Federal Jobholders Growing In Number, Survey Discloses

Washington, June 21 (UP) — The number of federal jobholders, outside the military departments, is the highest in history—about 1,250,000 persons.

Civilian employment in the military departments, an estimated 1,265,000, is only half the world war II peak but is growing by leaps and bounds.

The total number of people on the federal payroll is 1,200,000 less than at the wartime peak, but the payroll itself has soared beyond the war peak of \$3,300,000,000.

The year since the Korean war started has seen federal employment go up by more than 500,000 jobs.

These facts add up to a mushrooming civilian employment that now stands at more than 2,500,000. And most U. S. budget experts expect it to reach 3,000,000 by July 1, 1952.

Many Work for Uncle Sam
Three million civilian employees would mean that about one in every 20 wage earners in the nation was holding a job with Uncle Sam.

All of these figures excluding the uniformed personnel of the armed forces. They also exclude the millions who receive some income from the federal government in the form of pensions, social security payments or other benefits.

World war II federal employment reached 3,770,000 — but that was in mid-1945 when the nation had 12,000,000 men under arms and was living under a rigidly-controlled economy.

Parallels Seen
The current build-up in the government's civilian force parallels the mobilization of 3,500,000 men in uniform and limited home-front controls.

Congress now has its axes whetted for the personnel budgets of all non-defense agencies.

A 10 percent cut in personnel

budgets of six federal agencies which was voted overwhelmingly by the senate last week probably set the pattern. The house has approved more drastic cuts for many departments.

So far, emergency defense budgets have gone through congress with its request for funds to hire 440,000 more workers in the defense department is likely to get close scrutiny.

Despite the economy drive, however, most budget experts think spending for federal workers' pay is likely to hit \$11,000,000,000 by a year from now. Hiring for government defense jobs seems certain to outstrip the job cuts. Only a drastic change in

mobilization plans could alter the trend.
