Magnuson Plans Authority Bill

Washington, Jan. 4 (AP)—Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D., Wash., said today he plans to reintroduce in the new congress a bill to authorize a Columbia valley administration. He said he is considering "some suggested changes" in the controversial measure. He did not disclose them. The CVA bill before the last congress called for appointment by the president of a single-agency development of Columbia basin water resources. "The bill will be introduced again," Magnuson said, "but with the understanding that no action will be taken by the committee on public works until full public hearings have been held in the field." Such hearings were planned tentatively last year, but were cancelled when congress returned for a post-election session to consider emergency legislation related to Korea.
