

Public Offices
Close Tomorrow

Bend will observe Washington's birthday tomorrow as a semi-holiday, with most public offices closed, but with stores and other business firms open.

City, county and federal offices will be closed. The federal offices include the post office and the U. S. forest service office. The state office on South Third street will be closed.

One of Bend's two banks, the United States national, will be closed for the day, but the First National bank will be open.

Because more than half the downtown business houses will be open for business, meters will be in operation throughout the day. It was announced from the city hall.

There will be no general observance of Washington's birthday in the Bend schools, but there will be observance in classes and rooms.

The occasion will not be a holiday for members of The Bulletin staff and a paper will be issued.

Legionnaires have requested business houses to fly their street flags tomorrow.

Extension Units
To Learn Rug Art

Prineville, Feb. 21 — Miss Rebecca Johnston, home demonstration agent for Crook county, announced yesterday that Mrs. Myrtle Carter, home furnishing specialist of the state extension service, has been here to train project leaders for conducting community workshops in the making of hooked rugs.

Miss Johnston reports that a keen interest has been shown this month in a project on the care and simple repair of electrical equipment. Homemakers at these sessions have received instruction on how to detect in equipment defects which might cause fire hazards. The project has been presented to units of seven districts of the county. It will be presented at Post Tuesday of next week and at Fife on Wednesday.

In Car Accident

Mrs. Loren Wolfe of Willmar, Minn., is at St. Charles hospital being treated for injuries suffered Tuesday afternoon near Brothers, when the car in which she was riding with her husband left the central Oregon highway and overturned. Mrs. Wolfe's hurts included cuts about the head and face, according to hospital attendants, who said that her condition is not serious.

Wolfe, who was driving, was not injured. He was able to drive his car on in to Bend, although it was extensively damaged. The windshield glass was shattered.

Mr. and Mrs. Wolfe were en route to Kelso, Wash., to visit Mrs. Wolfe's mother.

Wolfe told hospital attendants that he lost control of the car on a rutted section of the highway, while driving in snow and sleet.

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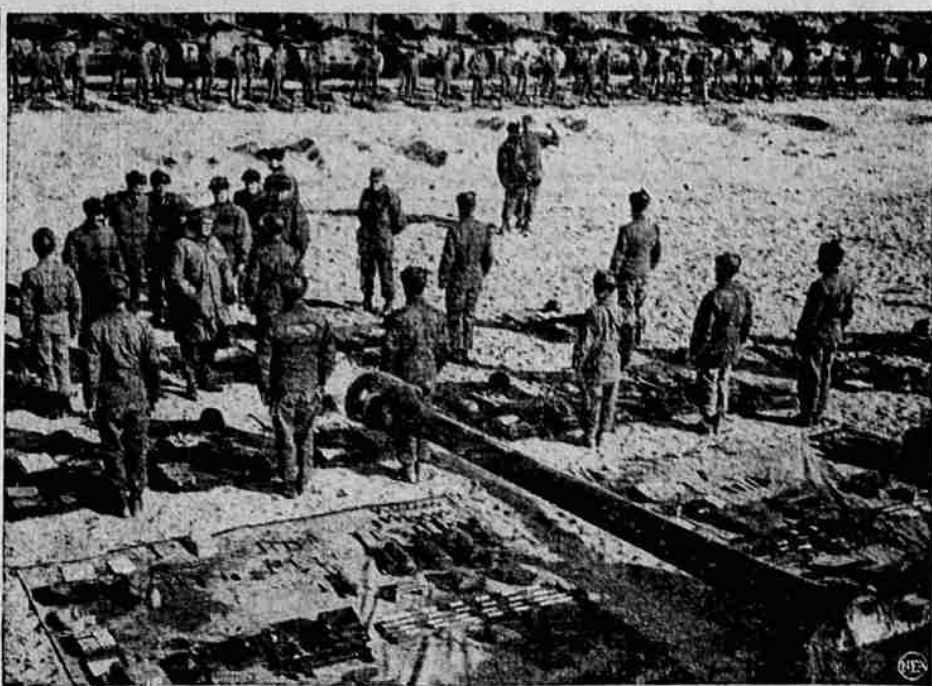

Shasta Power
Line Ready Soon

Portland, Feb. 21 (UP)—A 220-kilovolt transmission line from Shasta dam, Calif., to connect with facilities of the Bonneville power administration will be ready for service by Nov. 1, 1952, according to Secretary of Interior Oscar L. Chapman.

Paul J. Raver, Bonneville power administrator, yesterday read a telegram from the cabinet officer to Washington state Senator Edward E. Henry to the Columbia basin interagency committee. Chapman said, "The interconnection is to be made by the bureau of reclamation, from Shasta dam north to Klamath Falls, Ore., where it will be connected with the facilities of the BPA being constructed to serve the southern Oregon area."

"Defense" Held Reason

"The interests of national defense" were given as the reason for the move, which had been strongly opposed by Washington state legislators.

The secretary pointed out that 100,000 kilowatts of power for northwest aluminum plants now served on an interruptible basis would be assured by the connection. He added that this would permit "40,000,000 pounds of more of aluminum production which could not otherwise be produced in event of adverse water conditions in the Pacific northwest."

He explained that steam-generated California power would be sent northward during dry periods in the northwest, while surplus BPA power could be sent southward during heavy runoff, saving oil normally used to generate power in California.

Korean Village Recaptured
But Little Remains Intact

Chuchon, Korea, Feb. 21 (UP)—This east-central Korean village was an abandoned, flaming shambles when Negro rangers and tank-riding G.I.s captured it for the third time in the war.

Once a prosperous farming community by Korean standards, Chuchon had been empty of enemy troops all along. And only a handful of civilians were left there.

But the pilots in the Shooting Star jets and Corsair dive bombers didn't know that. They hurled rockets and searing napalm on the innocent hamlet.

American artillerymen far behind the lines didn't know that the reds had pulled out either. They helped blast the area to ruins.

Occupation Watched

I watched the occupation yesterday from the shadow of a Shin-shrine atop a hunchbacked hill overlooking the town and the Chuchon river valley. It was like a front-row seat at a horror movie.

Billows of angry smoke puffed up from the town and shrouded the valley. Orange flames licked hungrily at the thatched-roofed houses. The center of the town was leveled.

The only thing resembling enemy activity was an exploding ammunition dump.

The war planes riddled everything in sight. They either didn't see or ignored white flags waved by three scared civilians standing in the open. Bullets kicked up dirt at their feet. Almost miraculously they escaped unharmed.

When the air and artillery had finished, Negro rangers plunged waist-deep into the icy, bridgeless Chuchon river. Big tanks wallowed through the stream behind them.
