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foresters who have operated nurseries for more than a century, is president of the national association of nurserymen in Germany.

German Like Fir - The visiting foresters said they were particularly interested in Oregon's majestic Douglas fir. Transplanted, this type of tree flourishes in Germany, and in 50 years makes as much growth as pines or spruce make in a century, the foresters said.

There is a critical shortage of wood in Germany, for new homes. This home shortage was attributed to the influx of Germans from the Russian occupied zone.

"Is there a fear of war in Germany?" Dr. Strehlke was asked. He said there is a great fear. "I live only some 10 miles from that line that slashes through the world," he said, referring to the western soviet frontier.

Progress Made - But despite the fear of invasion from the east, that part of Germany occupied by the allies has seen great progress in the past year, the visitors reported. "If the Americans and English had not helped us after the war, we would have starved," Dr. Strehlke declared.

The men posed for a picture on the green lawn of the Bend post-office building, in the shade of a leafy tree. "This is a beautiful country," Pein commented.

Yesterday morning, the Germans visited the Brooks-Scanlon, Inc., plant and were guided by Don Williams. Both men spoke English, with some difficulty, but used their native language in carrying on a fluent conversation with Hans Millius, Brooks-Scanlon forester.

Nursery Visited - They visited the Bend pine nursery and the Pringle falls experiment station. Their guides yesterday were Charles Rindt, chief of planting in the Pacific northwest; Walter A. Engstrom, nurseryman in charge of the Bend pine nursery, and James Sowder of the Pringle falls experiment station.

The German foresters came here from the Lake states, and will go south to California. They plan to be present for the dedication of the Schenk redwood forest. Pein is a son-in-law of Dr. Schenk, a German forester whose work has won world-wide attention.

Uniform Time System Favored By AFL Delegates

Klamath Falls, June 21 (UP)—Delegates to the Oregon state federation of labor convention here favor a uniform time system for the country but they refuse to support a federal bill that would make daylight saving time nationwide.

The delegates yesterday voted down, 153 to 76, a proposal to back the federal bill.

Secretary James T. Marr asserted that the federation always had been opposed to daylight time. Communications and transportation union delegates spoke in favor of the measure.

McClure Speaks - State grange master Elmer McClure told the convention that the state faces the problems of feeding 500,000 more persons which he predicted the Willamette valley would add in the next 25 years. He said more intensive farming would be required to meet the need. This, he declared, would mean more machinery, fertilizer and labor. He also said water use must be studied because it will take irrigation to produce the food.

The convention approved recommendations for relaxing building and credit controls to stimulate building without interference with the defense effort. Delegates also called for restoration of full low rent and defense housing program.

Reconstruction of a bridge over the Lewis & Clark river, which is costing the state highway commission \$30,000, was slapped by the convention. The delegates favor limiting the commission to \$10,000 without calling for bids.

would lend the bank its coin counting machine, was taken under advisement. Cuthbertson said the city's parking meter take now runs around \$30,000 a year. Police officers now do the counting and wrapping.

The first reading was given an ordinance, halving the license fee for Bend bowling alleys. C. H. Barrell had protested, at a previous meeting, that the city tax was higher than the average in Oregon. The present license fee is \$2 per alley per month.

Road Betterment Asked - A. E. Stevens, county commissioner, asked the city commission to consider cooperation with Deschutes county, in paving a road from highway 20 to the municipal and private cemeteries. The county is willing to lay the under base, if the city will provide the oil surfacing, Stevens said. The commission authorized Cuthbertson and Percy Drost, city street department head, to go over the proposed route with members of the county court, and report back at the next meeting.

The city audit contract was ordered let to Bowers, Davis and Hoffman, on a bid guaranteed not to exceed \$665. This is the same figure as last year.

To Buy Trucks - Purchase of two pickup trucks from Settlemyer Motors was ordered, after the city manager had announced the result of a recent call for bids. Two used trucks now owned by the city will be traded in, under the purchase deal.

The Settlemyer bid was \$2,251.60 net. Other bidders were Ward Motors, \$2,270.34; Howard Maple Motor Co., \$2,343.50; Hunnell Motors, \$2,316.

Wayne Hamilton, city recreation director, announced that 2,500 swimmers enjoyed facilities at the pool during the first four days of operation, and that sale of season tickets had exceeded the \$1,000 mark.

to levels below those of Jan. 25, Feb. 24, 1951, or the levels prevailing just before the price ceiling order, whichever is lower. This applies to everything. In effect it would permit a rollback of only two per cent more on beef prices, which already are under a 10 per cent rollback. The former price "base" was the May 24-June 24, 1950 period—just before the Korean fighting started.

President Truman, who has sought tougher inflation curbs, declined at his news conference to say whether it will be possible to control inflation and keep prices down under the bills now shaping up. He said he could not comment until he knows what is in the final version of the bill that reaches him.

Young Veteran Makes Mistake

Beverly, N. J. (UP)—Richard J. Wheeler is only 17 years old but he is a veteran of the Korean war with a purple heart medal.

In 1948—when only 14—he enlisted in the national guard but his mother cancelled it. The next year, he went to Mt. Holly and enlisted in the national guard there. Later he asked and received a discharge to enter the army.

In October, 1949, he went to Philadelphia with a forged birth certificate and enlisted in the regular army. He was sent to Korea as a private first class last November and was wounded in the leg in the battle of the Han river.

Then he made a mistake. His commanding officer ordered all 17-year-olds to step out of line. Richard obeyed automatically. A few days later, he was aboard a ship taking him home for discharge.
