

'Rain-on-Wheels' Devised to Solve Irrigation Woes

Pharr, Tex. (AP) — Lower Rio Grande Valley farmers now can have rain-on-wheels and haul it from field to field.

John E. Oakes, pioneer irrigation pipe manufacturer, introduced the latest answer to a drought-stricken farmer's prayers, a portable sprinkler irrigation system mounted on a series of dual-wheeled trucks.

The 20-foot irrigation pipe sections of the system are connected by a patented ball and housing coupler, allowing highly flexible movements of the system.

The complete sprinkling mechanism can be snaked by tractor to section after section of parched pasture land.

Proud of Rig
Oakes is particularly proud of the maneuverability of the rig which, because of the flexible couplings and dual wheel trucks, can be pulled not only over pasture fields but even down roads and through gates without dismantling.

The system, which utilizes an eight-inch water main, can be installed on a section of land for \$30.40 per acre.

"It saves time and labor," Oakes explained. "The rain-on-wheels system can be moved from one location to another and be turned on in 10 minutes. A quick drain coupler allows the line to drain in three minutes after pressure is turned off, so the tractor is not required to tow a full pipeful of water."

Takes Only One Man
"It takes only one man to make the move, the tractor driver."

Oakes made his theory that sprinkling is better for growing crops than flood irrigation pay off in his manufacturing business. He has a thriving five-state business developed around his big sprinkling systems.

"Sprinkler systems require no ditches, no land-leveling, allow no run-offs and eliminate suffocation of plant roots, one of the objections to flood irrigation," he argued.

"The sprinkler system of irrigation is fast becoming essential on many farms and ranches. And eventually every big farm and ranch in the country may have its own rain-on-wheels."

Dry East Winds Prevail in State

Portland, Sept. 21 (AP) — The weather bureau said today that dry, searing easterly winds will bring "dangerously low" humidities and a sharp rise in fire danger throughout western and south-central Oregon forests.

Fair skies and continued dry weather were forecast for most of the state, with humidities ranging from near 30 per cent along the coast to 15 per cent over interior southwest Oregon and east of the Cascade mountains.

Meantime, the bureau said Portland had one of the driest summer seasons on record. Thus far this month, there has been no measurable amount of rainfall, and for August only .47 inches was recorded.

Power plants on United States reclamation projects constructed for irrigation purposes now have a capacity of 3,218,000 kilowatts, to which 663,000 kilowatts will be added this year.

Mother of Two Still Can Learn About Children

New York (AP) — I've just completed a month's basic training in how to raise children, four years after I had my first baby.

The feeling I have is somewhat like an infantryman after four years of front-line duty, who goes to the rear for training in the use of the rifle.

Darned if I didn't learn there were cogs in those things that I never knew anything about! The scene of this training was the Vassar Summer Institute for parents and children on the beautiful 400-acre campus at Poughkeepsie, N.Y. My four-year-old boy, Ricky, was in Davison dormitory with others his age. Beth, two, was in the young group at Josslyn.

I saw the children only once daily, at parents' hour, and after that were my classes. Child guidance, group activity, psychology — all were integrated to teach the 120 adults in attendance one great lesson.

Two Things Needed
That is, successful child-rearing requires just two habits — love and understanding.

In my pre-Vassar days when Ricky would hit his little sister, I would say something like: "But you should LOVE your little sister."

I handle it differently now. "I understand that sometimes you don't like your sister," I say to him. "It's perfectly natural. But I cannot let you hit her. And I won't let anyone hit you."

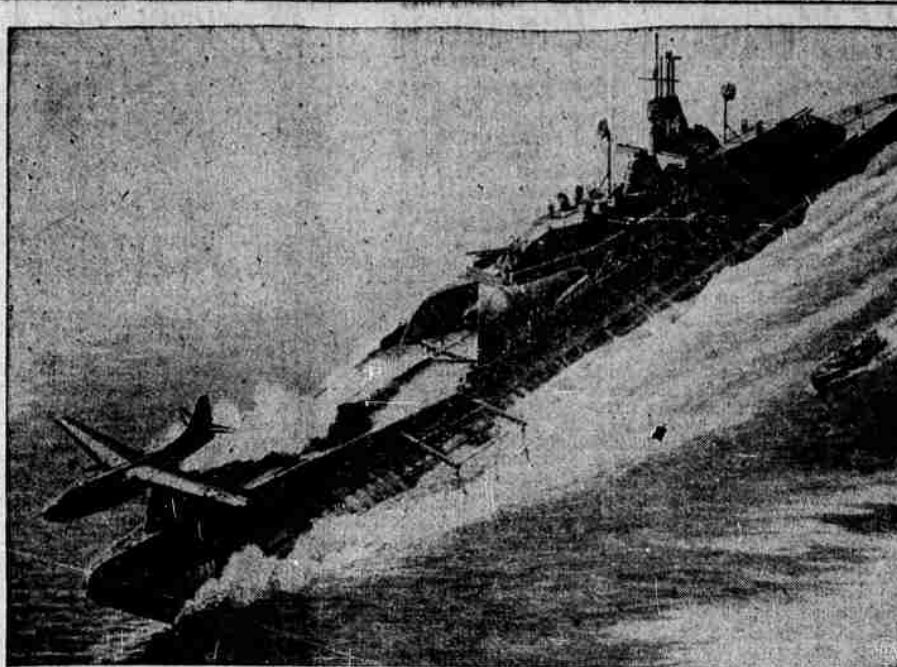
That's understanding that many of his impulses are normal. He feels relieved, not guilty. The important thing now is to channel his hostility into harmless outlets: paints, crayons, a mallet and pegs. Loads of things.

Just as the instructor at the rifle range warns the marksmen that sometimes their guns will jam, so does Vassar caution against feeling its four-weeks tour is a cure-all.

Taught to Understand
Ricky still hits his sister at times. Beth still spills her milk. But the change is in me. I don't explode every time. I've been taught to understand.

Everybody asks me about discipline, spanking especially. There's a notion out that progressive child-rearing means no restrictions at all. Far from it.

Some educators feel spanking should be applied only as a substitute for the physical harm a child would get in a wrong move. Example: rushing into a heavily-trafficked street. The spanking should be explained as being a substitute for being run over. Other educators oppose even that. Myself, I'm not decided.

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Wind Tunnel Has High Speed

Pasadena, Cal. (AP) — The Southern California co-operative wind tunnel, being hurried to completion to serve nearby warplane factories, has been "souped up" past the sonic barrier.

Originally designed to test aircraft at simulated speeds approaching the speed of sound, plans for the tunnel were changed to push its potential to 1,000 miles an hour or more.

The project was started on behalf of Douglas, North American, Lockheed, Consolidated-Vultee and McDonnell aircraft companies to avoid long delays they encountered when forced to wait their turn to test new designs at government experimental facilities.

Driven by the tunnel's 12,000 horsepower plant, 32 specially-designed high-strength metal blades will drive air through a throat into a 12-foot model chamber. Engineers estimate the blast should reach a speed rating of about 910 miles an hour at the start.

Shakedown tests and later improvements are expected, however, to boost the tunnel's speed to as high as 1,058 miles an hour. In addition to testing ultra-speedy planes, the tunnel will allow aeronautical engineers to observe reactions of guided missiles and robot craft.
