

Chair Lift Now In Operation At Hoodoo Bowl

A chair lift to the top of a high butte that will not only provide a service for skiers, but a Cascade viewpoint for visitors will be placed in operation this week end, at Hoodoo bowl on the Santiam divide.

Constructed by Ed Thurston of the Hoodoo bowl, the chair lift operates on a 4,000 foot long line. The vertical elevation is 1,028 feet, and the lift will take skiers and sightseers to the top of Hoodoo butte, which overlooks the Santiam divide bowl. From the butte top, snow-covered mountains of the mid-Oregon Cascades are visible, with a grandstand view of the Three Sisters, Washington, Three Fingers Jack and Jefferson provided.

Schedule Planned The double chair lift, only one of its type in the northwest, will be placed in operation on Saturday, and will operate through Christmas week, with a week end schedule to follow.

The lift has a carrying capacity of 370 persons per hour. From the top of the butte, ski trails for both experts and novices will be available. Bill Lauderback, operator of the Santiam lodge, reported when in Bend yesterday.

Twenty-six inches of packed snow covered the bowl area yesterday, and skiing was reported good.

Garden Schedules Hoop Contests

New York, Dec. 21 (AP)—A blue-ribbon Madison Square garden doubleheader, which experts are likely to use as a yardstick for measuring several of the nation's top teams, highlights a big college basketball program around the nation tonight.

Each of the four teams in the twin bill is ranked among the top 20 in the nation by the United Press board of coaches. In the opener, 15th-ranked U. C. L. A. meets Long Island university, ranked seventh, and then Oklahoma, ranked 14th, meets City college of New York, rated seventh.

L.I.U. was favored by eight points and C.C.N.Y. by five. Just two nights ago U.C.L.A. held Bradley, ranked second, to a 79-74 triumph. And Oklahoma lost a 53-50 decision to unranked Holy Cross in its last appearance, the Crusaders rebounding from a two-point loss to St. John's. All these past performances will be used to weigh the results of tonight's battles.

Bradley will be in action tonight, too, against Centenary, and Holy Cross will go against Vanderbilt. In another crackerjack game, Southern California plays host to the Oklahoma Aggies, ranked fourth.

College Players Organize Team

College basketball players home for the Christmas holidays have formed a team and are seeking games, it was announced by Wayne Hamilton, director of the Bend recreation department. Hamilton has been asked by the team to serve as its "booking agent."

Five of the boys seeking games are from Bend and one, Paul Thalhofer, is from Prineville. On the team are Bob Hawes and Al Christensen, ex-Lava Bears and now playing with the University of Oregon Frosh; Darrell Hawes, also from the university; Larry Carroll, Willamette university, and Doug Hogland, Oregon State. Thalhofer is a University of Oregon student.

The collegians have already lined up two games. They will play Lapine Saturday night and the Pine Products team of Prineville next Wednesday night. Squads seeking games are being asked to get in touch with Hamilton, who reports that the collegians plan to add about three more players to their squad.

World's Champion Wrestler To Appear Tonight; Haddock Opponent in Non-Title Bout

Andy Tremaine, world's light heavyweight wrestling champion will meet Gentleman Dale Haddock in the feature attraction on tonight's weekly wrestling show at the Bend armory. Promoter Tex Hager reports that he obtained Tremaine's services for tonight's card only after lengthy negotiations. However, he said he thought local fans would agree after watching the champ that his appearance in Bend was well worth the extra effort.

Hager said further that he was presenting Tremaine tonight as a kind of Christmas present to his many loyal Bend wrestling fans.

The bout between Tremaine and Haddock will be a one hour, two out of three falls event. Referee for the affair will be Cowboy Eldred Breese of Prineville.

Won in El Paso Tremaine recently won the world light heavyweight championship from Monty La Due of Canada in a bout in El Paso, Tex., Tremaine's home town. Shortly after this event, he was featured in an article in the Ring magazine.

The new champ is a fast, clever wrestler and is in great demand all over the country. He has won many of his matches with a special hold which he calls a rocking cradle leg split.

His opponent tonight earned the right to the bout by winning a two out of three fall event here last week from Frank Stojack of Tacoma, Wash.

Stojack on Card Stojack and Jack Kiser, popular Portland grappler, will be featured tonight in the semi-final bout. Both men are scientific wrestlers and are expected to give a fast exhibition of clean grappling in their bout tonight.

The pair will wrestle for 45 minutes or the best two out of three falls.

In the special event, Pierre LaBelle, the Frenchman, will tangle with a newcomer to the Bend arena, Sonny Orroke of Spokane, Wash. They will wrestle for one fall in a half hour match.

The first bout on the card will begin at 8:30 o'clock. The card is sponsored under the auspices of Bend's company 1 of the Oregon national guard.

Boxer Suffers Brain Injury

New York, Dec. 21 (AP)—Alfred (Sonny) West, a knocked-out Negro boxer of Washington, D.C., was in "very, very critical" condition today as he fought for his life at St. Clare's hospital after an operation to relieve a blood clot on the brain.

West, 21-year-old lightweight, suffered a violent brain concussion, a brain hemorrhage and a clot when knocked out in the seventh round by brown-skinned Percy Bassett of Philadelphia at St. Nicholas arena last night.

Dr. Vincent Nardello, a New York boxing commission staff physician, said West's condition improved "a little" following the 2½ hour operation but said "we must wait 24 hours until we know what his chances are."

West was still unconscious when the operation was completed at 3 a.m., but Nardello said the hemorrhaging had stopped and there was no sign of paralysis. The trepanning operation was performed by Dr. James T. Daniels, a brain specialist, Nardello, and Dr. Nicholas Devito.

West's head struck the ring floor solidly after a straight right to the chin had smashed him backwards to the canvas. Referee Harry Ebbetts counted him out at 29 seconds of the seventh round. West had not regained consciousness when the operation was performed early today.

West, a sleek, stream-lined youngster who had gone into the ring favored at 9.5, won the first round and broke even in the second. After that he was staggered at least once in every session, although his youth and recuperative powers enabled him to fight back gamely and reassuringly.

At the end of the fifth round, he complained that his left eye pained him. He thought he had been thumbed. Dr. Nardello climbed into the ring and examined the eye. He permitted the fight to continue. Even at the time of the knockout, West did not seem in serious trouble.

U.S.C. Hunting For New Coach; Cravath Resigns

By Alex Kahn (United Press Sports Writer) Los Angeles, Dec. 21 (AP)—University of Southern California for the first time since 1926 today engaged in a nationwide search for a head football coach to replace Jeff Cravath, who resigned under fire yesterday.

The last time Southern California went hunting for a coach was when it hired the late Howard Jones. He reigned at Southern California until his death in 1941 when the late Sam Barry took over temporarily.

Cravath, chosen in 1942 when Barry went into the navy, was a wartime selection and there were no other major candidates under consideration when he left San Francisco university to take over at his alma mater.

Names Listed Within a few hours after Cravath handed in his resignation at noon yesterday rumors began circulating that the university was eyeing Paul Brown of the Cleveland Browns, Bud Wilkinson of Oklahoma, Frank Howard of Kentucky, Paul Bryant of Tennessee, Athletic director Fritz Crisler of Michigan and deposed Minnesota coach Bernie Bierman.

Director of athletics Willis O. Hunter was given the job of making a survey of available coaches or those who might make themselves available if approached.

Hunter will submit his recommendation to the faculty athletic committee which in turn will make the appointment.

Cravath lost his job because this season for the first time in nine years his team won less than half its games, capturing only two victories.

Cravath did not appear downcast when he announced his resignation after conferring with President Fagg. Unconfirmed reports said he was receiving a \$30,000 settlement on his two-year contract.

Grizzlies Victorious At Missoula, Mont., the Montana Grizzlies held off a last minute rally to nip Eastern Washington, 56 to 55.

The Grizzlies had an easy time in the first half and most of the second.

At Los Angeles, Cal Poly of San Luis Obispo defeated Santa Barbara college, 50 to 40, in the semi-finals of the California state game tourney. In the other championship playoff, Los Angeles State downed Sacramento State, 62 to 52.

Barnstorming Chico State belted Whittier, 53 to 49, at Whittier, Calif., and College of Puget Sound won from Whitman college, 35 to 34, in a game played at Tacoma, Wash.

HE WAS INVITED Butte, Mont. (AP)—Sixty-six-year-old Edward Dash will be watching parades from now on, instead of leading them.

Dash grabbed a baton from a drum majorette and started to lead the twirling corps in a pre-game parade. He tried that and slipped back into the band, where he seized several drum sticks and began to make music.

Judge John Selon told Dash: "Parade if you want, but choose companions your own age." He then fined the miner \$10, which was suspended. Dash explained the girls had invited him to parade with them.

Sport Parade

New York, Dec. 21 (AP)—Scenting a possible giveaway of the welterweight title he has sought so long, an indignant Kid Gavilan insisted today that he would claim the championship if Sugar Ray Robinson fought anyone else.

Gavilan, who tomorrow night fights rangey Joe Miceli, was more perturbed over the possible welterweight machinations than he was about his bout with the latest threat to his role as heir apparent of the 147-pounders.

It is dubious, at the moment, whether Sugar Ray ever will defend the welterweight crown again. Doctors have warned him against trying to make the weight too often, fearing that he may suffer the tubercular fate of the late Joe Gans.

To Fight LaMotta Robinson therefore is seeking the middleweight diadem held by Jake LaMotta, and they are slated to square off at Chicago on Feb. 14. But Robinson won't give up the welterweight title until he is certain of a shot at LaMotta, and the Bronx bull is a noted run-out artist—particularly when the outcome of a fight is in doubt, which it would be for him if he met the Harlem dynamiter.

So the word is that Robinson, despite doctors' warnings, may put his championship on the line against Bobby Dykes in Florida. This is the same Dykes that Robinson had so much trouble carrying for 10 rounds in Chicago recently. It was a nice gesture, as Sugar Ray did an off-to-Buffalo buck and wing and fenced with a backhanded left jab, to keep from flattening the youngster.

"How does Dykes rate a title fight?" Gavilan demands. It is quite a question.

Logical Contender The Cuban hawk has had two fights with Robinson, one for the title, and lost them both by decision. Maybe the time isn't ripe for another, but he is the National Boxing association's number one contender and any challenger should have to get by him first.

"If Robinson steps down, I'll fight anybody the boxing commission or the N.B.A. names for the title," the kid declared.

But Robinson, while he is the wealthiest active fighter in the ring today, still is the most determined dollar chaser of the lot. "The title is money in the bank to me," he said when he was urged to give up the crown because of weight-making difficulties. "I won't give it up."

Huskies Outrun Pittsburgh, Win By Score of 74-55

If any members of the University of Washington basketball team were recruited for the track squad today, a quintet of cagers from the Pittsburgh Panthers would be able to understand why.

The Huskies raced Pitt into submission last night for the second time within 10 days and sped to their sixth victory, 74 to 55.

Washington used its typical fast break against Panther defenses and shot into a 29 to 16 halftime lead. The winners forced Pitt out of its zone defense in the second period when Husky shots plopped through the basket from outside the circle.

Forward Frank Guinness sank 19 points for Washington. Pittsburgh's Bob Yerko had 17, all but two of them coming in the second half.

California Wins At Berkeley, Calif., the University of California Bears trounced the Baylor Bears, 86 to 40.

Cal controlled the backboard and hit 37 out of 79 shots, while its shifting man-to-man defense held the Texans to five field goals in the first half. Cal led at the intermission, 41 to 13.

The Gonzaga university Bulldogs broke a six-game losing streak at Spokane, Wash., and whipped a tired Colorado A&M five, 71 to 57. Gonzaga center Harold Van Riper poured in 18 points to nab high-scoring honors.

Aggie forward Glendon Anderson made 17 and Bulldog forward Nick Puhlich hit for 16 points. Colorado led until the last 10 minutes.
