Tax Increase Not in Prospect

Washington, July 13 (UP)—Chairman Walter F. George of the senate finance committee said today there are no immediate prospects for tax increases "even if the situation does not improve in Korea."

George told newsmen there is "plenty of time" to consider tax increases—if they become necessary because of the international situation.

The Georgian democrat said if tax boosts do become necessary they probably will not come up for congressional consideration until the next session begins in January.

He made the statement after his committee completed hearings on the excise tax reduction bill. The measure has been shelved temporarily as a casualty of the Korean war.
