Wilson Seeking Coast League Hurling Record

San Francisco, July 21 (UP)—When big Jim Wilson steps to the mound for Seattle at Holywood tonight, he will be going after a Pacific Coast league pitching record set 41 years ago.

Then, Frank Borwring of the Seals hurled 16 consecutive wins. Wilson has pitched 15 straight victories in 24 games, four of which were shutouts. The huge right-hander will face Herb Karpel—late of the Rainiers and now with the Stars—who has two wins for seven losses in 21 contests.

Along with the jinx facing anyone trying to tie a record, Wilson faces a pretty tough outfit; tough and determined. The Stars—three games behind Oakland in first place—are more interested in getting back to the top than in allowing Wilson to set records at their expense, and they'll be going after their fourth win over Seattle this week.

Stars Win Close One

Last night, ace hurler Jack Selveston outduelled Charlie Schanz to give Hollywood its third straight win over Seattle, 1 to 0.

It was a heartbreaker for Schanz, making his debut from the Boston Red Sox, as he gave up only four hits.

The Stars' tally came when Murray Franklin singled to score Eddie Sauer in the bottom of the ninth.

Other scores included Oakland's 9 to 6 win over Portland; Los Angeles' 2 to 0 shutout against Sacramento, and San Francisco's 8 to 4 victory over San Diego.

Oakland pushed across a five-run seventh inning to break a three-all tie with Portland and win. George Metkovich, Earl Rapp, Roy Zimmerman, Dick Wakefield and Ray Noble crossed home in the big inning.

Portland ignited a short-lived rally for three runs in the eighth as Frankie Austin, Luis Marquez and Johnny Rucker singled and later scored. But it was not enough to stop the Oaks, as the league leaders chalked their third win over the Beavers.

At Sacramento, Herm Besse gave up four hits for his shutout, and was aided by a home run from Ray Cash.

Detroit Tigers, New York Yankees Start Big Series Tonight; 4-Way Race Looms

New York, July 21 (UP)—The Detroit Tigers and New York Yankees begin their first-place showdown tonight in the first clash of a three-game series while two uninvited guests hope to crash the pennant party.

Both the hard-driving Cleveland Indians and explosive Boston Red Sox planned to break into the flag struggle in a big way while the two leaders cut their own throats in hand-to-hand struggles. A four-way race, similar to the National League's muddle, was a possibility by Sunday night.

Sport Parade

New York, July 21 (UP)—There's such a shortage of harness-race horses in the United States today that owners of glue factories are making last-minute, pre-empt experiments with every equine purchase to see if it can trot or pace.

In America's fastest growing sport, the demand for sulky-pullers so greatly exceeds the supply that the U. S. Trotting association is reluctant now about issuing permits for new harness tracks.

Woody Thompson, eastern representative of the Trotting association, estimated today that at least 18,000 harness hay-burners could be used by the flourishing sport if they were available; but they're not. Last year only 9,798 competed at 593 tracks, and a record of 4,140 yearlings were registered.

Big Sum Paid

The scarcity of chariot hoes was emphasized by the unprecedented \$72,000 paid for one yearling, Imperial Hanover, in '49. Thompson said the average price for yearlings now was approximately \$2,700.

The establishment of many new "major plants" for night racing had created the tremendous demand for trotters and pacers, Thompson explained. At the close of '49, there were 42 major plants—having extended race-meetings—in the United States.

And this year, four new major tracks were opened: the Yonkers, N.Y., raceway; the Baltimore raceway; the Wolverine raceway, near Detroit; and the North Branch, Mich., raceway. Two or three more will be added next year, despite the trotting association's opposition.

In the meantime coast league owners must get ready for major league status, Chandler explained to an informal gathering at the university club.

By getting ready for major league ball, Chandler means coast league clubs must build bigger parks so they will be able to pay major league salaries.

"When coast owners are ready to assume the responsibilities of top brand baseball, it will be granted them," concluded the top man of the national pastime.

Marshall Breaks 6 Swim Records In Seattle Meet

Seattle, Wash., July 21 (UP)—John Marshall of Yale went after further glory in the national AAU outdoor swim meet today after placing six new records in American and world swimming books the first time he took to the water.

The Australian flash became the fastest human to negotiate a mile through the water as he stroked the distance in 20:09.6, clipping nearly 20 seconds off the previous world and American mark.

Marshall set the records in the first heat of the four-day meet. In the second heat, Ford Konno of Honolulu knocked seven seconds off the old world mark. The previous record was set by Keo Nakama, U.S.A., eight years ago.

"I guess I'm a little puffed," Marshall admitted as he climbed from the pool after his record-smashing mile. "But I think I still had something left."

The six other new American records were posted by the freckle-faced freshman at the partial distance in his mile run. He averaged 10 seconds better all the way around.

Finals Tonight

The finals in the mile free-style will be held tonight. Other events will include the 220-yard national free-style heats and final, national three-meter diving flights and final, 330-yard medley relay and various northwest AAU events.

Marshall's opponents in the mile final will be Gordon Edwards, Portland, Ore.; Peter Cole, San Francisco; Burwell Jones, Detroit; Konno; Ralph Sala, unattached; Jim Fortelanco, Ocean Falls, B.C., and Gilbert Westwell, Portland, Ore.

Marshall's new records were: 550 yards, 6:05.1 (old record 6:14.9); 1000 yards, 11:18.3 (old record 11:37.1); 1500 meters, 12:24.6 (old record 12:43.2); 1,320 yards, 15:04 (old record 15:23.3); and the mile, 20:09.6 (old American and world record 20:29).

FIGHT RESCHEDULED

Buffalo, N.Y., July 21 (UP)—Promoter Dewey Michaels announced today that his thrice-postponed heavyweight "title" fight between Ezzard Charles, N.B.A. champion, and blond Freddie Beshore of Harrisburg, Pa., has been rescheduled for Aug. 15 at Memorial auditorium.

Their 15-round bout was originally slated for Feb. 28, but Charles' being over his normal fighting weight and later unable to pass two heart examinations caused three postponements.

Pressure Shows

The pressure of the four-way National league scramble began to show unmistakably on the contenders as the Cardinals, Phillies and Dodgers all bowed to second-division teams.

The Dodgers suffered the most bitter blow—a twin defeat at the hands of the reincarnated Cincinnati Reds last night. Ken Raffensberger held the Dodgers to eight hits to beat Don Newcombe, 3 to 1. In the opener and Ewell Blackwell threw a seven-hitter to win the second game, 6 to 2. The Reds—hottest team in either league—have now won 21 of 29 games, a .724 pace and are within a half game of the sixth-place Giants.
