Truman Might Pick Oklahoma's Senator Kerr If He Decides Not to Run for Presidency

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—Sen. Robert S. Kerr of Oklahoma is one of the men to whom President Truman might offer first place on the Democratic ticket this year if he chooses not to run himself.

Kerr was born 55 years ago in a log cabin in that part of the present state of Oklahoma then known as the Indian territory. He is a wealthy man now. Kerr made it in oil.

Barring a matter or two bearing somewhat on the industry with which he is connected, Kerr is a down the road supporter of Mr. Truman's policies at home and abroad. He is a crack orator who hones his words and phrases to razor sharpness. On Sen. Robert A. Taft (R-O), for example:

"I will say that Senator Taft has been consistent in the field of foreign policy. He has been consistently wrong."

On Republicans:
"I never saw a bunch of men more suspicious of each other than the present group of Republican leaders. Nor have I ever seen suspicion better founded."

MacArthur Attacked
Kerr's greatest service to the administration was his land, sea, and air attack on Gen. Douglas MacArthur after Mr. Truman fired him from high office in Japan. Few politicians cared to take on the general.

The senator assailed MacArthur's ideas of strategy as "madness" which would lead inevitably to war with the Soviet Union. His barbed speeches were the administration's most effective response to the angry clamor which arose in MacArthur's defense. Kerr said war with China must be avoided; the fighting confined to Korea. He was by far Mr. Truman's most vigorous defender during the MacArthur episode.

Kerr is in the April 1 Nebraska presidential primary. He is a candidate for President, however, only if Mr. Truman does not choose to run. To Kerr the man

in the White House is "our great President, Harry S. Truman." Their biggest break was on the Kerr natural gas bill which would remove independent gas producers and gatherers from Federal Power Commission control. Kerr maneuvered the bill to passage. Mr. Truman vetoed it.

Bucks Administration
Kerr also bucks the administration on tidelands oil. He holds that oil beneath the tidelands of coastal states belongs to the states and not to the federal government which has taken over the areas.

The senator is a spender. The Council of State Chambers of Commerce tagged him as the leading senatorial spender in the last session of Congress. The council listed 18 votes by Kerr against what it rated as economy measures, not voting on two other occasions and no vote for an economy measure.

Kerr retorted that many of his votes were for local public health units, school surveys and construction, public power, soil conservation, flood control, and other such for Oklahoma.

The congressional quarterly lists Kerr as supporting the administration 40 times and opposing it once on appropriation bills. He was for the administration, 33

votes to nothing, on foreign policy, 22 to 7 on economic issues. Both the AFL and CIO list Kerr as usually voting their way on the questions which interest labor most.

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
