HUGE PLANE UNVEILED

Seattle, Wash., Dec. 21 (UP)—The Boeing Airplane company and the U. S. air force revealed today a new model C-97 stratofreighter capable of carrying 135 persons.

Boeing officials said the plane could be used as a flying boom type aerial refueling tanker, or as a troop transport. With tanker equipment removed, the giant aircraft could carry either 135 combat-equipped troops, 83 litter patients with their medical supplies or attendants, or up to 68,000 lbs. of freight.

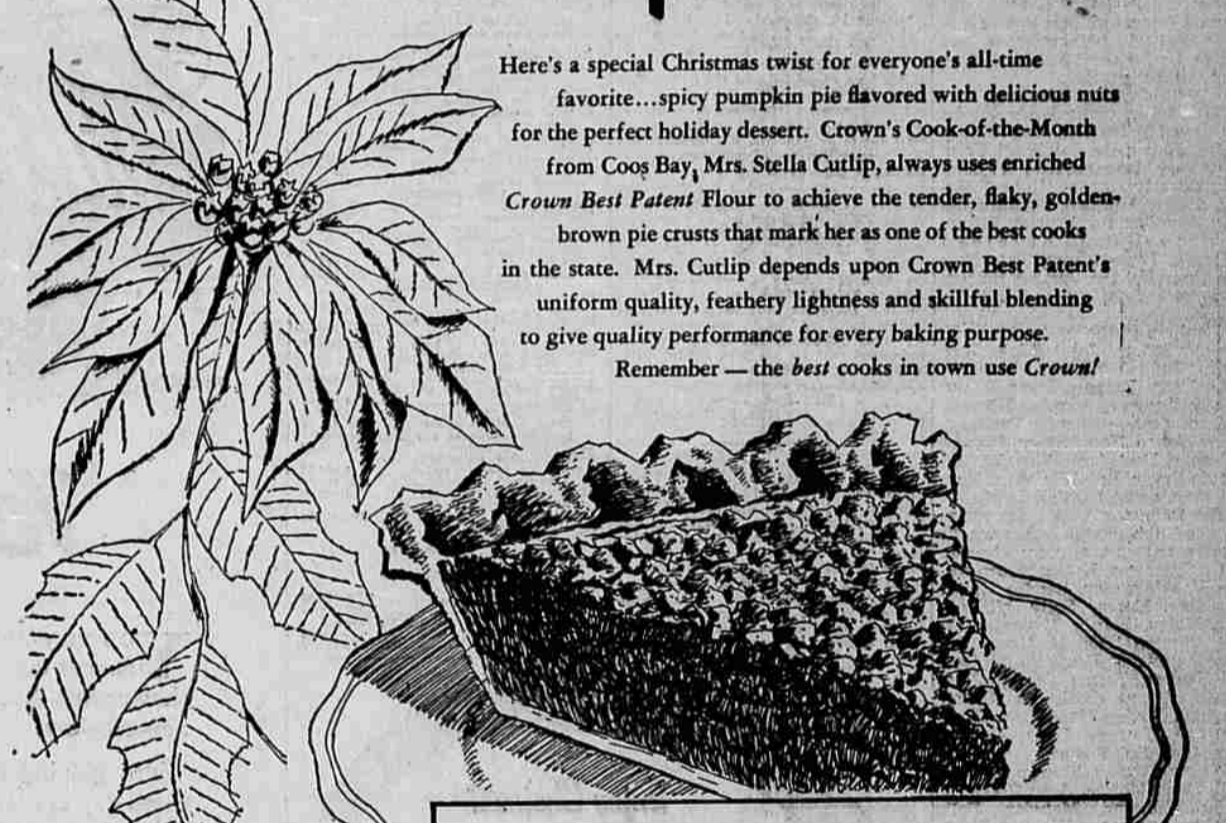

PUMPKIN NUT PIE Celia Lee Tested Recipe PIE CRUST (enough for 2 single crust pies) Mix together: 2 1/4 cups sifted Crown Best Patent Flour, bleached or unbleached, 1/4 teaspoon salt. Cut in: 1/2 cup cold shortening. Add, a few drops at a time: 4 or 5 tablespoons cold water. Toss with fork until particles are slightly moistened. Press into a ball, then divide in half. Roll on lightly floured board or pastry cloth. Fit loosely into 9" pie tin. FILLING (for one 9-inch pie) Mix together: 1 1/2 cups cooked, mashed pumpkin, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice, or a mixture of cinnamon, allspice, cloves, and ginger, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 1/2 cups milk, 2 eggs, beaten. Pour into unbaked pie shell. Gently sprinkle over the top: 1/2 cup finely chopped nuts, 2 tablespoons brown sugar. Bake in a very hot oven (450°) for 15 minutes. Reduce heat to moderate oven (350°) for about 30 minutes more.
