Egyptologist Has Big Reading Job

WORCHESTER, Mass. (AP)—A 72-year-old Egyptologist is reading proof on a 2,000-page book he copied off granite walls 200 feet tall.

Dr. Samuel A. B. Mercer, a former professor at Trinity College in Toronto, has translated the pyramid texts for the first time in any language. The texts represent 7,000 lines of hieroglyphics taken from the walls of 80 pyramids lining the Nile River in Egypt.

Dr. Mercer said the texts are one of the "greatest and oldest religious literatures in the world."
