigation ended with the arrest of Jaffe, two state department officials, a naval officer and two contributors to the publication. All were charged with illegal possession of the documents.

Jaffe pleaded guilty and was fined \$2,500. Emmanuel S. Larsen, a state department far eastern expert, decided not to contest the charge and was fined \$500.

The other four were not prosecuted and republicans frequently have charged that the affair was whitewashed.

The subcommittee still was waiting for the justice department to supply excerpts from the late James E. Forrestal's diary in its effort to determine who, if anyone, ordered a delay in the arrests. Forrestal at the time was secretary of the navy.

Undulant Fever Shows Increase

Columbus, O. (AP) — Dr. John A. Prior, associate professor of medicine at Ohio State university, claims the incidence of undulant fever is increasing in the U. S.

In an article in the Ohio State Medical Journal, Dr. Prior said that in 1948 more cases of undulant fever were reported than ever before and added that "for each known case there are undoubtedly others which fail to reach the attention of health officers."

Undulant fever, or brucellosis, is caused by drinking raw infected milk or by handling diseased livestock.

"Brucellosis also presents a major problem in the livestock industry," Dr. Prior reported. "It is estimated to cost the cattle industry alone more than \$100,000,000 each year."
