Secretary Eden Asks Information

LONDON, April 21 (AP)—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden announced Monday that he is asking the Chinese Communist government for full information about 55 Western citizens, including 42 Americans, reported in jail in Red China.

Eden said in Commons that he has instructed the British charge d'affaires in Peiping to deliver a note to the Communists asking details on the charges against the Westerners, the sentences imposed on them, if any, and their whereabouts and welfare.

Eden said the Chinese are reported to have jailed five Canadians, five Britons or citizens of British colonies and three Australians.

In addition to the 42 Americans jailed, he said, 20 Americans are held under house arrest.
