Ceilings On Cars

All dealers' prices on new and used cars were frozen last month, along with most other products, at the highest price the dealer had charged between Dec. 19, 1950 and Jan. 5, 1951.

However, when the factory price increases announced Dec. 1, were rolled back on Dec. 18, some dealers ignored the rollback and used the higher factory price as their ceiling. And some continued the practice of charging higher than new prices for "new-used" cars. Both groups will have to cancel those increases starting March 2.

Individuals Not Hit
Individual car owners were not covered by the Jan. 25 freeze. But beginning March 2, they also are forbidden to buy, sell or trade in used cars for more than the ceiling price.

The official price-guide books which must be used to determine used car ceilings are: The National Automobile Dealers association official used car guide; the red book national used car market report; the blue book national used car market report; the Wisconsin automotive valuation guide (which may be used only by sellers in Wisconsin); and the Kelley blue book (usable only in Arizona, California, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Utah and Washington).

Every used car dealer must file with the nearest price control district office in writing by March 2 showing the official guide he is using. If he has not customarily used any of the five listed guides, he must select one of them as the basis for his ceiling prices.

tossed out, then small dairymen as well as big could sell grade A milk, since quotas would be abolished, sponsors say.

Over in the senate, a bill was passed with one lone dissenting vote to tighten Oregon's corrupt practices act. The measure, introduced by Sen. Richard L. Neuberger of Portland after consultation with Dave O'Hara, head of the state elections bureau, would require candidates to list true names and addresses and the real amount of contributions of each person contributing to a campaign.

Sen. Frank Hilton of Portland, sole opponent of the measure, said he thought the matter was already covered by laws now on the books.

Sen. Neuberger replied that O'Hara "who knows more about our election laws than any other man in Oregon" can find no authority under the present laws to get the true and full names and addresses of contributors. As illustration, Sen. Neuberger said that in the last primary, one contributor to an Oregon candidate was listed only as F. E. Efficenger. Subsequent "sleuthing by reports" showed he was from Minneapolis, and not from any Oregon city.

Bottlers Benefit
A bill which would allow milk bottlers to obtain licenses to use their machinery to bottle carbonated beverages was passed by the house and sent to the senate.

The measure was opposed by Rep. Kenneth Kraemer of Portland because, he said, it "would put dairymen in a better competitive position than regular bottlers of carbonated water."

Other House-approved bills sent to the Senate would raise from \$6 to \$12 the cost of obtaining a jury trial in district courts; and would return to the state general fund \$2,600 appropriated many years ago for hydro-electric development.

ers could smash an enemy's industrial plants, "some" ground troops would be needed to engage enemy forces and require them to use up accumulated supplies.

Lemay, World War II bomber hero of both the European and Pacific theaters, stepped into a red hot congressional debate over whether this country should contribute ground troops to the international command. The administration now plans to send 100,000 more troops to Europe.

The stocky general parried some questions on grounds they should be answered by higher authority. But for the most part he gave direct answers.

Sen. Kenneth S. Wherry, R., Neb., called Lemay in support of arguments that the United States should concentrate on building up air—not ground—strength.

Limitations Opposed

But the general opposed proposals to withhold ground troops from Europe pending establishment of a policy by congress. He also objected to demands—voiced by Sen. Robert A. Taft, R., O., and others—for specific limitations on the number of U. S. forces committed to Europe.

"I don't believe you should tie the hands of the military leaders," Lemay said.

As of now, Lemay testified,

the United States does not have enough strategic bombers. But the new 95-group air force program, "if properly supported," should prove an ample number, he added.

Foreign relations chairman Tom Connally, D., Tex., asked Lemay if he thought that air forces could do the defense job alone.

"No reliable military man would make such a statement," Lemay replied.

"I favor sending troops to Europe, providing they are for defensive purposes," Lemay said, adding that he sees such troops as a "holding force" in event of an attack.

Bombing Important

Lemay said he agrees with Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg, air chief of staff, that ground troops should be sent to Europe and that congress should not limit their number.

Wherry asked if Lemay's long-range bombing command could "pulverize" Russia and beat the Soviets into submission.

Lemay said "I don't know" but added that in event of war, "it's my job to try to accomplish that end."

Lemay said that to accomplish such an end would require more strategic bombing strength than is now available. He went on to say that war "should be avoided if possible" because "nobody should fight unless they are ready."

Before the senate acts on the troops-for-Europe issue, republic-

can leaders want more precise cost estimates. But Connally contends defense plans are "so urgent" they should not be delayed by such details.
