Dodgers Can't Win, Despite Fact That They Purchased Johnny Schmitz to End Jinx

New York, June 21 (AP)—Pitcher Johnny Schmitz can't beat the Dodgers any more because he is one of them now—but that doesn't stop the Dodgers from beating him.

Schmitz used to have an incredible charm over the Dodgers, beating them in key games, time after time, when he was with the Cubs. So the Dodgers bought him to put a stop to the nonsense, but things certainly didn't work out any better for them in his first brilliant start for Brooklyn last night.

He pitched two-hit ball for seven innings in a duel of lefties in the Cincinnati Rhineland with big Ken Raffensberger, but lost it 2 to 1 when defensive lapses gave the Reds two cheap runs.

Misjudging a drive by Bob Usher, which went for a double in the third inning, rookie left fielder Dick Williams, then played the relay so awkwardly that Bobby Adams scored from first with Cincy's first run. A homer by Roy Campanella in the fifth tied it up at 1-1, but Raffensberger himself scored the winning run in the Cincinnati half of the inning.

A wild throw by Rocky Bridges on Raffy's grounder put the pitcher on second and he went to third on a passed ball. Usher, who made two of the three hits of Schmitz, fled out to bring in the second run. Raffensberger gave up only four hits in winning his sixth game.

The Yankees also won a game cheaply, 2 to 1, from the White Sox in New York, cutting their American League lead to 2 1/2 games. Hank Bauer blooped a single just past shortstop Chico Carrasquel in the eighth to score the deciding run after lefty Bill Pierce had walked two batters. Ed Lopat gave up 10 hits but won his 10th game, while Pierce yielded only five and had to settle for his fifth defeat.

Other Results In other American league games, Cleveland walloped Boston, 14 to 8, Washington defeated St. Louis, 5 to 1, and the Athletics won from the Tigers, 5 to 4 after Detroit took the opener, 7 to 2.

The Phillies topped Pittsburgh, 1 to 0, as Bubba Church shaded Bob Friend in another fine duel. Warren Spahn blanked the Cubs, 9 to 0, as Tommy Holmes made his debut as Boston manager, and the Cards topped the Giants, 4 to 2 as George Mungler struck out nine batters.

Bob Avila hit three homers, a double, and a single as Cleveland made six runs in the first inning, then kept up the onslaught in Boston. Larry Doby also homered for Cleveland and Claude Volmer delivered one for Boston as Early Wynn, in a rocking-chair job, coasted to a 15-hit victory.

Oakland Blasts San Diego Nine; Portland Loses

By Paul Cane (United Press Sports Writer) San Francisco, June 21 (AP)—The Oakland A's, unobtrusively tip-toeing around the Pacific Coast league first division, have the slugging potential of a knock-out fighter—one big punch and the contest is over.

Coddled along by their mild-mannered manager, Mel Ott, the defending champion Oaks aren't conceded much chance to make a repeat conquest of the PCL flag this season.

They've won more than they've lost and they are only 3 1/2 games away from Seattle's lead. But the baseball sharpies won't pay much attention to them as pennant material.

Yet the Oaks have the kind of a team that can erupt with big innings to win ball games. They got 11 in one frame earlier this year to wax Portland. And they tied off on Sad Sam Jones last night to score five times in one stanza and defeat San Diego, 5 to 4.

Newcomer Lorenzo Cabera's double was the big blow of the big frame.

Solons Win Sacramento stayed two games off Seattle's pace with a 4 to 3 decision over Los Angeles in 14 panels. The Solons won when Angel shortstop Gene Baker cut loose with a wild throw.

Elsewhere, Seattle gave a 5 to 0 message to San Francisco, and Hollywood nipped Portland, 4 to 3.

Baker's errant toss, his second miscue of the contest, permitted Sac Joe Marty to score from second base with the winning run. The error brought a halt to a fine pitching duel between Solon lefty Glenn Elliott and Angel Doyle Lade.

Marty, who socked his 10th homer and two doubles in the affair, was the second-place Solons' batting star.

East Lake Egg Take Completed

Game commission fish hatcherymen have completed their annual take of rainbow eggs at East Lake near Bend. The 870,000 eggs obtained will be sent to several state hatcheries.

Large seine nets are employed to trap East lake rainbow as they move into shoal areas. Until the large rainbow move out, a line of marker buoys will be pulled July 1 and other lines will be established September 1 when brook trout move inshore to spawn.

Another 1,500,000 spring rainbow eggs were stripped from brood fish held at the McKenzie hatchery. Most rainbow reared at Oregon's 14 game fish hatcheries are selected at the hatcheries. These brood fish are used for six years and then released.

Jake for a decade operated on the theory that a man's best friend is himself and everybody else didn't even deserve a call.

That was before the night on February 14 in Chicago when Sugar Ray Robinson, battered the middleweight crown from his head. What started as a great fistic encounter wound up in another St. Valentine's massacre. But, no matter what they said about Jake, he was dead game.

For three rounds he took those killing Robinson head shots—and still didn't go down. And when it was over, the crowd gave him an ovation which really opened Jake's eyes.

Jake, the human tank with the Gibraltar jaw, is afraid now that the respect and near-affection he earned from the fight fans in that one bout may not last.

"All they want," he insisted bitterly as he prepared for his light heavyweight encounter with Irish Bob Murphy next week, "is to see me get my block knocked off."

It's a new departure for the Bronx Bull. For years he was a mean and surly man who answered every question with a snarl. In the ring he was a cruel and brutal workman. Out of it he was a man strictly looking out for LaMotta.

That was a hangover from the days of his youth on New York's lower east side. Then he was a fat, awkward youngster from a large family, hoping, somehow, to beat the rap of poverty. Jake did it, and the hard way.
