

Redmond Sets Up Defense Program

Redmond, Sept. 21 — Jay Shively was appointed director of civil defense in Redmond, when members of the city council met Monday evening at the city hall for a continuation of last week's council meeting.

Mrs. Jess Tetherow, who had been appointed earlier as chief observer, was a guest at the meeting, and participated in the discussion concerning the setting up of an observation post and the selection of assistant observers. As director, Shively will head the organization, administration and operation of the Redmond set-up.

It was suggested that enough observers be signed so that one person would have no more than one four-hour shift in a week.

Appointments are to be made to head the administration, service, security, medical and welfare departments of the program.

In a discussion on the proposed replacement or revision of the present city charter, the suggestion was offered that councilmen's terms should be staggered, so that only two members would be elected at a time.

Two model charters were examined by councilmen, and City Attorney Rupert Park was asked to estimate the cost of writing a new charter, for a report at the next council meeting. Attorneys Park and Max Cunningham, City Engineer Mrs. Evelyn Hebbert and City Superintendent John Berning have been asked to make suggestions for charter changes.

Kenneth Vadnais asked if it would be possible to include a ruling which would make parents responsible for misdemeanors of their minor children. Such a ruling is to be investigated.

Changing the charter would have to be submitted to the vote of the people.

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Hereford Sale Dates Announced

Prineville, Sept. 21 — Mrs. Jerry Breese, secretary of the Crook County Hereford Breeders' association, announced yesterday that the 1950 annual sale and exhibition of the organization will be held at the grounds of the Crook County Fair on Friday and Saturday, October 20 and 21, when 50 registered bulls and five heifers will be offered by consignors.

Most of the animals will be from the herds of Crook County. They stockmen who have won Parkinville coast-wide note the past several years in herd improvement.

Their range type of hereford bulls, it is declared, have been raising from other sections. Consignors from Salem, Brownsville, in Kent and Lapine, however, will be offering animals here for the late October sale.

Judging of the purebred animals will be made on the first day of the sale by Tom Dorrance, Sr. Paulina and Albert B. Cook, Thad Culver, Ellis White will be the auctioneer. The hereford breeders will not hold a sale of young heifers, such as was a feature of the sale and show last year.

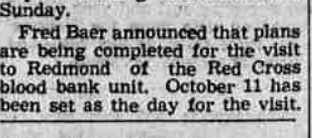
