behind the red lines. UN planes knocked out at least 90 of them despite rain and fog.

The volume of traffic was more than three times heavier than in recent weeks. Such activity usually heralds large-scale communist attacks.

The heaviest traffic was in the east, where the allies attacked along a 25-mile front Saturday in an attempt to iron out a communist bulge in their line.

Bloody battles raged all along the range of hills stretching from north of Yanggu on the east-central front to Kansong, on the east coast 27 miles north of the 38th parallel.

Lawton, Okla. (AP)—A car, going at an estimated 90 miles an hour, skidded out of control on the state highway, left more than 1,000 feet of skid marks on the pavement, slammed into a ditch and overturned.

Jefferson Fair and Rodeo Acclaimed as "Best Ever"

Madras, Aug. 20—Olatimers, north unit project settlers and visitors alike acclaimed the 1951 Jefferson county fair and rodeo, which ended with the final of two arena performances yesterday afternoon, as the best of the event's history. The fair started Friday, with that day devoted chiefly to judging 4-H club and F. F. A. exhibits, declared by Paul N. Barnes and Oliver Wilson, county agent and assistant, and Leon Christensen, Madras union high school agriculture teacher, as the best ever displayed here.

The highlight of the annual fair and rodeo was the parade of Saturday morning, heralded by three crop dusting planes of the Smith-Livingstone air service, based at the Madras airbase. Just before the parade appeared the three pilots flew in close formation low over main streets.

Colorful Affairs

An outstanding attraction of the parade was the 30 men, women and children riders of the Warm Springs Indians, whose own garments and the trappings of their horses gave a color worth traveling many miles to see. Aged men wore proudly eagle-feather headdresses and priceless beaded buckskin garments, long treasured as heirlooms by their families. The Indians, too, produced the fair's show this year, and on Saturday night, under sponsorship of the Madras Kiwanis club, Hiawatha, written and directed by Mrs. Naomi Wagner, gifted matron, 60 men, women and children, participated as singers, dancers and in speaking roles.

No division drew more applause in the parade than that in which children alone were participants. Many were the unique costumes and pets marched proudly beside their young masters or mistresses.

While horsemanship was emphasized in the Saturday morning parade by the presence of saddle clubs from all parts of central Oregon and the Indians, visitors were impressed by the large number of farm implements of modern design, shown by dealers of Madras and neighboring cities. They reflected the era of mechanized farming in the area.

Many Participants

Farm family organizations, fraternal groups and churches won commendation for their participation with floats, and these, too, presented booths in the home economics building on the fair grounds.

Miss Dolly Grant, Culver maid, who the night before had been crowned Queen Ladino of the World for 1951, rode a beautiful palomino horse in the parade. The handsome animal and a \$1500 silver mounted saddle had been made available to her by George Hussey of Madras during the period of her reign as queen. Her seven princesses, chosen from various subdivisions of Jefferson county, followed her on horses. Dairy cows and calves dominated the entries in the livestock entries of 4-H clubs and FFA members, and swine and sheep entries showed an increase, reflecting the growing interest of irrigation farm families in this type of livestock as a sideline to their production of clover seed and potatoes.

No prouder person was present at the fair than little Barbara Hereford, Agency plains 4-H club member, whose championship lamb last June set an Oregon price record at the auction held at the Bend Rotary club 4-H club fat livestock show and sale. She won blue ribbons on both her pen of Southdown lambs and one of Hampshires. Barbara said she would be at the Bend show next June.
