

Bend Guardsmen Return Home This Week End

Fort Lewis, Wash., June 21 (Special)—Ending two weeks of hard training, routine of which was broken by the 41st infantry division parade on Saturday, June 16, in which some 6,000 men took part, Co. I of the 162nd infantry will return to its home base at Bend, Oregon, this week end. The Bend infantry unit reached Fort Lewis on June 9, and during the first week of camp, all men qualified with their basic arms and crew-served weapons. These arms included rifles, carbines, pistols, machine guns, mortars, rocket launchers and the new 37 MM recoilless rifle.

Instructions Given
In addition to weapons training, there was instruction in radio, supply, administration and mess. This week, Co. I, with other infantry units, is in the field, for training in conjunction with battalion, regiment and division tactics in offense and defense. This is the largest maneuver held by the division since reorganization after world war II.

A highlight of "camp life," so far as men of Co. I were concerned, was the presentation of SFC Ralph G. Graham of the Jack S. Davis trophy at the outstanding guardsman of Co. I this past year. Sgt. Graham has attended nine summer encampments, with the original and present Co. I organizations.

First Lt. Jack W. Perry and Sec. Lt. William J. Overman, company officers, have announced that the unit will return to Bend on Saturday, June 23, by Trailways bus. Arrival time is not known.

Students Work In Ochoco Forest

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Camp White Set For Construction

Washington, June 21 (AP)—The army said today that the new military construction authorization bill includes requests for eight inactive army installations. They are: Camp White, Oregon; Camps Bowie and Swift, Texas; Camps Shelby and McCain, Mississippi; Camp Gruber, Oklahoma; Camp Joseph T. Robinson, Arkansas, and Camp Blanding, Florida.

When the camps are reopened, the army said, they will be used

as infantry training areas and replacement training centers. "No indication can be given at this time as to when any of these installations may be reactivated," the army said.

The air force said the bill includes 18 air bases to be reopened or municipal airfields to be taken over partly or wholly.

Oregon Income Taxes Increase

Salem, June 21 (AP)—After getting off to a slow start, state income tax collections zoomed in April and May this year to put the state ahead during the first 11 months of the 1950-51 biennium over the similar period of the previous biennium.

Income tax collections in April and May exceeded those of the

two months a year ago by more than six million dollars. That brought collections for the first 11 months of the current biennium to \$48,900,000, compared with \$45,700,000 during the first 11 months of the previous biennium.

Expect Leveling Off
Tax commission officials said it was probable the upswing would continue until the end of the biennium, June 30. But they were not so optimistic about the next biennium. They said expected higher federal income taxes—except for state taxing—and more rigid wage controls might mean

a leveling off of state income tax returns.

That means, officials around the capitol said, that with use of a 32 million dollar surplus in the state treasury, there will be no difficulty to meeting budget demands and other obligations of the state for the present. But they expressed fear that the state may face a deficit problem by the time the 1953 legislature meets, of 40 to 60 million dollars.

In anticipation of a deficit, the 1951 legislature enacted a cigarette tax of three cents a pack, but a preliminary petition has been filed to refer the matter to the

voters at the 1952 general election. That holds up the tax until the matter is settled. A cigarette tax proposal has been rejected by Oregon voters four times.

Police later arrested Albert G. Valle, 31, of Portland, on charges of negligent homicide and hit-and-run driving in connection with the accident.

Stults was Portland's 20th traffic victim this year and the seventh this month.
