REBUILDING STARTED
Prineville, April 21.—Machinery at the Pine creek sawmill of the Midstate Lumber Co., which burned last week, was not damaged, and rebuilding of the equipment has been started in the local plant of the Prineville Machine & Supply company. It was reported yesterday by Lee Bertram, manager.

The local headquarters office of the company, which operates sawmills at Mitchell and Spray, reported yesterday that work of rebuilding the structure, which housed the Pine creek mill, located in Wheeler county, has been started, and that resumption of the 10-man crew mill there would probably begin next week.

Concrete Slabs Fall; Four Dead

Decatur, Ga., April 21 (AP)—At least four men were killed today when large concrete floor slabs of a building under construction fell upon a group of workers, police reported.

Fellow workmen bent to the task of lifting off the heavy slabs, 16 by four feet, to remove the bodies and search for other men who may have been buried.

Ralph Turner, of the A. S. Turner funeral home in this suburb of Atlanta, said his ambulance brought in the bodies of the three men and that two others were taken to Emory University hospital.

"The victims had bad head and chest injuries," Turner said, "but they were not badly crushed."

He said that work on the Kraft Products Co. plant on Industrial way had progressed to the point of laying concrete slabs to form the second floor, resting them on reinforced concrete pillars rising from the ground level.

One of the pillars apparently collapsed, Turner said, and about eight of the large slabs fell down on the workmen.

Emory announced that one of the men, identified as Thomas H. Ballard, was dead on arrival and that James A. Cook was rushed to the emergency clinic for treatment. No condition report on him was available.

The men were electrical workers employed by the Fischbach and Moore Construction Co. of Atlanta.

J. H. Fruechtel, general superintendent for the Kraft Co. here said that the weight of concrete was estimated at 84 tons.

The board will handle disputes which were not resolved by collective bargaining and by conciliation and mediation facilities, where the parties agree to submit the dispute to the board or where the president decides that the dispute substantially affects national defense.

The executive order gave its authority to recommend to the White House methods of settling such disputes. In cases where the parties agree to be bound by the board's decision, its recommendations would be binding.

\$16,000 Salary
Taylor, former chairman of the World War II labor board, will be paid \$16,000 a year as chairman of the new board.

David L. Cole, veteran mediator is expected to be named vice chairman. He and other members will receive \$15,000 a year.

The others who will serve with Taylor already have been chosen, but the White House is waiting word on their acceptance. Their names probably will be announced Monday.

The board faces a backlog of labor contracts which have been piling up since the old board collapsed.

These include agreements in meat packing, shipbuilding and other industries which granted pay increases which have not been paid, pending a ruling on their legality.

The former wage board of three spokesmen each of industry, labor and the public voted the 10 per cent limit on pay hikes Feb. 16. This action resulted in labor's withdrawal from the wage board and all other mobilization agencies.

Mr. Truman already has named George W. Taylor, University of Pennsylvania professor, to be chairman of the new board. Cyrus S. Ching, chairman of the first panel, resigned to return to his post as director of the federal mediation and conciliation service.

The new board would have jurisdiction over all types of industrial disputes, as demanded by labor leaders. Industry had opposed this, insisting that the panel have authority only over economic issues.

Meanwhile, 200,000 General Electric employees looked forward to nine-cent hourly wage increase, granted through a cost-of-living clause.

The bureau of labor statistics reported yesterday that the consumers' price index rose four-tenths of one per cent during the month ending March 13. It put the cost of living at a new all-time high, 184.5 per cent above the 1935-39 average.

The cost of living jump qualified 70,000 GE workers for the nine-cent raise, but the company promptly announced it would give the increase to all its employees. Company officials said, however,

that they would wait for approval from the new wage board.

The record-high index stood at 84 per cent over the pre-Korean level and 9.6 per cent over that of one year ago. Miscellaneous goods and services showed the sharpest jump over the period—seven-tenths of one per cent. Food prices were up one tenth of a one per cent.

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Deschutes Jury Favors Holt

A verdict was returned in favor of the plaintiff yesterday afternoon in the jury trial of Arthur Holt versus Goldie Nelson in Judge Ralph S. Hamilton's Deschutes county circuit court.

Holt, the plaintiff, had requested the return of certain personal property of his which he alleged was being held unlawfully by the defendant. In its verdict, the jury stated that it had found that the plaintiff "is entitled to immediate and exclusive possession of the personal property described in the plaintiff's complaint, and in case possession thereof cannot be had, then for its value in the sum of \$585.20."

The property listed in the complaint included an electric stove, a hot water heater, an oil heater, several lighting fixtures, a glass shelf, a set of bathroom accessories, 10 phonograph records, a claw hammer, a ladder, two waste baskets and a coffee pot.

According to the plaintiff, the property was purchased with his money when he and the defendant were contemplating marriage. Shortly after the property was purchased, the defendant remarried her former husband, Glenn Nelson.
