

# Big Ten Loses Meet; Gehrmann Is Outstanding

Madison, Wis., June 21 (UP)—Wisconsin's great distance runner, Don Gehrmann, closed his collegiate career in an amazing burst of speed, even though his Big Ten teammates lost as expected in the 10th annual Big Ten-Pacific Coast conference track meet.

The talented west coast team scrambled to a 69 to 63 win for its sixth triumph in the interconference spectacle last night. But it was the closest meet in the history of the Big Ten.

The slender Badger runner, slated to compete in three events, won both the mile and half mile and he ran a stupendous third lap on the western conference mile relay team to give Wisconsin's Leroy Collins an anchor lead he held with ease.

By the time Collins crossed the finish line, it was too late for the Big Ten to triumph. But Gehrmann did a great job.

**Time Slow**  
He paced himself smartly in the mile and then blazed out in front in the final half lap to win in 4:11.1, slow time, but still triumphant.

He came back in the half mile and in the final 60 yards burned past other runners to win in 1:56.7, fastest collegiate half mile of the year and a new meet record.

Gehrmann and Dick Attlesley, Southern California hurdler, were the only double winners of the night. Attlesley captured both the 120 yard high hurdles, setting a new meet mark of 1:38, and the 220 fows.

Other meet records fell to Don McEwen of Michigan in the two mile with a time of 9:09.6 and to Otis Chandler of Stanford in the shot put with a heave of 56 feet 1 1/2 inches.

**Muscle Pulled**  
Part for one bad break, the Pacific coast total would have been five points higher. Don Anderson, California's sprint star who finished second in both dashes in the N.C.A.A. meet, captured the 100 yard dash with ease in :09.7, but half way through the 220 with a two yard lead and breezing, he pulled a muscle in his left leg and had to give up. Charlie Peters of Indiana went on to win.

The Big Ten won only one relay, the mile. The Pacific coast took the 480 yard shuttle hurdle relay and the 440 yard relay.

Other individual winners were Dick Doyle, Montana, in the discus; Jim Holland, Northwestern, in the broad jump; Don Laz, Illinois, in the pole vault; Leroy Col-

# Texas Tramples Washington State

Omaha, Neb., June 21 (UP)—The University of Texas Longhorns trampled the Washington State Cougars 12 to 1 last night to even the count in the National Collegiate Athletic association baseball tournament.

Texas bunched 15 hits effectively to down the Cougars. It was Washington State's first defeat in the double-elimination tourney and left the Cougars and Longhorns with identical records of three victories and one defeat.

Wisconsin eliminated Alabama, 3 to 1, in the opening game of last night's double-header to remain in the running with Texas, Washington State and Rutgers. Wisconsin and Rutgers each have won two and lost one.

Sudden death faces losers from now on, and either Wisconsin or Rutgers will drop by the wayside when they clash in tonight's only contest.

The winner tonight takes on Texas tomorrow night, and the winner of that contest meets Washington State in the finale Friday night.

Texas bunched 11 hits in the third and seventh innings for nine runs in the game with Washington State last night. Cal Segrist, first baseman, led the five-run third-inning flurry with a

three-run homer. Murray Wall scattered five Cougar hits.

Thornton Kipper turned in a three-hit pitching job for Wisconsin as the Badgers got to Frank Lary, Alabama hurler, for four hits and three runs in the first inning and then held the south-ersners at bay.
