Train Kills Cows, Plaintiff Alleges

A civil suit was filed yesterday in circuit court by Kenneth Slack requesting a judgment of \$500 and \$250 attorney's fees against the Great Northern Railway company.

According to the complaint, one of the company's trains killed two of the plaintiff's cows about 15 miles south of Bend on June 15. Slack charges that the company had failed to construct a fence along the tracks at the point where the cows were killed.

ing front by United Press correspondent Rutherford Poats said that the northern prong of the marine attack had knocked the reds from hills astride a railroad three miles northwest of Seoul, but that other marines were meeting stiff resistance in the burning industrial suburb of Yongdungpo.

Now Have 6 Beachheads

On the southern, Pusan beachhead, the allies now had six beachheads across the Nakdong river, had taken flaming Tabu on the "Bowling Alley" road from Taegu and were taking an increasing number of prisoners, with thousands of others trapped behind the lines.

Action Deferred

U.S. Artillery Active

American artillery poured round after round into Yongdungpo and the hills in front of the seventh infantry advance on the south and the marine advance north of the Han at the gates of Seoul.

Red anti-aircraft batteries which opened up Wednesday night failed to down any American fighter planes, but enemy fire did shoot down a marine reconnaissance plane Thursday morning. Both the pilot and his observer survived and made their way back to American lines.

Civil Suit Filed

A civil suit was filed in circuit court yesterday by the Central Oregon Hospitals foundation requesting a judgment of \$450 against R. W. Hamby. The sum, according to the complaint, represents the unpaid balance of an amount which the defendant had agreed to pay to the foundation as a donation toward the construction of the new St. Charles hospital in Bend.

It provides various penalties ranging up to \$10,000 fines and 10 years in jail for violations.

Mr. Truman has said he would veto the bill if he decided that it "threatens constitutional liberties."

Sponsors said there was nothing "unconstitutional" about the measure "on which a veto could rest."

Sen. Karl E. Mundt, R., S.D., volunteered to "eat the bill" if anyone could find a single phrase which "strikes at freedom of the press, freedom of speech or the right of free assembly."

Sens. Estes Kefauver, D., Tenn., Herbert H. Lehman, D., N.Y., and William Langer, R., N.D., led a losing senate fight to head off the bill. Langer was a convert, having voted for it when the senate approved it 70-7.

On the final roll call, they were supported by Sens. Frank P. Graham, D., N.C., Theodore Francis Green, D., R.I., Harley M. Kilgore, D., W.Va., and Edward L. Leahy, D., R.I.

A total of 27 republican senators and 24 democrats voted them down.

In the house, Reps. Usher L. Burdick, R., N.D., and Vito Marcantonio, Alp. N.Y., joined 18 democrats in opposing the measure. Voting for it were 186 democrats and 126 republicans.

The basic senate bill was a combination of a half-dozen immigration and internal security bills approved by the judiciary committee, headed by Sen. Pat McCarran, D., Nev. The house version was sponsored by Chairman John S. Wood, D., Ga., of the un-American activities committee.

PROVISIONS LISTED Washington, Sept. 21 (AP)—Here are the main provisions of the catch-all communist control bill:

1. Communist and "communist front" organizations must register with the justice department within 30 days and list their members. Violators can get up to five years and \$10,000 fines.

2. Communists and members of "front" groups could not seek or hold government jobs, seek or use passports, or disseminate propaganda without labeling it.

3. Communists would be barred from defense plant jobs. "Front" members would not be barred, but they must disclose their affiliations.

4. In case of invasion, war, or insurrection, all known communists could be rounded up, but not confined with criminals or be put to hard labor.

5. Immigration and naturalization laws are tightened up against letting in possible reds.

6. The justice department, instead of the state department, de-
