Lava Bears Drop Armistice Day Tilt to Klamath

The end of a successful football season for the Bend Lava Bears was marred Saturday by the Klamath Falls Pelicans as the southern Oregon team romped over the Bruins by a score of 25 to 13 in the annual Armistice Day clash between the two schools. The game was played at Klamath Falls.

Although the Bears struck for a score on their first play from scrimmage and managed to outsmart their opponents throughout the first period, the Pelicans came back strong in the final three quarters and rolled up sizable advantages in both the scoring and ground-gaining departments.

By the end of the game, Klamath Falls had netted 18 first downs, in comparison with Bend's 4, and had collected 409 net yards to the Bears' 129.

The Lava Bears scored both of their touchdowns in the first quarter. The first one came on their first scrimmage play of the game. The Pels had taken the kickoff, and on the second play had fumbled on the 29, with Ernie Martin recovering for the Bruins.

Wade Goes Distance
Jim Wade, Bend halfback, slashed off left tackle on the next play and pranced the distance for the tally.

The Pels came charging back with a score of their own following the kickoff. A pass from Quarterback Ron Dimmick to Halfback Bill Toole, which carried the team to the Bend two-yard line, set up the score. Fullback John Witte plunged over from that spot to knot the score.

Bill Whaley then ripped off the longest run of the day when he grabbed a Pelican fumble on his own four yard line and ran 96 yards for Bend's second and last score of the game. Wade converted to give Bend a 13 to 6 advantage.

Klamath Falls added the fourth first-period score a few minutes later when Gaylor Huck bucked over from the five yard line, after Toole had returned a Bend punt to that spot from his own 30.

The Pels, however, failed to convert and Bend led at the end of the quarter by a score of 13 to 12.

Lead Short Lived
The lead was short-lived, though, as Huck again hit pay-dirt, this time from the 11 yard line, in the second quarter.

The southern Oregon team ended scoring for the afternoon in the third period as Witte cracked the left side of the Bend line from 15 yards out.

Prineville Picked As State Tournament Entry, Following Win Over Redmond Team

Two of Oregon's perennial high school football powers fell to the dreaded district committee vote during the week end as the Oregon high school play-offs jelled with only one quarter-final entrant still in doubt.

Seven of the eight first-round finalists were set Monday. But only two, Prineville and Grant of Portland, have a chance to take the state crown with perfect records.

Votes were taken in three districts to decide quarter-final entrants during the week end.

It was no surprise when a ballot was taken to decide the south central entrant, district two. Both Prineville and Grants Pass were undefeated. The vote was taken after the Cowboys rolled Redmond, 43-0, and the Cave-men whipped stubborn Medford, 27-12.

Second Unbeaten Season
Prineville won the vote and Coach Lee Gustafson's team gets a chance at the crown after a second undefeated season.

La Grande joined Grants Pass as a victim of the "vote system." The twice-defeated Tigers lost to Baker in a 24-7 upset Saturday. A vote eliminated the Tigers and left Vale and Mac-Hi of Milton-Freewater. The two clubs meet in a showdown game at Milton Tuesday.

Undefeated Banks, youngest member of the A-school family, lost the district six title by ballot. Chuck Elliot's once-beaten Oregon City Panthers nosed into the playoffs with a 7-0 win over Hillsboro Friday that also included the TTY pennant.

Marshfield toppled from the undefeated ranks Saturday, but will still represent district three. The Pirates fell to North Bend, 18-14, after taking nine without a defeat. The Pirates beat North Bend, 12-6, earlier in the season.

Eugene Wins
Eugene cruised to the district four title with an easy 28-0 victory over Salem.

Dallas will represent district five. The undefeated Dallas club was tied by Central of Independence-Monmouth, 6-6.

Astoria's fighting Fishermen on the comeback trail after a grid drouth represent district seven. The Portland, or district, eight choice is of course, Grant's Generals, defending state champions.

Last week's action brought to a close the 1950 season for most Oregon schools. Only a few scattered games remain on the schedule.

Other action over the week end found Albany closing the season with a 27-12 win over Corvallis; Klamath Falls bounding over Bend, 25-12; Coquille beating Myrtle Point, 39-13; and Beaverton tromping McMinnville, 25-7.

Prineville Takes Game in Stride From Redmond

Redmond, Nov. 13.—Prineville's Cowboys rode range before the entire state here Armistice afternoon as they walloped Redmond 43 to 0 and earned the nod to represent district No. 2 in a preliminary playoff for the state championship. The Cowboys will meet Marshfield, district No. 3 title winners, on the Crook county gridiron this week end.

Although easy victors over Redmond, the Cowboys' win in the school vote for the district title, 7 to 6, was close. The 13 high schools in big district No. 2, which splits westward into southern Oregon, cast their votes for Prineville and Grants Pass, team which downed Medford 27 to 12 in week end play.

In blanking Redmond Saturday, the Cowboys lengthened their victory streak to 17 games, extending over two seasons.

Kidding high in the saddle for the Cowboys Saturday was Halfback Fred Hall, who rolled up a total of 18 points. Twice he returned punts for touchdowns, once sprinting 73 yards and once hugging the sideline for 61 yards in his race to the goal. With less than a minute to play in the first half Hall booted a 20-yard field goal for three points. He also converted three points after touchdowns.

Other touchdowns were made by Gallagher, Rosenbaum, Tangney and Smith. It was Smith who wound up the Prineville scoring with a 30 yard sprint to the goal in the closing minutes of play.

Coach Lee Gustafson's Cowboys started leisurely against the Panthers, with reserves largely working on the line. At half time, the Cowboys led by one touchdown, a conversion and a field goal—10 to 0. In the second half the Cowboys halted their probing against the stubborn Redmond line and broke up the Panthers' defense with deadly accurate passes and lightning sprints around end. However, the Panthers, strong on defense at times, but weak on offense, gave the visitors plenty of trouble and several times smashed back goal attacks. Indicative of the weakness of the Panther offense, Redmond not once menaced the Prineville goal.

Despite the one-sided score, the game was filled with action, ranging from the kickoff returns by Hall to a triple fumble on one occasion. Incidentally, Prineville's first score was made before the game was seconds old, as Hall took the Redmond kickoff and returned it through a well-blocked punt pass for six points.

Pulsifer, Weigand, Schallhorn and Kissler spearheaded the rather weak Redmond attack.

Present for the traditional Armistice day game between the two teams was a large crowd. Band and drum and bugle corps provided plenty of between-half color.

The Pioneers rolled through their first undefeated season with a 53-0 win over College of Idaho, giving them the Northwest conference championship and an automatic bid to the Pearl Bowl in Medford on Thanksgiving day.

The Beavers' feat—although not so colossal—was a 34-19 victory over Idaho for Oregon State. First Pacific Coast conference win.

Sam Baker was the big gun for the Orangemen, who beat the best Vandal squad in years. Jim Aiken's sputtering Oregon Webfoots were beaten by Washington, 27-12. The Huskies had been favored by 26 points.

Willamette found much-beaten Whitman too hot to handle and fell before the Missionaries, 37-27, in the caper to a season that saw the Beacrats fade rapidly in the final stages.

Oregon Tech squeezed out a 12-0 verdict over Lower Columbia Junior college but Southern Oregon stumbled before California Poly, 45-6.

Red-hot Boise Junior college zoomed past Eastern Oregon, 54-6.

Oregon College of Education won the first Oregon collegiate conference title in Portland Friday night with a 14-0 win over Vanport. In another traditional, Pacific posted a 3-0 verdict over Linfield.

Bierman Quits At Minnesota

Minneapolis, Nov. 13 (UP)—Coach Bernie Bierman today asked Athletic director Ike Armstrong to be relieved of his University of Minnesota coaching duties at the end of the current season—the worst in University of Minnesota's football history.

The 57-year-old coach said he had been contemplating the resignation "for some time and I decided this was a good time to make the announcement."

"I'm not resigning," he said, "because I think the situation is hopeless. But it's been a long tough drag, particularly since the end of the last war."

Armstrong in accepting the resignation, had nothing but praise for Bierman who guided the Golden Gophers to national championships in 1934, 1935, 1936, 1940 and 1941. He also had Big Ten titles in 1934, 1935, 1937, 1938, 1940 and 1941.
