Sawmill Workers Ask Adjustments

Lumber and Sawmill Workers AFL, local unions and district councils in joint action, have notified the employers in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana that they are opening the wage agreements "seeking a proper adjustment to compensate the workers for added living costs, increased taxes, shrinking value of the dollar, and other factors facing the worker's family today."

Employers in the central Oregon, Blue mountain and Klamath basin area had been notified some two months ago of a demand for a wage adjustment and this development brings all northwest lumber producing areas into the picture in so far as adjustments are concerned, AFL officers said. Meetings with employers and their associations are either scheduled or pending.
