Serving with Mrs. Lancaster this year as secretary and treasurer, respectively, will be Mrs. Marion Dubuis and Mrs. Chris Kostal, both of Bend.

135 Present
Some 135 delegates attended the convention, which was held July 9 to 12 at the Veterans Memorial building in Eugene. Others attending from Bend were Mr. and Mrs. Sam Reynolds, Mrs. Marie Erickson and Mrs. George Miller. Mrs. Miller, president of the local auxiliary, served as chairman of the convention credential committee.

Delegates at the convention adopted two resolutions, which are to be presented to the state legislature. One calls for a law requiring non-communist pledges from all Oregon teachers. The other resolution asks the legislature to establish a state home for all veterans and their wives.

Mrs. Lancaster, a past president of the Jay H. Upion camp auxiliary of Bend, has held a state office since 1942. Mrs. Austria Barneburg, of Medford, the installing officer at this year's convention, nominated her to her first state office at the 1942 convention in Astoria.

Tooth Is Clue To Early Man In Near East

Istanbul (U)—A prehistoric human tooth and a two-language inscription are leading archaeologists toward understanding ancient Near East civilizations.

In a cave in south Turkey Dr. Muzaffer Shenayurek and Dr. Kilich Kokten of the Turkish Historical society found the paleolithic tooth. The discovery already has shed light on Paleolithic man, sought for many years in Turkey.

In 1947, during an excavation conducted by Prof. Bossert and Dr. Bahadir Alkim in Karatepe on the western bank of the Pyramus river, bilingual inscriptions in Phoenician characters and in Hittite hieroglyphs were discovered.

This discovery proved to be the "Rosetta Stone" of the Hittite language, since the two writings were exact translations of each other, and scientists already could read the Phoenician alphabet.

Dates to 8th Century B.C.
Karatepe is a stronghold whose palace and entrance buildings belong to the eighth-century B.C. The palace was built by Asitawadas, King of the Danuna.

In 1949 the excavation at Karatepe was continued and another late Hittite stronghold of the same period was excavated. Dr. Alkim found there two more Hittite hieroglyphic inscriptions which he expects will make clear the historical position of the fortresses at Karatepe and Domuztepe.

He also found relief sculptures on slabs covering the entrance buildings of the two fortresses which may illustrate ancient Hittite life.

British Join Work
The Turkish Historical society, founded by Mustapha Kemal Ataturk in 1931, is Turkey's chief institution for archeological research.

Two years ago the British Institute of Archaeology opened an office in Ankara, and the two institutions collaborate with great success.

Izmir, ancient Smyrna, is being investigated now, and the French Archeological institute will excavate this autumn in Xanthos, southwest Turkey.

During the summer of 1951 Turkey will play host to the 22nd international congress of orientologists at Istanbul. About 600 scientists are expected and information will be exchanged about the most recent discoveries and studies.

Many Countries Draw Big Loans For Revival

Washington (U)—The lending program of the World Bank, which already has played a major role in the post-war economic revival of the western world, is being broadened under the direction of Eugene R. Black, the bank's president.

Since starting operations June 25, 1946, the bank has made 20 loans to member countries totaling \$803,645,000 and ranging from \$2,300,000 to Finland to \$250,000,000 to France.

Until recently, world loans predominantly have been in dollars simply because borrowers had to rely on U. S. manufacturers—who had to be paid in dollars—for most of the things they needed.

Now producers in other countries are able to offer many heretofore scarce items. Borrowers often ask that loans be made in Swiss francs, Dutch guilders or some currency other than dollars.

Demand Met
In response to the growing demand, Black has recommended to member countries that they authorize the bank to use for loan purposes currencies, other than dollars, now deposited with the bank.

Under the articles of agreement of the World Bank, signed at Bretton Woods, N. H., in July, 1944, each participating country contributed a designated sum, of which 18 per cent was in the currency of the participant. Two per cent was in gold or U. S. dollars. The remaining 8 per cent of each subscription is subject to call by the bank "only when required to meet obligations of the bank."

Thirteen countries now have authorized the bank to use their 18 per cent in the making of loans, subject to approval by the country whose currency is to be used.

Means Saving Dollars

These countries include the United States, which authorized the bank to use its entire subscription of \$3,175,000,000, and the United Kingdom. Others are Belgium, Costa Rica, Canada, Denmark, El Salvador, France, Honduras, Italy, Mexico, the Netherlands, and Paraguay.

The ability of bank member countries to borrow currencies other than dollars and to buy the goods they need with currencies other than dollars makes possible the saving of scarce U. S. dollars. It has been the world-wide scarcity of dollars in the post-war period that has made it so difficult to make the necessary economic adjustments.

This shortage, plus foreign exchange restrictions in virtually every country, and the development of the cold war has kept the World Bank from realizing the actual goals set for it at Bretton Woods.

Instead of being a guarantor of loans by private agencies, such as banks, the bank has become itself one of the biggest lenders in the world, since it is able and willing in a time of uncertainty to face risks avoided by private lenders.

This change in the bank's role was cited by the national advisory council in a recent report to President Truman and to congress.

Prineville, July 13 — Prineville had its first mill strike in eight years, today, with the Ochoco Lumber Co. picketed by members of CIO local 2800. The mill was closed today.

According to company officials the dispute is not over wages and hours, but rather over organization of logging operators. The Thompson Logging Co. has a subcontract to provide logs for the mill, and thus far has not been unionized, it is declared.

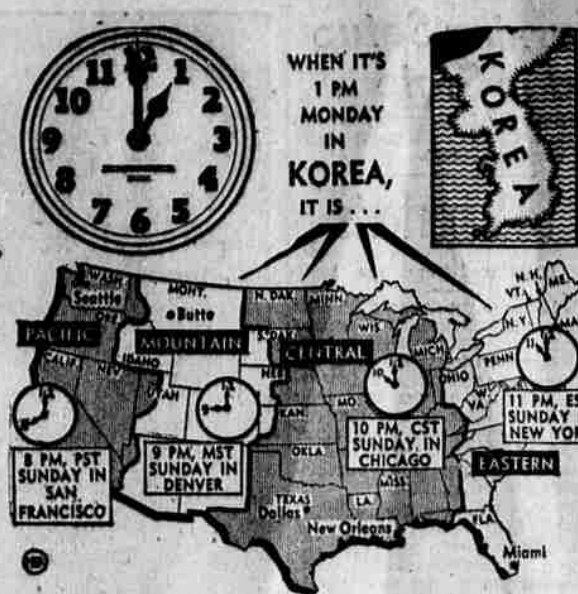
ties of agreement that authorizes the bank to guarantee loans made through private investment channels, the NAC said:

"The original expectation that a considerable part of the bank's business would take the form of guarantees of privately floated loans has not been realized in practice, under the conditions prevailing in the world."

Played Major Role
But nevertheless the bank's loans have played a major post-war role, NAC asserted, because they financed immediate reconstruction when the war ended and are now financing economic development.

As an example, \$28,600,000 in bank funds has been used in France, Belgium, and Luxembourg to rejuvenate and broaden the production of steel.

While steel still must be imported into Europe from the United States, nevertheless the investment of \$28,600,000 in steelmaking facilities has had beneficial effects on employment and national income in those countries.

Bend Residents View Fuselage Of Giant Bomber

Some 5,500 persons visited the huge B-29 superfortress bomber fuselage when it was displayed here yesterday evening. It was announced by Capt. Richard M. Maloney, in charge of the exhibit.

The fuselage, which was scheduled to arrive in Bend by 3 p. m., was detained en route from Portland by blasting on highways near Government Camp and did not arrive until early evening.

The plane and the 13 men accompanying it on this part of its tour of the west, remained in Bend overnight and left this morning for Redding, Calif.

On Long Tour
The exhibit, which was prepared at Wright-Patterson air force base in Dayton, Ohio, is on a 6,000 mile tour of western cities. It came to Bend from Portland, where a record number of 12,500 sightseers, viewed the craft.
