Phonevision Big Success, Report

Chicago, May 21 (UP)—Phonevision, the television device that permits a subscriber to see top-flight movies on his TV set by calling the telephone company and paying a dollar per movie, was successful "beyond our expectations," E. F. McDonald, president of Zenith Radio Corp., said today.

Phonevision was tried on an experimental basis with 300 selected "average" families in the Chicago area.

A jumble of sound and waveling lines greeted regular viewers who tuned in on the channel. Subscribers had a device which automatically was cleared for transmission of the movies by the telephone company when a subscriber indicated that he wanted to see a picture.

McDonald said that the "take" for the three month period was \$6,750, which figured to about \$22.50 per family.

Big Potential
The potential, said McDonald, would be about \$1,250,000 net figure on an audience of 10,000,000 set owners.

The 300 families that participated in the test saw movies at such a high rate, said McDonald, that it "astounded our optimists and astonished our critics." McDonald figured that about 3 1/2 times that considered normal for movie theaters.

Final interpretation of the results of the test is underway, he said, but the average rate of viewing ranged from 2.1 movies per week to 1.5. The high figure was for the first month when the novelty of the test was a definite factor, McDonald said.

forcement agents to make it stick. DiSalle said that meat controls are the heart of his program and that without them "the whole stabilization program would be wrecked."

Expects Support
He seemed confident the general public would rally behind him, particularly when price reductions on beef reach the retail level in a few months.

DiSalle said the rollback would not cause meat rationing, and he ruled out any kind of consumer rationing for the next three months.

Asked if there would be less meat under the rollback order, DiSalle said not unless cattle raisers "withhold" their steers from the market. In that case, he said, he will ask the public to bear with the order for a while. DiSalle said he would not repeal the order should cattle be withheld by producers.

The possibility of fewer cattle going to market was foreseen in Chicago by P. O. Wilson, president of the National Livestock Producers association. He denied that producers would start a "seller's strike," but said many would adopt a wait-and-see attitude about the situation.

Today's rollback will relieve the slaughterers, packers and beef dealers who have been squeezed since last January between rising cattle costs and their own frozen prices. The housewife won't get anything out of it. But if congress doesn't kill the program first, she will find retail beef prices down 4 to 5 cents a pound on Aug. 1 and down another 4 or 5 cents on Oct. 1. On those dates, two more rollbacks of 4 1/2 per cent each are scheduled to go into effect all the way from the ranch to the dinner table.

Claims Challenged
DiSalle challenged the claims of cattlemen and meat packers that many of them will be forced out of business by his rollbacks and that the end result will be to drive beef out of the butcher shop and into the black market. He asserted that his price ceilings are "fair" to the industry and the public, and he pointed out that beef on the hoof right now is selling at 152 per cent of parity.

"Any program so far-reaching is bound to take a while for the public to understand and is bound to cause some vexations and temporary inconveniences, but we ask everyone to take a fair-minded approach to it," he said.

"After all, the little things we must do here at home don't seem like very much when you compare them with the sacrifices being made by the soldiers in Korea."

DiSalle said he has the "100 per cent support" of President Truman on the beef issue, and all signs were that he would need it.

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Portland Electric Representatives To Visit Area

Madras, May 21—John T. Chinnoek, president of the Madras chamber of commerce, reported Saturday that General Thomas M. Robins, consulting engineer, and Waldemar Seton, vice-president of the Portland General Electric company, will arrive in central Oregon Tuesday and remain in the area until Thursday evening to confer with interests at chief points in a promotion of plans to gain a permit for building a dam on the Deschutes river near the Pelton site, just east of Madras.

It had been planned that the two men would appear at the Prineville-Crook County chamber of commerce luncheon Tuesday. Chinnoek said, however, they will arrive in central Oregon too late for that meeting. The men will be present Tuesday evening at Sisters, at the May dinner meeting of the Central Oregon chamber of commerce.

Chinnoek announced the remainder of the schedule for the visiting power company men as follows: Wednesday afternoon, meeting with the county of Crook and the Warm Springs Indian reservation; Wednesday night, conference with various commercial and service groups at Bend; Thursday noon, meeting with Redmond interests, and Thursday night, a mass meeting, to which all central Oregonians have been invited, at the Jefferson county court house.

Russian Treaty Plans Rejected In American Note

Washington, May 21 (UP)—The door was left open today for Russia to join in the writing of a Japanese peace treaty, but the United States made clear Russia had better come up with better terms.

In a 4,000 word American note published last night, the state department bluntly rejected as unworkable the latest Russian proposals for a Japanese treaty. It said the soviet demands were aimed at delay and not speedy completion of a treaty.

The note also charged that Russia was "conniving at aggression" by attempting to write a treaty which would draw Japan the right of collective self defense.

Point by point, the state department turned down Russian proposals that communist China help write the treaty; that Formosa be given to red China, and that American troops be completely withdrawn from Japan.

At the same time, the note said that "the United States stands ready to resume prompt and intensive diplomatic discussions" with Russia "under circumstances that will be calculated to advance a just treaty to a speedy conclusion."

They appealed the issue to the high bench after losing in two lower federal courts. They were supported by the justice department.

The high court with Justice William O. Douglas writing the majority opinion, agreed with the Schwegmann's.

MAY HIT OREGON
Portland, May 21 (UP)—Oregon's 1937 fair trade act may be wiped out by today's U. S. supreme court ruling that retailers are not bound by price fixing agreements they have not signed.

The act is known as the "anti-price discrimination" law, and provides that a manufacturer can set a minimum price below which a retailer cannot sell.

There was no certainty what effect the supreme court decision would have on the cigarette fair trade act, passed by the 1951 session of the legislature.

The cigarette law provides that the retailer cannot sell below cost plus the cost of doing business, making a legal difference between the cigarette law and the 1937 act.

Can Pay Interest
Seufert indicated the district will be able to remain in business until at least July 1 of this year because sufficient funds have been set aside to pay the bond interest of \$5,625 due on that date.

The board president disclosed the PUD's attorney, Ray Kell of Portland, was negotiating with the state tax commission to reduce the assessed valuation of the district. The district has not paid any real property taxes owed Wasco county, tax records show, although one-half this tax, 4,430.46 was listed in the PUD records as payable during the first half of the 1950-51 fiscal year.

George Flagg, state public utilities commissioner, on July 11, 1949, granted the request of Pacific Power and Light company to lower its rates to meet competition of the PUD.

McCarthy's List Of Hiss Backers Remains Secret

Washington, May 21 (UP)—Two senators are on Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy's secret list of contributors to Alger Hiss' defense fund, it was learned today.

The Wisconsin republican declined to identify the two. It was also learned that several state department officials, as well as some present and former house members are also on the list.

Hiss, a former top-flight state department official, is now serving a five-year prison term for perjury. He was convicted last year for denying that he ever slipped confidential government documents to Whittaker Chambers, confessed communist spy courier.

Hiss' two trials—the first ended in a hung jury—climaxed years of congressional agitation about communists in government.

Drive Recalled
McCarthy himself sparked another anti-administration drive last year by charging repeatedly that the state department is infested with reds.

McCarthy some time ago obtained from unknown sources a list of persons who contributed funds to the Hiss defense. He has declined to say how many individuals are on the list, but he has conceded that the contributions amount to a "sizeable sum."

Since then, he has been screening the list in an effort to weed out those on the list who were pressured into contributing and those who contributed only to Hiss' first trial.

He has contended that there must be a distinction between those who contributed to the first trial and those who contributed after the evidence against Hiss became public knowledge.

McCarthy was reported to be ready to excuse those who donated to the Hiss fund in return for assurances that their donations would put them in good graces of the state department.

Screening in Progress
It was understood that McCarthy would refuse to make the list public until he has completed this "screening" process and had cleared its release with his sources. He declined to say who these sources are.

When—or if—the list is made public, it is almost certain to provoke a re-opening of the McCarthy-vs.-State department feud that became a political issue in the 1950 elections.

It appeared likely that the list would also figure in the new investigation of communists in government now being conducted
