

Surprise Attack Held Possible

Stuttgart, Ark., July 21 (AP)—RFC administrator W. Stuart Symington warned today that the nation faces the possibility of an imminent "vast devastating surprise attack" by Soviet Russia.

"It is time, if there is time, to become realistic in our thinking, because there may be a day, soon now, when the Soviet atomic stockpile becomes large enough for them to think they are able" to mount such a surprise attack, Symington said.

"When that day of possibility comes, the time to react in relatively leisurely fashion has gone forever," he said in a speech prepared for dedication ceremonies of the new Jones Mills aluminum plant of the Reynolds Metals Co. In connection with the possibility of a Soviet atomic attack, Symington urged that the expansion of the aluminum industry—"the core of all national defense planning"—be made within the interior of the nation, "far from bases from which enemy bombers could suddenly dash."

Canada Not Mentioned
Without mentioning Canada directly, Symington said he opposed any "further financing of foreign aluminum companies on the polar fringe." To locate "some of our most vital war industry on the perimeter of our northern frontier," he said, "would be directly contrary to the logic of all our other planning from a strategic standpoint."

Symington praised the government loans to the Reynolds company to expand aluminum production as "a typical illustration of the best in RFC operations." He pointed out that by the time the company repays its loans, it will have paid to the U.S. treasury an estimated \$100,000,000 "in excess of its total borrowings from the government."

Supect Jailed In Rape Slaying

Springfield, Ill., July 21 (AP)—A 37-year-old father who submitted to a pre-dawn lie detector test, was charged today with the rape slaying of a high school girl whose nude body was found stabbed 45 times and strangled with a necktie.

Assistant state's attorney Frank Middleton said a murder charge would be filed against Peter Farmer, a sad-faced painter, when he is returned to Champaign, Ill., later in the day.

Farmer, whose wife and two children were reported vacationing in Michigan, was brought here for a state lie test after the ravished body of 17-year-old Janet Clark was found sprawled in her father's bedroom at Champaign.

Act Brutal
The girl had been raped, stabbed with an awl 45 times through the heart, lungs and abdomen and strangled with a blue necktie.

Farmer stuck to his story that he had talked with Janet, the daughter of his friend, Paul Clark, through the screen door of her home before the murder, but left her unharmed.

But Middleton said "every lie detector question Farmer answered that dwelt directly on the murder showed deceptions."

Farmer identified a watch found near Janet's body as belonging to him, but said he must have dropped it while visiting her father last night.

Dr. Max Appel said spots found on Farmer's shorts and handkerchief were human blood. But the spots were too small to be tested for blood type.

Sherman Confers With British

London, July 21 (AP)—Adm. Forrest P. Sherman, United States chief of naval operations, conferred Friday with Britain's military leaders and was reported to have told them the U.S. will enter a direct military alliance with Spain despite British and French objections.

Sherman flew here on a whirlwind visit after seeing Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower in Paris yesterday and talking with Generalissimo Francisco Franco and other Spanish officials earlier in the week.

He outlined the American attitude on Spain at a luncheon with Lord Pakenham, first lord of the British admiralty, and other naval and military leaders.

Informed sources said he explained America's proposal to acquire the use of Spanish air and naval bases in return for economic aid.

Prime minister Clement Attlee, foreign secretary Herbert Morrison and Defense minister Emmanuel Shinwell left London for the week end without seeing Sherman.

As for the proposed military agreement between Spain and the United States, Sherman smilingly told reporters he had "no comment."

Prineville Plans Swimming Pool

Prineville, July 21—The Prineville city council has instructed the city park commission to proceed, in collaboration with Fred Gustafson, named engineer for the project, to make definite plans for starting a swimming pool on a 15-acre municipal park along Ochoco creek "near the heart of the city."

At a recent special election voters approved a special tax levy of \$15,000 a year for the next 10 years for improvement of the park. It was decided to give precedence to a swimming pool. The \$15,000 taxes to be collected this year will be retained until next year, when with the \$15,000 due then, plus additional funds from other sources, it is expected a sufficient amount will be available to make possible opening of the pool in time for the 1952 season.

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Huge Communist Army Now Poised

Eighth Army Headquarters, Korea, Sunday, July 22 (AP)—Allied front line officers warned today that the communist army has completed a troop and supply buildup capable of launching a 300,000-man "double-cross offensive" during the four-day recess of cease-fire talks.

Chinese strength along the battlefield was described by an 8th army briefing officer as equal to the force the red army threw into its abortive spring offensive.

He said this meant there were 300,000 reds on the front ready to strike and about 350,000 more in reserve and in rear areas.

Allied divisions sent probing patrols out across the muddy, rain-swept no-man's land Saturday to keep close check on communist movements.

Front reports said there was no indication so far that an attack is imminent.

Ruse Suspected

There was speculation that the communist request for a four-day recess in the Kaesong truce talks might be a ruse to cover preparations for a summer offensive. If the talks break down after the recess, it may be the signal for the red army to strike, some observers at Kaesong believed.

Eighth army reported only light contact on the ground Saturday against small communist forces that also appeared to be out on patrol missions to feel out U.N. lines.

Rain, darkness and clouds virtually grounded the allied air force Saturday night after a day in which pilots dared "enemy weather" to smash at the red buildup with 120 sorties.

The air attacks were concentrated against two communist troop and supply concentrations, known to include tanks and artillery, in the area north of Kaesong on the west and around Kumsong in the center of the peninsula.

Redmond, July 21—Mrs. Catherine C. Schell died Thursday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Joe Gannon of Redmond. Mrs. Schell had been visiting her daughter for the last two weeks from her home in Wasta, S. D.

Death was due to a heart attack. The body is being forwarded by Zachary mortuary to Behrens funeral home in Rapids City, S. D. for funeral services and interment.

Mrs. Schell was born in Odesa, Russia, 65 years ago, and had lived in this country for 44 years.

She is survived by six daughters, Mrs. Gannon; Mrs. Glenn Oberhaus of Drummond, Ida.; Mrs. Leo Holliday of Ontario, Ore.; Mrs. Morgan Iverson of Lead, S. D.; Mrs. Clifford Temple and Mrs. Leonard Webber of Wallace, Ida.; by four sons, Fred and Harry Schell of Lead, S. D.; Arthur of San Francisco and William of Wasta, S. D. She is also survived by 35 grandchildren.

Teamsters Tell Of Riot on Dock

Portland, July 21 (AP)—Three AFL teamsters union truck drivers testified yesterday at the "hot" pineapple damage suits trial in federal court here that they were kicked and beaten during a riot at The Dalles in September, 1949.

The witnesses, Donald Higham, Los Angeles; Eugene Hoard and Elvy M. Davis, San Jose, Cal., were hired by the Hawaiian Pineapple company to haul cases of canned pineapple from the port of The Dalles dock to California.

The pineapple company and two of its employees, Clarence Rosales and Raymond Curto, are suing the International Longshoremen & Warehousemen's union, Portland local No. 8 and 103 union members for a total of \$355,000 in damages. The longshoremen are charged with attempting to prevent unloading of a barge of pineapple shipped to The Dalles during a waterfront dispute in Hawaii. The longshoremen contended at the time that the pineapple was "hot."

Rock Hurler
Higham, first of the three truck drivers to testify, said he and Hoard were in one truck which arrived at The Dalles Sept. 28, 1949, the day of the dock riot. Davis and Rosales, who accompanied the teamsters, had preceded Higham.

Higham testified that "somebody threw a rock which hit our windshield." He said he stalled his truck and before he could start again "longshoremen were swarming around us." He said he saw a man standing over Hoard with a cargo hook in his hand. Then four or five men grabbed him by the legs and pulled him from the truck. Higham testified. He said the men kicked him.

Kicked, Beaten
Hoard corroborated High-

man's testimony. He told the court pickets dragged him out of the truck, kicked and beat him and threatened to throw him in the river.

Davis testified that he saw Rosales dragged out of his truck and thrown to the pier. He said he (Davis) was knocked down and kicked in the jaw.

All three truck drivers testified the pickets called them scabs, flunks and other abusive names.

The pineapple company is suing the ILWU and its Portland local for \$211,000 damages and Rosales and Curto are asking \$144,000 damages from 103 longshoremen for permanent physical injuries alleged suffered when they were beaten during the riot.
