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## Grid Favorites Picked to Win Week-End Games

San Francisco, Sept. 21 (UP)—One thing nice about the life of a plucky prognosticator this early in the season: he starts off with a batting average of 1,000 per cent.

So, fastening on our helmet and adjusting our sliding pads, here we go for another season on the football circuit: California over Santa Clara—The Rose Bowl losers to whip the Orange Bowl champions. But look out for those Cleveland pass patterns that Dick Gallagher is supposed to install in the Bronco attack.

UCLA over Oregon—The Bruins look just a bit more solid than do the Ducks who, like a lot of other clubs, must do a rebuilding job.

Stanford over San Jose State—A sad break-in to the head coaching ranks for talented and youthful Bob Brozman of the Spartans. The Indians should win this one by about 50 points.

Michigan State over Oregon State—The Beavers pulled an upset last year, but the game is played at Lansing this year. And replacing a man like Ken Carpenter just can't be done every year.

Utah over Idaho—The Utes are supposed to be the toughest in the Rocky Mountain conference, Idaho the weakest in the PCC. But it will be close.

Washington State over Utah State—The Cougars should win this one by about three touchdowns.

Washington over Kansas State—The Kansas club's victories last year came early over Kilkes of Ft. Hayes State and Colorado. They dropped eight in a row. This should be the ninth.

Texas A. & M. over Nevada—The Wolf Pack just hasn't got it this year. The Aggies should be improved. By about four touchdowns.

USF over Tulsa—It will be tough to stop Ollie Matson this season. But the Dons aren't heavy favorites.

## Detroit Tigers Still in Race But New York Yankees Show No Signs of Easing Pressure

New York, Sept. 21 (UP)—Just think of all the red faces there will be in the automobile capital of Detroit if those New York Yankees run away in the American league stretch race with their 1950 model Ford.

The Yankee Ford—Whitey Ford that is—was a streamlined V-8 speedster today with straight eight victories and no defeats, his last two wins coming when they were desperately needed to prevent the Yankees from skidding right off the main pennant highway.

Yesterday he pitched the Yankees to a three-hit, 8 to 1 victory over the Chicago White Sox for the eighth victory in a row since he joined the club as a wet-behind-the-ears rookie fresh from Kansas City at mid-season. Had he lost the Yankees would have tumbled back into second place behind the Tigers, who scored an uphill, 6 to 5 victory over the Athletics in Detroit.

Have Half-Game Lead  
Today the Yankees were half a game in front of the Tigers and two full games ahead of the third place Red Sox, who ran into disaster at Cleveland yesterday where they blew 8 to 3 and 7 to 1 decisions to the vengeance-bent Indians.

Bobby Brown made three hits, Jerry Coleman drove in three runs, and Cliff Mape hit a homer and drove in two runs as the Yankee second line of hitting strength took over the chores in Chicago. Ford got all the help he needed in a four-run fourth inning and the Yankees made it 6 to 0 before Chicago could score. Ford's brilliance stood out all the more, for the Yankees now may be going into their vital two-game series with the Red Sox on Saturday and Sunday without staff ace, Vic Raschi, who went out of Tuesday night's game with a sore arm. He could be out indefinitely.

The Tigers put on one of their typically explosive late inning rallies to beat the Athletics, scoring three runs in the sixth and two more in the eighth after trailing 5 to 1. Don Kolloway, back after spending a "cool-away" day on the bench for not hitting, drove in three runs with three hits as relief pitcher Ted Gray and Hal White stopped the Athletics in the late innings.

Indians Win  
The Indians, who trace their own downfall in the race to the collapse that started when their ace, Bob Lemon, blew a 12 to 1 lead in Boston, smeared the Red Sox good yesterday, as first Lemon pitched a seven-hitter, then Early Wynn came up with a five-hitter. The Red Sox again succumbed to their Cleveland municipal stadium jinx, winding up the season there with only two wins against nine defeats—the identical mark they had in 11 games there in 1949.

In the only other American league game, Washington outstated St. Louis, 12 to 7. Brooklyn topped Pittsburgh, 7 to 2, and pulling three full games (Continued on Page 10)

## Lava Bears Set For Big Game With Corvallis

In a final tune-up for their first major test of the season, the Bend Lava Bears will run through a light practice session under the lights tonight on Bruin field.

The Bruins meet Corvallis here Friday in their initial Big Six contest. Tomorrow's game will begin at 8 p.m. on Bruin field. Coach Bud Robertson has spent most of the week in working out his team against plays and formations which the Spartans of Corvallis are expected to use here Friday. A Bruin scout, who watched the Spartans roll to victory over Newberg last Friday, has reported that Corvallis has an unusually fine backfield which could give the local defenses plenty of trouble.

Backfield Strong  
Corvallis is expected to start a backfield combination consisting of Bill Thompson, quarterback; Pete Schuelein, right half; Jim MacDonald, left half, and Tom Blackstone, fullback.

Against this combination Bend will probably field a backfield of Dick Laursen, quarterback; Jim Wade, left half; Bill Whaley, right half, and Jim Gilliland, fullback.

The Friday night game will be the second one of the season for both teams. Last week Bend overpowered a stubborn Madras eleven by a score of 18 to 6.

Last year Corvallis squeaked out a fourth quarter win over the Bears, 14 to 13.

## Beavers Achieve Double Victory Over S. F. Seals

San Francisco, Sept. 21 (UP)—The Portland Beavers joined the battle for fourth-place money in the Pacific Coast baseball league last night with their double win over San Francisco, 4 to 3 and 5 to 0.

Portland, a late-comer in the first division fight, has won 11 consecutive games to challenge Seattle and San Francisco for the fourth spot. Seattle holds it now, 21 games out of the lead. San Francisco is next, 22 games away. Portland is hot after the Seals, 23 games behind.

Last night the Beavers edged San Francisco in a two hour and 43 minute, seven-inning opener. Dain Clay doubled in Eddie Barr in the bottom of the seventh for the winning tally.

The nightcap was a shortened, six-frame affair. The Beavers jumped Seals hurler Harry Feldman for five runs on five hits in the fifth. Three runs scored on Mickey Rocco's 25th homer of the season.

In other games, Oakland edged Sacramento, 3 to 2. Los Angeles dumped Seattle, 8 to 3, and San Diego won over Hollywood, 7 to 5.

Oakland won for the second time this week, defeating the Solons in an afternoon contest on a tenth-inning homer by Earl Rapp. The game was a pitchers' duel between Bill Evans of Sacramento and Clyde Shoun, both of whom went the distance.

Shoun collected his 16th win of the year against nine losses, and Evans' losses jumped to 10 against 13 wins.

## Sport Parade

Pompton Lakes, N. J., Sept. 21 (UP)—A tense air of uncertainty hovered over Joe Louis' training camp in the Rambo Mountains today because his sparring partners were throwing an unbroken string of left hooks—and they were landing.

The left hook is the best weapon of one Ezzard Charles, a Cincinnati negro whom Louis meets next Wednesday at Yankee stadium for the heavyweight championship of the world.

Ezzard is a one-time saxophone player and pawn-shop errand boy who came on after the Brown Bomber's retirement two years ago to win recognition by the National Boxing association as the world champion. Ezzard is a retired zoot-suiter, a Fancy Dan and a light would-be champion as 183, some 33 pounds less than Louis at ringside.

But Ezzard can throw a left hook, a better one, even, than the ones being landed so accurately by old Joe's sparmates.

Louis feels well  
"Ah feel better than ah have at any time since the war," Louis mumbled slowly as he taped his huge hands for a six-round bit of boxing in the gymnasium crammed with 200 spectators.

"Ah think ah punches as hard as ever—and just as fast," he continued. "And ah don't think Charles will be as hard to hit as Jersey Joe Walcott."

But Joe, a few minutes later in the battle squared enclosed by red-satin ropes, didn't look sharp. His huge thighs appeared heavy and a bit flabby, there was the barest suggestion of a double chin and he went to work slowly, with that old shuffle, like a man getting paid by the hour.

Louis did little but block blows as he went a round with a rangy boxer named young Harry Wills, who stung the bomber with left hooks and jabs which back in the old days he never would have gotten set to throw. The next opponent for two rounds, was a lean negro built like Charles, one "Baby Dutch" Culbertson. Bobbing and weaving, he had the big man missing badly.

Then came two rounds with a spooler named Shamus O'Brien, who managed to stagger Louis with left hooks. In the second round against O'Brien, Joe finally showed a bit of his old brilliance, moving in to take command and battering the scared Shamus back into the ropes.

"That's the first time he has looked good," said Jimmy Braddock, the Cinderella man from whom Louis took the title 'way back in 1937. "His reflexes aren't what they should be and he lacks coordination."

## Bend Cubs Ready For Redmond

Coach Roger Wiley announced today that his Lava Bear cub football team, composed entirely of 9th graders will launch its 1950 football schedule Friday afternoon against the Redmond Cubs.

The game will be played on Bruin field beginning at 3:30 o'clock.

Wiley reported that he would probably field a starting line-up composed of Fred Paine, left end; Bob Dickerson, left tackle; Bruce Gardner, left guard; Dick Fishback, center; Roger Rinehart, right guard; Ernest Brewington, right tackle; Max Howard, right end; Bob Brown, quarterback; Tom Ray or Bill Giltner, left half; Pat O'Daherty, right half, and Jim St. John, fullback.

Wiley also reported that his team would be without the services of two boys, John Clements and Bob Jewell, because of injuries. John suffered a broken jaw earlier this week and Bob has a sprained hip muscle.

The coach has been working out the Cubs for several weeks and reports that they are rapidly taking shape as a team. Wiley expects to use all 25 men who turned out for the team in Friday's test.

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
