Meetings are to be discontinued for the summer, with a picnic planned for August. Members will continue their participation in civilian defense work, however, it was announced.

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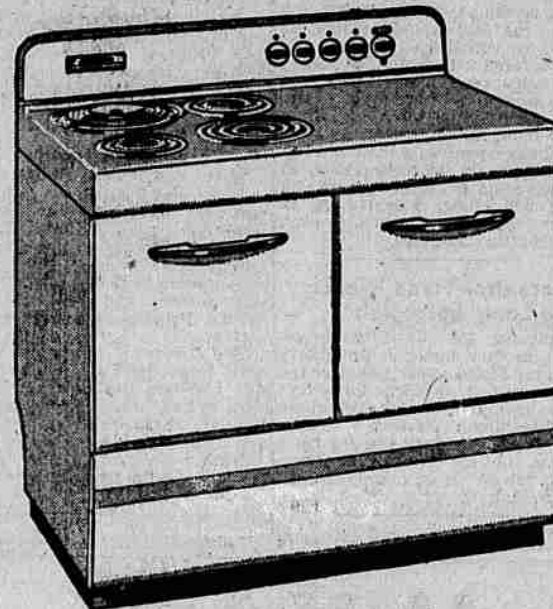
