

Warren Hopeful Talks Will Lead Way to Peace

Tokyo, Aug. 21 (UP)—Gov. Earl Warren said today the people of California will be "grievously disappointed" if the current peace talks in Korea fail.

"We are quite hopeful there will be a cease fire in Korea which will lead to a permanent peace," Warren told a press conference shortly after his arrival in Japan.

He said he did not subscribe to the view of eight republican senators that the Korean war should be fought to the bitter end.

However, he declined further comment on the full statement of "views and conclusions" issued by the republican senators in Washington on the result of the MacArthur hearings.

Warren is in Japan for a nine-day inspection tour of the 40th division, a California national guard unit stationed in northern Japan.

He said he did not know what plans the army had for the 40th division, but he was sure the California unit would be willing and ready to do its part if it were needed in Korea.

Simple Mission
"Mine is a very simple mission," he said. "I am here to see the officers and men of the 40th division and to bring them the greetings of the people of California and of the state."

"I would wish them godspeed on any mission they may be sent on," he added.

When Warren arrived at Haneda airport this morning, he was met by Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, United Nations supreme commander, Maj. Gen. Daniel H. Hudson, commanding general of the 40th division, and other allied officials.

Warren said he planned to leave Japan by Aug. 30 to be back in San Francisco in time for the Japanese peace treaty conference.

During his visit to Japan, Warren will be on the go every minute from 7:30 a. m. until late at night every day but Sunday and the last two days of his stay. Even then he may visit California units in Korea.

Warren said the people of California are "extremely friendly toward the Japanese people and look forward to the signing of the treaty of peace with Japan, hoping the Japanese may be admitted to the United Nations."

Redmond Gets Disaster Car

Diplomats Told to Extend Courtesy to Agnes Smedley

Washington, Aug. 21 (UP)—O. Edmund Clubb, suspended state department official, testified yesterday that in 1934 then Secretary of State Cordell Hull asked U. S. diplomats in China to extend all suitable courtesies to Agnes Smedley.

Miss Smedley, now dead, once was identified in an army report as a communist agent. The army subsequently withdrew the report after Miss Smedley, a newspaper writer, threatened to sue.

Clubb brought up Hull's name in disclosing to the House Un-American Activities Committee that he (Clubb) talked with former communist courier Whitaker Chambers in the New York offices of the communist magazine New Masses in 1932.

He said it was Miss Smedley who gave him a letter of introduction that led to the meeting with Chambers.

Had Not Met
Clubb, director of the state department's division of Chinese affairs, had testified last March 14 that to the best of his knowledge and belief he never had met Chambers.

Clubb himself called the committee's attention to an entry in his diary recalling the meeting with Chambers, whom he described as a "shifty-eyed, unkempt creature." Chambers subsequently was instrumental in sending former state department official Alger Hiss to jail for perjury.

Clubb said Hiss's letter, written on a state department letterhead March 4, 1934, was addressed to diplomatic and consular officials in China. He quoted Hiss as saying that "at the instance of former Sen. Robert F. Wagner I take pleasure in introducing" Miss Smedley. (The reference was to the late Sen. Robert F. Wagner, D. N. Y.)

Courtesies Asked
The letter went on to request the officials to "extend such courtesies" to Miss Smedley "as you may be able to render consistent with your official duties." He said Miss Smedley once told him she was not a member of the communist party. He could not recall the circumstance under which she made the statement.

Among the other letters he carried from Miss Smedley in 1932, Clubb said, were letters to Robert Morris Lovett of New Republic magazine, Oswald Garrison Villard of Nation and Margaret Sanger, the birth control exponent.

Clubb currently is under suspension from his job during a department security check. Thirteen of 26 department officials recently brought under a new investigation have been cleared.

Clubb's Handwriting
The committee made public the diary entry, which was in Clubb's handwriting. Committee counsel Frank Tavenner Jr., also recalled that Clubb, when asked at a closed committee meeting last March 14 if he ever had met Chambers, replied:

"No, sir, not to the best of my knowledge and belief."

The 50-year-old Clubb, a neat, slightly-built man with a ready smile, came before the committee accompanied by his pretty wife and carrying two red leather-bound diaries, covering the periods Jan. 5, 1932, through Oct. 18, 1932, and Oct. 26, 1932, through June 30, 1933.

He also submitted to the committee unbound loose-leaf type-written diary entries covering periods between Dec. 8, 1941, and July 1, 1951.

Clubb urged the committee not to make public his diaries for fear some persons mentioned in them who still are in China might suffer reprisals at the hands of the communists.

Subject to Arrest
He said foreigners in China now are being subjected daily to arrest and imprisonment and that some have been shot.

The diary read in part: "The most interesting meeting thus far was that with the new masses. This so-called 'revolutionary organ' is a horrible rag. But Agnes had given me a letter of introduction to Walter Carmon, so I went to see him."

Railroad Fires Sen. Vern Bull

Portland, Aug. 21 (UP)—State Sen. Vern Bull and four other employees of the Union Pacific railroad in the La Grande area were fired, officials reported today.

A spokesman for the Railroad Brotherhood said Bull, a yardman, conductor and brakeman was charged with failure to put

out the proper sign flag at Hermiton. The spokesman said there were other minor offenses.

Brotherhood officials said they were not convinced discharge was justified in the cases.

Other men discharged, according to the spokesman, were A. L. Chestnut, engineer of The Dalles, C. J. Gilson, C. H. Abbott, and H. F. Richardson, all trainmen from La Grande.

Bull is a veteran state lawmaker. He was first elected to the house of representatives from Union county in 1934. He served as a senator from Walla Walla and Union counties in the last legislative sessions with membership

on several prominent committees, including chairmanship of the controversial public institutions and welfare.

Last November, he was defeated by Rep. Lowell Stockman in a bid for a congressional seat from Oregon's second district. At one time, he was president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen in La Grande.
