

British Doctors Threaten Strike

London, Oct. 13 (UP)—The powerful British Medical Association threatened today to pull 19,000 doctors out of the labor government's free medical treatment program unless their pay is raised.

The revolt was led by the British Medical Guild, bargaining agency of the BMA, whose members long have been lukewarm to the government's cradle-to-grave socialized medicine scheme.

The guild said it would mail boycott forms to 19,000 general practitioners on Nov. 1 and ordered local medical committees to meet in December to consider resignation from the program and return to private practice.

Twenty years ago doctors won higher pay with a similar threat to an earlier health scheme. But opinion was divided on how successful the present move would be.

Success Uncertain

A BMA spokesman said the boycott would not succeed unless 80 per cent of the general practitioners—the backbone of the medical profession—supported it.

Labor sources doubted the guild could muster that much support. But the health ministry, headed by leftwinger Aneurin Bevan, is investigating the pay scale in co-operation with the BMA.

Under the "womb to tomb" plan instituted two years ago, Britons receive free medical attention all their lives.

The general practitioners are paid so much per patient by the state out of tax money—an average of about 1,530 pounds (\$4,284) a year each, depending on the number of patients on the doctor's list.

The BMA claims that the present formula for paying the doctors was not arbitrarily by the health ministry. The formula, based on earnings of the average practitioner in 1939, also took into account the 1948 cost of living.

The doctors pointed out that living costs had risen since 1948 and have demanded 70 per cent more than the 1939 scale.

Theft of Stamp Brings Arrest, Court Dismissal

San Francisco, Oct. 13 (UP)—A veteran postoffice employee who stole a three-cent stamp to send a letter to his folks wondered today if he could get another job, now that his record has been cleared.

Frederick Gambrell, 50, appeared before Federal Judge Michael J. Roche to be punished for his crime. He expected a six-month sentence, the maximum for Judge Roche is not usually sympathetic with persons who trifle with the government.

But the judge was curious to know why Gambrell had stolen a stamp after serving the postoffice 29 years.

"I've got no excuse," Gambrell said. "I don't know why I did it."

Then he told how as a mail pickup man he sometimes kept loose stamps that fell off letters. He guessed maybe he'd taken about \$7 worth of stamps in the last three years. He got caught taking a stamp last month.

For that, the postoffice fired him, just five years before he was due to retire.

"My wife Billie was wonderful," he said. "She never bawled me out. Of course, we didn't tell the kids."

Gambrell said he, his wife and their two children, Frederick Jr., 15, and Arlyne, 13, live in a cheap hotel because they have heavy medical expenses. Frederick is blind and Arlyne suffers from asthma.

"But we lived within our means," he said. "I never meant to cheat anybody."

Judge Roche asked the government prosecutor, Macklin Fleming, to dismiss the charge. Fleming suggested a conviction for the record, then probation.

"The record is less important than this man's life and his family," the judge snapped. "Case dismissed."

"I'm so grateful," Gambrell said, his eyes filled with tears, "now I want to get a job and work and be a decent citizen. I want to hold my head up again."
